PROFESSOR FEULLERAT'S LECTURES

Professor Albert Feuillerat, of the University of Rennes, Exchange Professor for the year at Yale, will lecture in the Little Theater, Wednesday and Thursday, May 19, 20, at 4:30. The first four rows in the center of the ground floor will be held for members of the Faculty and their wives up to 4:25. Admittance will be only by the main entrance and students and others are requested not to attempt to enter by the other doors, or by the windows, after the main entrance is shut.

The lecture Wednesday will be on Shakespeare. The subject for Thursday will be announced later. This evening Professor Feuillerat will speak at a dinner tendered him and Mme. Feuillerat in the Minnesota Union.

Professor Feuillerat is a distinguished authority on Elizabethan Literature. Flattering reports have reached members of the Faculty concerning the impression he has made at Yale as a teacher and speaker and it is in response to a spontaneous demand (though at this late day with considerable difficulty) that the University has secured these dates on his return trip from the Pacific Coast. Having spent much time in England, Professor Feuillerat has perfect command of the language, whether as a writer as as a speaker.

CONVOCATION THIS WEEK

An All-University Convocation will be held this week Thursday, May 20, at 11:30 a.m. in the Armory. The speaker will be Mr. J. F. Coar, Professor of Modern Languages at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Canada. His subject will be "E Pluribus Unum", and he will discuss the evolution of political thought from the Greek polis to the American Federation and America's opportunity in the present day. Dean W. R. Vance of the Law School will preside.

Sophomores in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts

All Sophomores who expect to register for work in the "Senior College" of the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts for 1920-21 should at once do two things preliminary to registration.

1. They should check up the record of their work to see that by the end of this quarter they will have completed the requirements of the "Junior College".

2. They are required by the new curriculum to choose a major subject. This choice must be made not later than Saturday, May 22. The student should report to the chairman or head of the department of his choice, and be assigned to an adviser. The adviser will approve the election of studies by the student, and will have general oversight of his work.

Students in the eight-year course in Arts and Medicine should report to Professor Sigerfoos; those in the six-year course in Arts and Law, to Professor Lobb; all students in other combined Arts and professional courses leading to the A. B. degree to Professor Thomas.

These instructions do not apply to students who after two years in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts, intend to enter the College of Law, the College of Education, the College of Medicine and Surgery, or the School of Business. Such students should observe the regulations for registration in these schools and colleges to be published later in the Official Daily Bulletin, under the signatures of the respective deans.
