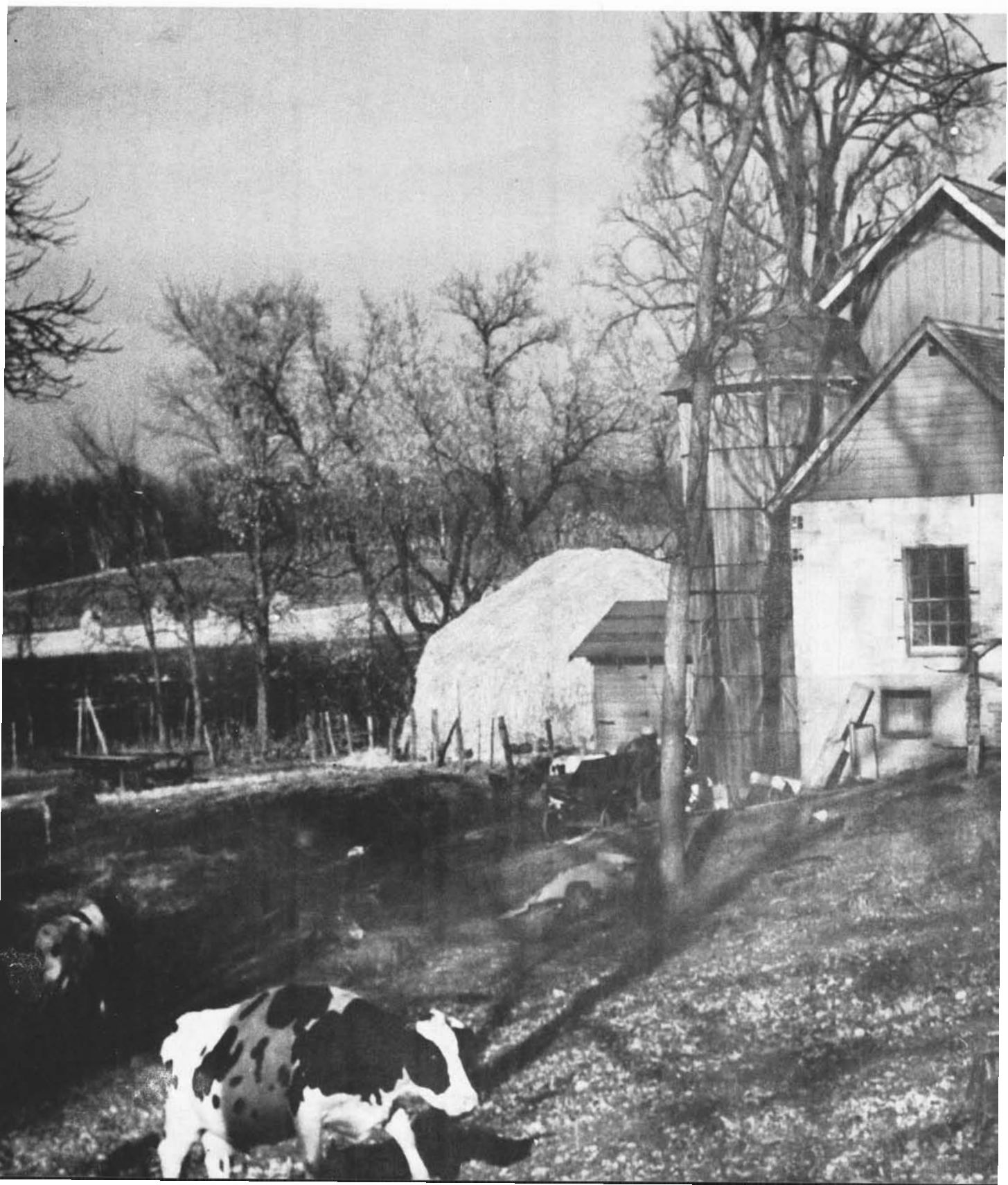


Although we students come from plains and rolling hills, from large families or small, from prosperous or modest homes, we all have one thing in common — our parents have passed on to us a love of farming.

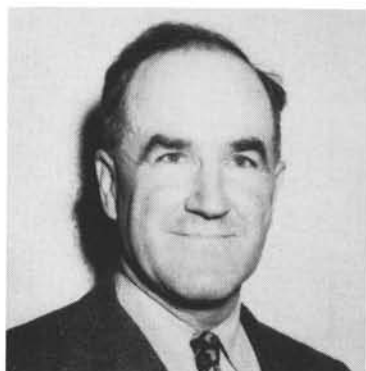
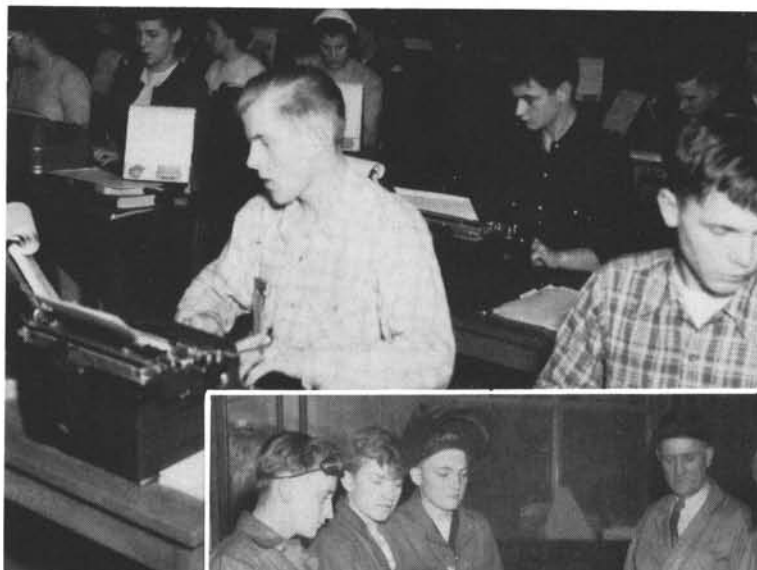

At the Northwest School, we students are given practical courses which will develop the skills modern farming calls for.

In Mr. Barron's classes we learn how to take a motor apart and put it back together without having any pieces left over. In Motors II we bring motors from home and overhaul them in the shop at school. In field machinery class we learn the principles involved in the construction and operation of farm machinery.

Mr. Soderburg teaches us the fine arts of rope, metal and concrete work in farm shop. In his blacksmithing class we learn how to use forges and other tools efficiently. Through the medium of his welding class, we learn the latest

methods of electric and gas welding.

If you have the urge to use your hands as we have, then you will be intrigued by the well equipped carpentry shop under the supervision of Mr. A. M. Foker. In the highly educational and fascinating mechanical drawing classes, we learn first the fundamentals of drawing, and then how to design buildings.

We students who have taken or are taking typing appreciate the efforts of our highly specialized instructor, Miss Hughbanks. Nimble fingers and steady nerves count much toward skill in typing. In bookkeeping we receive detailed training on the subject itself and how to apply it in later life.

Enriching the musical lives of students at the Northwest School daily are Miss Kissel and Miss Maher. This is done in individual as well as group training and is made available to all students showing musical interest and ability.

Miss Kissel directs the advanced choir, which consists of the selected singers from all classes, as well as the girls' and boys' glee clubs. Much of her time during the day is devoted to private voice students.

Piano lessons are the order of the day for Miss Maher. In addition to that she is official accompanist for all musical groups. She also directs a popular small vocal group, the boys'

Mr. Beresford works with the students in fruits and vegetables, biology, botany, and forestry classes.

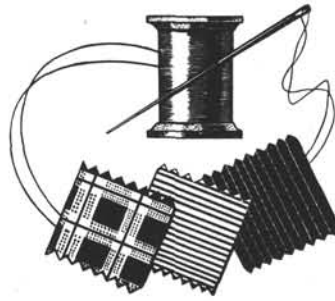
Through the classes of animal husbandry

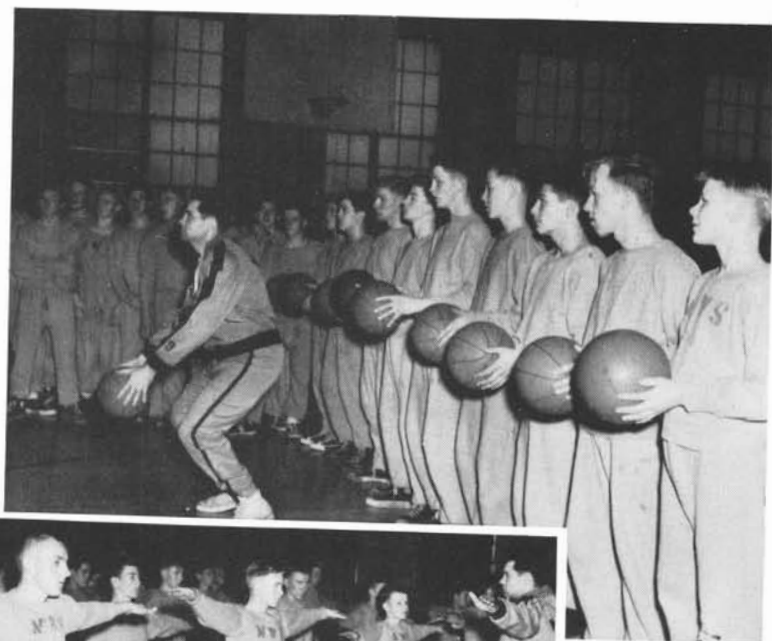

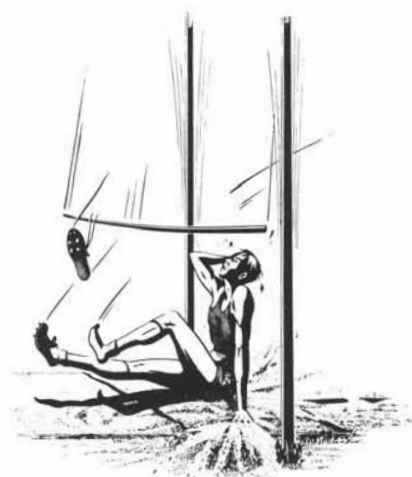

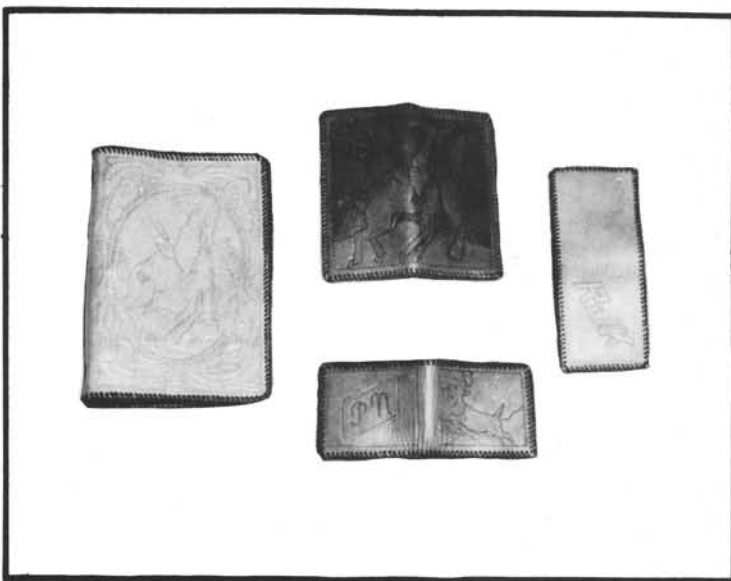


Leather Craft

Each year more and more people are becoming interested in leathercraft. The students at the Northwest School are also enjoying the pleasures of working with leather. This introductory class will, it is hoped, aid in the development of worth - while hobbies among students so that they may make better use of their leisure time.

Projects undertaken by the students have been key cases, belts, billfolds, bond cases, notebooks, purses, and coasters.

Fundamental operations including design and template cutting, preparation of leather, outline tooling, embossing, carving, and lacing have been studied.

Robertson Hall Council

Our most serious setback came when we lost a hard fought Homecoming game, tying up the number of losses and wins for the Aggies.



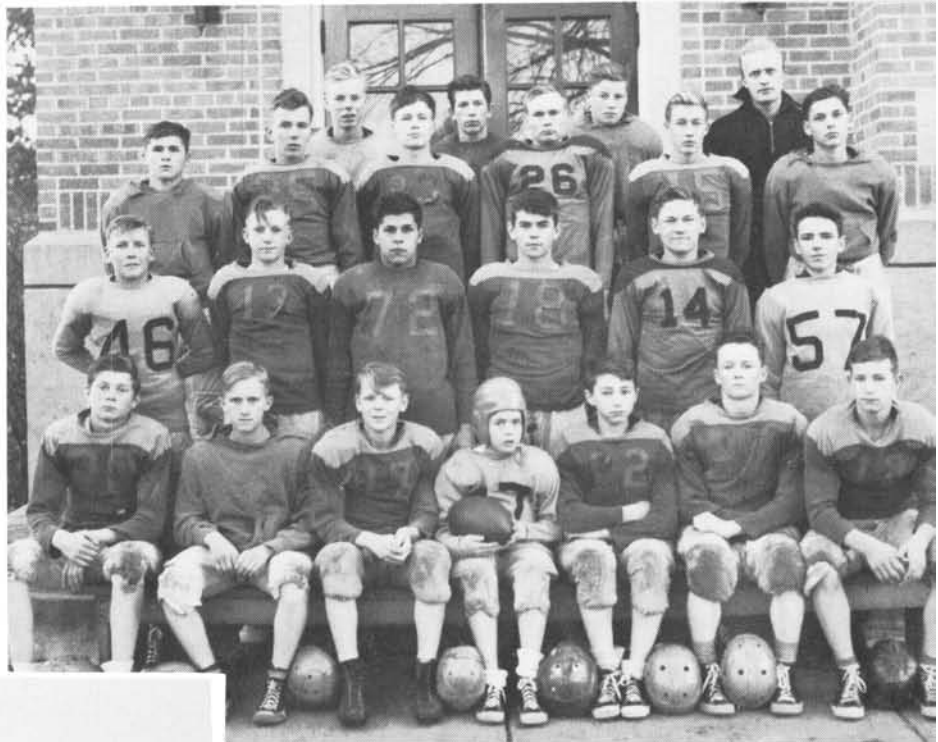

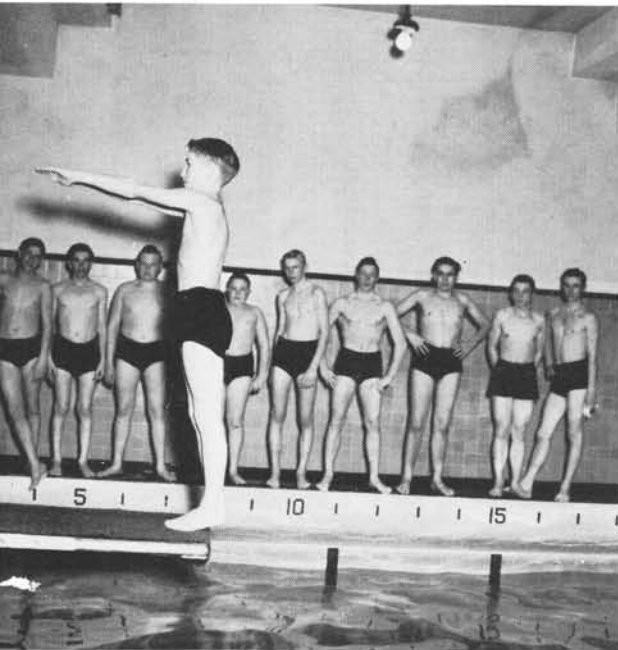

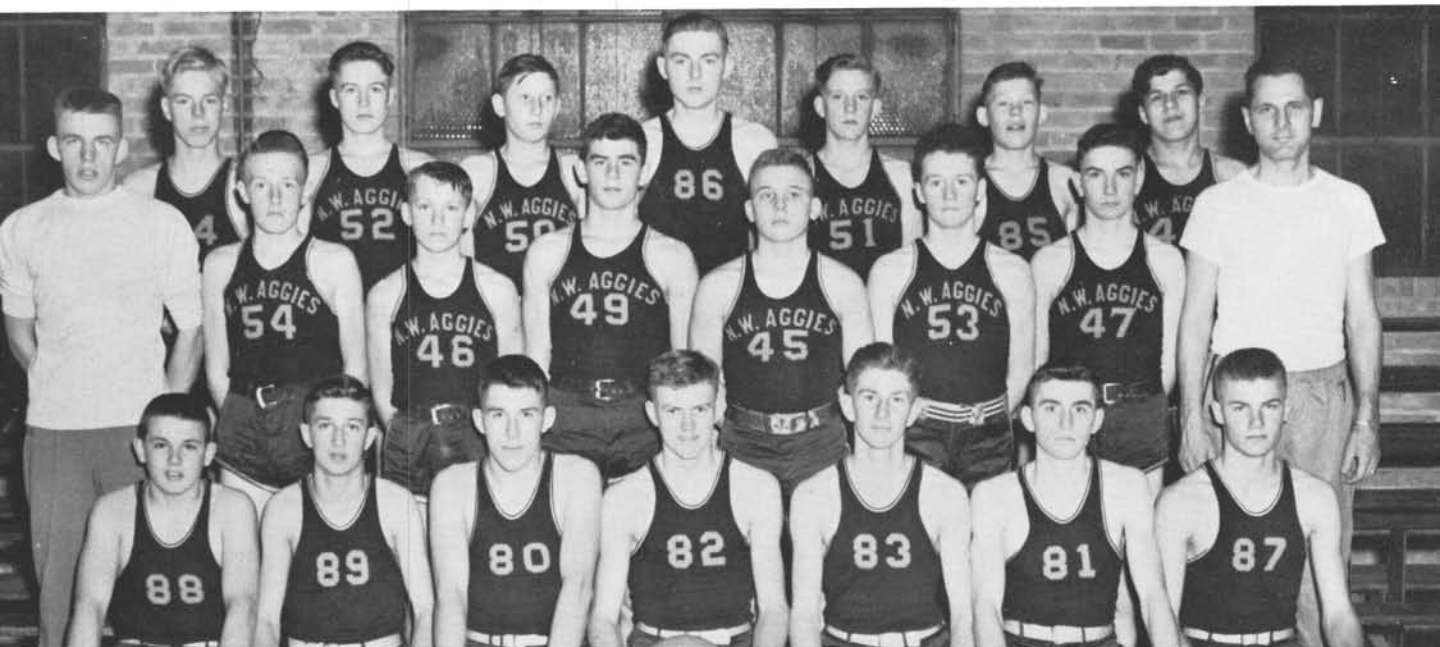
Our practice season got off to a good start this year with about seventy boys vying for the vacancies left by last year's graduating lettermen.

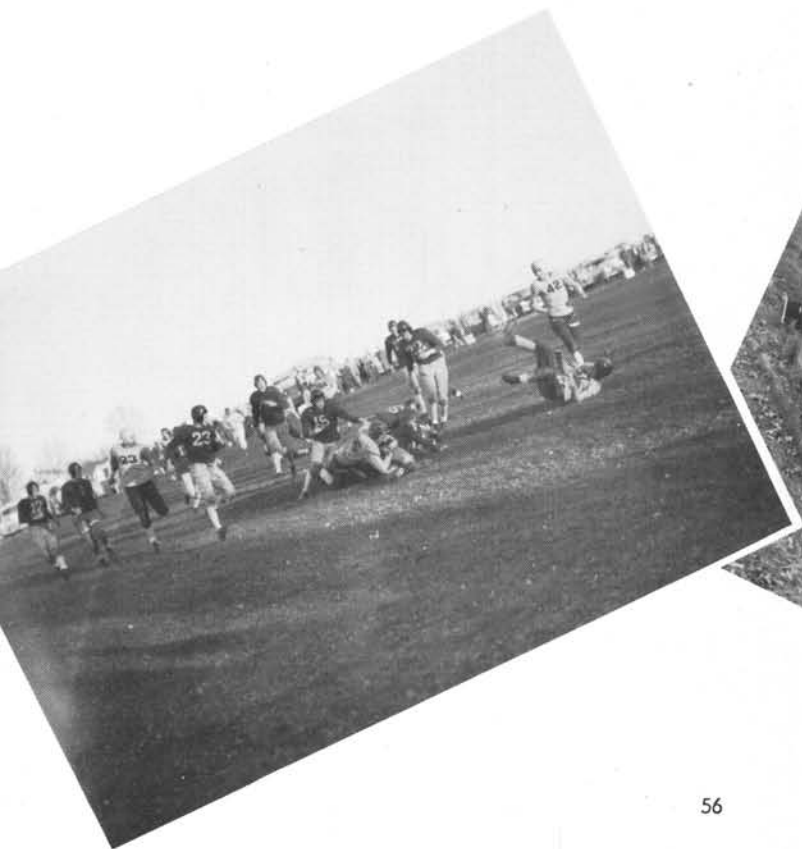

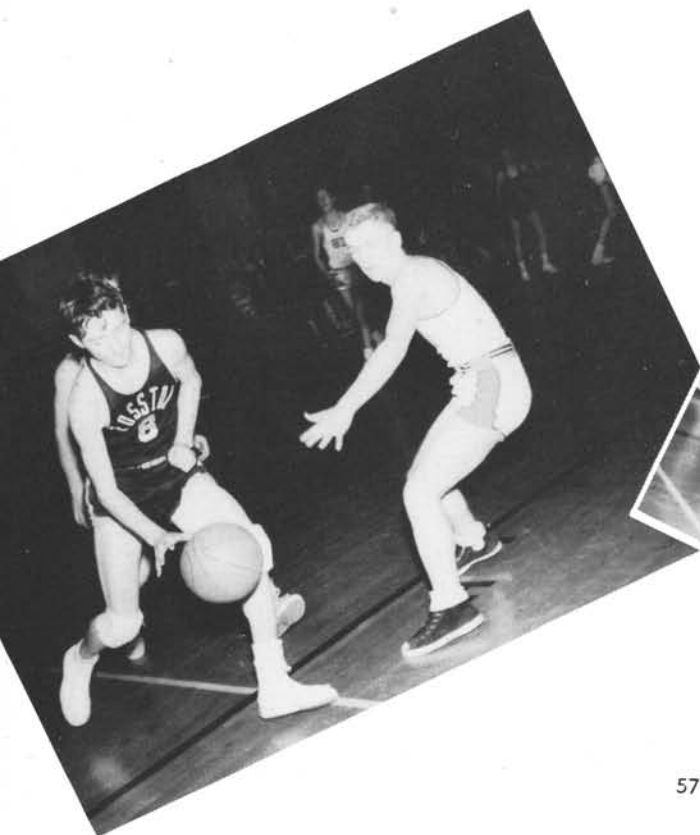
