CIVIL SERVICE SALARY INCREASES Civil service salary increases (retroactive to July) will start appearing this month. In his latest letter to the university community, University President C. Peter Magrath stated that "initial adjustments will appear on staff paychecks beginning October 15." Magrath also stated that the two percent retirement contribution shift for civil service has also been eliminated. "Since the tax was already in effect for civil service staff during the first six months of this year, the prior contributions will be repaid to affected employees upon their retirement or departure from the university," the letter states.

CONTROL DATA FOUNDER TO SPEAK HERE William Norris, founder of Control Data, will speak on "Technology: Cooperation and More Jobs" at 11 a.m. Saturday, October 15 in the Marshall Performing Arts Center during Technology Day being held on campus.
