DULUTH CAMPUS ASSEMBLY MEETING-----The UMD Campus Assembly will meet in Room 185 Life Science Building on Tuesday, January 29, at 2:30 p.m.

COMMITTEE REPRESENTATIVE ON CAMPUS-----Fred Amram, chairperson of the University Appeals Committee on Academic Freedom and Responsibility, will be here on the afternoon of 29 January to present the report of the Committee (published in the Daily of Wednesday, 9 January) to the UMD Campus Assembly. OPENING--PERFORMING ARTS BUILDING-----The \$2.6-million UMD Performing Arts Building will be dedicated and opened to the public on Sunday, February 3. The building includes a main theater seating 700 persons, an experimental theater seating 60 persons, dance studio, rehearsal area, classrooms, dressing rooms and faculty offices. A series of theater, music, dance and film events will be presented at the new facility running through March 12.

UNIVERSITY ARTISTS SERIES CONCERT-----The Norman Luboff Choir will present a University Artists Series concert on Monday, March 25, at the Duluth Auditorium, replacing the concert which was to have been presented by the Trinidad Steel Band last November. Season ticket holders will be sent new tickets for the Luboff concert, and single tickets will go on sale in early March. The Harkness Ballet will be performing on February 26 as part of the University Artists Series program.

OVERNIGHT PARKING-----According to a newly adopted regulation, there will be no overnight parking (midnight to 6:00 a.m.) of private cars on the University lots, except for the special Residence Hall lots. This is principally to facilitate snow removal and to discourage use of University property for "storage" of private cars. Exceptions will be made for faculty and staff whose work necessitates early-hour work on campus. Please contact Campus Police in advance if possible. (Parking and Transportation Committee)

REDUCED BUS FARES-----UMD will be participating in the DTA's Employers Program for Energy Conservation to encourage use of city buses. Regular DTA tokens will be sold at the Cashiers' Office, Administration Building, for 25 cents each in lots of 20 to students, faculty and staff, with a limit of 120 per person each quarter. Use the buses! The new Lakeside bus route will also start on January 24; standard DTA fares or tokens may be used, or a pass may be purchased at the Cashiers' Office that is good on either bus for the full quarter. The cost for the balance of Winter quarter is \$8 (\$12 for a full quarter), or approximately 11 cents a ride if one rides to and from the University each work day of the quarter. XEROX TELECOPIER SERVICE-----A Xerox Telecopier is now available for use in the Campus Relations office at 305 Administration Building. By long distance call, you can send a full page of copy in four minutes on the Telecopier to a receiving telephone in Morrill Hall where the material will be delivered to any office you wish. The page can be typewritten or it can be a chart, drawing, map, etc. It is a speedy way to get very important material to the University or to any other office in the United States which has Telecopier service. You can also have documents sent to you at our office. By using the "2" line, the sending call costs you nothing. Otherwise, you will have to have the UMD operator charge it to your budget number. Mrs. Sheeks or Mrs. Swanstrom can answer your questions and help you send material. For the time being, there is no charge for use of the machine. Whether there will be a charge in the future depends on usage and the labor involved in running the machine. (J. Hoshal)

GRANTS AWARDED-----The Economic Development Administration in conjunction with the Arrowhead Regional Development Commission and the Lake Superior Basin Studies Center have provided a \$43,000 grant to Richard Lichty and Wayne Jesswein for the purpose of analyzing anticipated employment, income and tax impacts due to a complete or partial closing of Reserve Mining Company of Silver Bay. The project is to take one year to complete.
