EX-SERVICE MEN AND WOMEN—NOTICE

Resume and Plan of Administration of the Law Providing Tuition at State Expense for Honorably Discharged Officers, Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, and Red Cross Workers:

1. *Who May Receive Benefits.*—Any male person, who, being at the time a citizen and resident of the State of Minnesota, served as an officer or enlisted man in the army, navy or marine corps of the United States during any war in which the United States has been involved, including the members of the National Guard, or who, upon the call of the president, performed military service outside of the borders of this state in any troubles with Mexico, and any man or woman who, being at the time a citizen and resident of the State of Minnesota, performed active overseas war service as a regularly enlisted full-time worker of the Red Cross, engaged in nursing the sick or assisting in the care of soldiers in any government hospital, field or camp, which service has been officially recognized by the National Government.

2. *Amount of Tuition, When Paid, Time Limits.*—An amount not to exceed two hundred (200) dollars for each person to be paid to the institution at close of semester or term. The benefits from the provisions of this act shall not extend beyond July 1, 1924. The amount that may be paid in any year is limited to the amount appropriated by the legislature. Where student

has been in attendance, or where tuition has been paid by him since his induction into the military, naval, marine or Red Cross service, such tuition may be refunded, provided that no refund shall be made where tuition has heretofore been paid by the Government of the United States for a student coming under the provisions of this act. Application for such refund must be made through the school attended as outlined in paragraph 4 of this circular.

3. *Where Applicable.*—The provisions of this law apply in all departments of the University of Minnesota.

4. *Procedure.*—Official application blanks have been prepared and may be had upon application at Window No. 3, Registrar's office, Library Building. These blanks must be filled out in triplicate with great care, and if the discharge papers or other proofs of service do not indicate clearly that the applicant was a bona-fide resident of Minnesota at the time of enlistment, an additional affidavit attesting this fact will be required.

Return all blanks to the Registrar's office, Window No. 3.

No prediction can be made at this time as to just when the actual refunds will be forthcoming.

COURSE IN HOSPITAL DENTISTRY

The General Extension Division offers a course in Hospital Dentistry of six weeks beginning Friday, June 27, 1919, at the University Hospital under the auspices of the College of Dentistry and the School of Medicine. No fees are required for

any of these courses. Courses open to physicians and dentists.

The work will consist of three courses, namely:

A. A series of lectures, one each day except Saturday.

B. Ward and Library work, daily.

C. Actual dental work on the hospital patients under the supervision of the Hospital Dental Corps, on five mornings per week.

The class taking these courses will be divided into three groups:

Group 1. Those enrolling for the lecture series, A, only. This course is open to licensed ethical dentists and physicians and is not limited as to numbers.

Group 2. Those enrolling for Courses A and B, requiring six half days per week. This group is limited to six licensed ethical dentists.

Group 3. Those enrolling for Courses A, B, and C, requiring full-time work. This group is limited to six licensed ethical dentists.
