## MASS MEETING ENTHUSIASM BODES ILL FOR CHICAGO

Prexy, Johnston, McGovern and Erwin Arouse Student Body —"Absent Treatment."

One of the largest football demonstrations that ever occurred at Minnesota took place yesterday afternoon in Chapel. The enthusiasm that was displayed at this meeting was indicative of strong student support and might be taken as a sign of certain victory.

Bunny Rathbun called the meeting to order and urged strong "absent treatment" as a help to the team in Saturday's game.

Prof. Frelin, the first speaker, was introduced as an "ex-convict of France." He expressed the wish that he might have been born an American, not that he had presidential aspirations, but because he had always desired to be a football player. He further said that a Minnesota victory was almost a certainty.

After Frelin had finished, Bunny announced to the audience that the night-shirt parade had been called off but that there would be a parade without the "nighties." This change in the plans was caused by President Northrop's attitude toward the parade.

Prexy was then called upon and he spoke in part as to his attitude toward the arrangements for the evening send-off. "I came on purpose to see if the plans for the parade could not be changed. I have never interwith your pleasures, nor do I wish to now, but I know from past experiences that the entire country will criticize us and now is the time to avoid this criticism. I am delighted to see you stand back of your team. The motive for this parade is all right. It is to keep the down-town hoodlums out, but its disrepute compels me to speak against it. I hope you give the team such a mighty good send-off that it will be impossible for them to lose."

Fred Johnson, '09, one of the members of last year's championship debating team, spoke of the newspapers in Chicago and their methods for helping their team.

The entire first team then came on the stage and each player shook hands with prexy. Capt. Johnson was called upon to speak in the team's behalf and he promised to bring victory back to Minnesota and also get even for the defeat two years ago.

McGovern, last year's All-American quarterback, reiterated his captain's statements and promised a Ski-U-Mah victory.

William Ervin drew a round of applause when he urged the crowd to make the team feel that there were not eleven, but 4,000 Gophers behind the ball, pushing, when it crossed Chicago's goal.

After singing Edgar Allen's football song, Rathbun made the final announcements for the big parade.

## PHARMACISTS SHOW SPIRIT.

## Y.M.C.A. TO BULLETIN REPORTS OF THE GAME

Details of Plays Will Be Given on Campus—Special Arrangement.

Arrangements have been completed for a special wire from the Western Union Telegraph company to receive the returns of the Minnesota-Chicago game directly upon the campus. Gordon Grimes, acting for the Y. M. C. A. cabinet, has arranged with the telegraph company to have the wire terminal at the Y. M. C. A. building.

Effort is also being made to use the big score board which the Minneapolis Journal has used in reporting the results of Minnesota games to the down-town crowd. In case the score-board cannot be had, one will be made which will also show the exact position of the ball at all stages of the game. The results of each down will be announced through a megaphone as fast as they are received over the wire.

If the weather should be cold or stormy the wire will be run to the Chapel where the results will be announced. In that case Frank Goodman has asked the Glee club to furnish entertainment between quarters. Such a large crowd is expected to view the score-board that unless the weather interferes seriously the results will be shown at the east corner of the Y. M. C. A. building, otherwise they will be received in Chapel.

## GOPHER SONG BOOK REALITY

Norton at Work Compiling Songs—to Be Truly Minnesota in Spirit.

A University of Minnesota song book, containing all the songs and melodies in popular use at Minnesota and also other college songs, is now being compiled and will probably be on sale late next spring.

The compiler of the song book is William W. Norton, '09-'10, former director of the Minnesota Glee club and new director of music in the University of North Dakota. Mr. Norton started work on the book last February and has it well under way at the present time.

Considerable difficulty is being met with in securing the consent of publishers to the use of many of the songs, but thirty-eight songs have already been selected and secured.

## DR. DOLL ADDRESSES LIBERAL ASSOCIATION.

In an exceedingly interesting and illuminating address before the University Liberal association yesterday Dr. Charles F. Doll, the distinguished lecturer said that will power is the one great element in individual efficiency. ## PRIZES FOR BEST ESSAYS; MINN. STUDENTS ELIGIBLE

One Thousand Dollars Offered for Best Paper on Economic Subjects.

Notices have been given Minnesota University students who wish to compete for the Hart, Schaffner & Marx prizes, to forward their essays to Professor J. Laurence Laughlin of the University of Chicago by June 1, 1911.

The prizes are offered for the best papers on economic subjects. They amount in all to \$2,000 and this is the seventh year of their existence. Winners in the past years have come from Harvard, Dartmouth, Wisconsin, Washington and Lee, Michigan, Chicago, Northwestern and Pennsylvania.

The prizes are divided into two classes. Class "A" includes any American without restriction. The first prize is \$1,000 and the second is \$500. Class "B" includes only those who, at the time the papers are sent in, are undergraduates of any American college, but a contestant in Class "B" is eligible to a prize in Class "A." The prizes in this class are \$300 and \$200.

The committee in charge of the contest is as follows: Professor J. Laurence Laughlin, University of Chicago, chairman; Professor J. B. Clark, Columbia University; Professor Henry C. Adams, University of Michigan; Horace White, Esq., New York City; Professor Edwin F. Gay, Harvard University.

Some of the subjects suggested by the committee are: The effect of labor unions on international trade; the best means of raising the wages of the unskilled; a comparison between the theory and the actual practice of protectionism in the United States; the true relation of the central government to trusts; how much of J. S. Mills' economic system survives?; a central bank as a factor in a financial crisis.

If a contestant wishes to choose a special subject, he should communicate with Professor Laughlin who will provide a list of available subjects.

Rathbun Directs Greatest Burst of Enthusiasm Ever Shown on Departure of Team.

When the train bearing the Gopher team pulled out of the station last night, the most enthusiastic, pulse-stirring, nerve-racking, hair-raising, ear-splitting, roof-raising, quiet-chasing and withal hearty and heartfelt demonstration that Minneapolis ever saw, came to a close.

Accompanied by the cadet band, doing its worst to dispel silence of the evening and led by "Bunny" Rathbun, with his bubbling enthusiasm and college spirit, a human snake, four blocks long, wound its way down 4th street, hissing, shouting, shrieking, howling, squirming down Central avenue, holding up traffic, putting burly policemen to route, frightening timid old ladies and delighting beyond words the crowd of small boys which brought up the rear.

At the Milwaukee station the vast reptile melted and its numerous elements assembled in a mass to listen to the prognostications of those idols of the co-eds, the football stars, and hear with awe the calm words of that worker of wonders, the "man behind."

Then the perpetrators of this gigantic expression of patriotic feeling departed joyfully, hopefully, perhaps a little nervously and certainly without desire for sleep, to their respective domiciles to meditate upon different methods of welding themselves of certain sudden wealth.

## VACCINATION IS ADVISED

No New Cases of Small-Pox—Dean Wesbrook Suggests Safeguarding of Public Health.

Dean Wesbrook of the medical college reports that so far there have been no developments in the small-pox situation. He advises every one who was in the same sections with Miss Fitzpatrick to be vaccinated immediately.

He said further: "Vaccination will not protect a person unless administered within three days after exposure to the disease.

No new cases have been reported, but everyone owes it to himself and the student body to take proper precaution in these matters."

Dean Wulling of the school of pharmacy has been elected to the chairmanship of the committee on publication of the American Pharmaceutical association. This is done at Chicago, University Wisconsin, California, Monographs, Harvard, Pennsylvania and Yale and at many other of the smaller colleges. The monograph idea consists of reports of scientific and scholastic research done by professors. The members of the faculty of the University of Minnesota are every year producing more and more original work in almost every field of scholarship, but the University receives absolutely no credit for it. Under the monograph system the individual doing the work would receive the same amount of credit, but in addition the University by publishing a report of the work would receive a certain amount of prestige and credit by having such research conducted under its auspices.

The idea is a good one and many of the faculty have already expressed their approval of the plan.

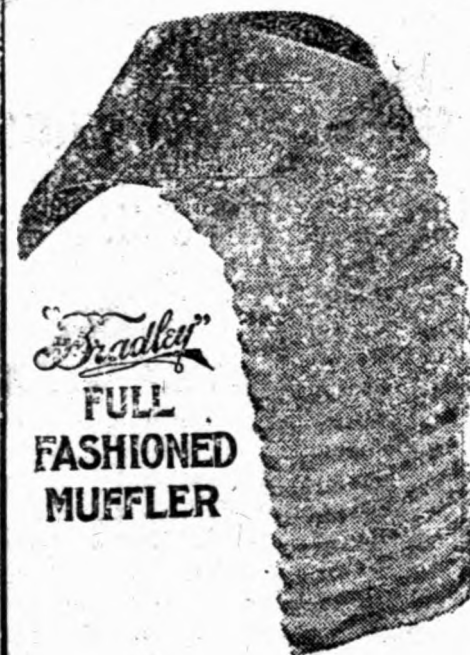

The Maroon line has been strengthened a great deal this past week by the special efforts put on it and followers of that team are confident that they will be able to hold in the Minnesota backfield.

The Gophers, although they have had a great deal of practice on defence in the scrimmages, have put most of their time in developing a strong offense. With the proper plays and the men they now have in the backfield, Minnesota will try to play the offensive game all year. Dr. Williams hopes to get the jump on the Maroons on Saturday, as he succeeded in doing in the game with Cole's pupils; Stagg, however, will not be caught asleep at the switch and in all probability has trained his men to stop anything in this order.

Chicago's defeat means much to the Maroon and Gold at present and the Gopher team will put forth every effort to capture the laurel wreath.
