II. FUNDING NOTES

Internal

Graduate School Grants-in-Aid. The fall deadline will be October 1, 1990. A second deadline falls on March 4, 1991. New faculty are encouraged to apply. Copies of the application form can be obtained from the Graduate School Research Office, 625-2356.

McKnight Land-Grant Professorships. Up to twelve awards will provide two years of support to outstanding young faculty. Individuals can be nominated as early as their first year at the University, but no later than the start of the fourth year. In addition, because of the emphasis on faculty in the early years of their professional careers, those eligible must have received the Ph.D. within the past five years. For this year, the degree must have been awarded after January 1, 1985. Nominations, which must come from the department chair, will be due October 26, 1990. Additional information is available from the Office of Dean, Graduate School.

Graduate School Faculty Summer Research Fellowships. November 12 is the deadline for 1991 Faculty Summer Research Fellowship applications. The purpose of the program is to encourage research and artistic creation by enabling members of the faculty to devote full time to intensive work on their projects for one summer term of approximately five weeks. Information and application forms are available from the Graduate School Research Office (625-2356).

Office of International Education Faculty Grant Program. Grants may cover: establishment of collaborative research, training or service; educational exchanges of faculty; completion of individual research of an international nature; curriculum development; international seminars and other programs held at the University of Minnesota or involving international scholars outside the University; participation in international professional conferences held outside the U.S. Applications are due November 15 for activities beginning in January, February or March. Information and application forms are available from the OIE Development Grant Coordinator, 624-5580.

Bush Sabbatical Program. Supplementary sabbatical income is provided for mid-career faculty who seek to integrate research and undergraduate teaching. Tenured faculty who are eligible for a regular University Sabbatical Furlough may apply. Women and members of minority groups are especially encouraged to apply. Application materials are distributed to departments in mid-fall. Applications are first evaluated by the college; CLA has set a November 30 deadline for its internal review. CLA forwards its recommendations to central administration to meet an early January deadline. Information about the CLA review process is available in the Faculty Affairs Office, 624-9839.

Single Quarter Leave. This program is designed to advance special studies, research, scholarly writing, and self-improvement programs that will enrich and strengthen individual knowledge and understanding of scholarship and/or university teaching for faculty members with regular appointments. Applications are reviewed first by the college; there will be a November 30 CLA deadline for applications for Single Quarter Leaves. CLA will then forward its recommendations to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs for final review in early January. Direct questions about the CLA review process to the Faculty Affairs Office 624-9839. When available, application materials will be distributed to each department.

CLA National Fellowship Supplements. The NFS program is designed to make feasible acceptance of major, if relatively low-paying, fellowships such as those from Guggenheim, NEH and ACLS. This program is available to regular, tenure-track faculty who successfully compete for major national fellowships in non-sabbatical years. It provides up to 50% of academic-year base salary total with the fellowship no more than 100% of the academic salary. Faculty members must be nominated by their department chairs, in a letter to the Dean, which should be submitted as soon as possible after the application for the external fellowship has been transmitted. External

General

Guggenheim Fellowships. Fellowships are awarded to scholars of high intellectual and personal qualifications who have already demonstrated unusual capacity for productive scholarship or unusual creative ability in the arts. The Fellows are usually between 30 and 45 years old, but there are no age limits. Appointments are ordinarily made for one year, but in no case for a period shorter than 6 consecutive months. Amounts of grants are adjusted to the needs of the Fellows; teachers receiving sabbatical leave on full or part sabbatical salary are eligible for appointment. Guggenheim fellowships may not be held concurrently with other fellowships. In a marked decrease in funding levels, in 1990 the Foundation awarded 143 fellowships for a total of \$3,765,000 (an average grant of \$26,329). Despite the decline in fellowships awarded, the number of applicants increased slightly to 3,218. Deadline for application for 1991 fellowships is **October 1, 1990**. American Philosophical Society. The APS grants about \$400,000 a year in support for scholarly research in all areas of knowledge. Approximately 700 applications are reviewed each year; about 30% of applicants receive funding. Grants may cover living costs while away from home; microfilms, photostats and photographs; consumable supplies; and necessary foreign and domestic travel. The maximum grant that will be made for a full professor is \$3,000; up to \$4,000 for others, in keeping with APS's long-standing practice to encourage research by younger and less well-established scholars. The APS will also consider making supplemental grants for travel if an applicant has received other grants (e.g., NEH, Guggenheim, SSRC) that do not include travel that is necessary to the applicant's research program. Deadlines for applying are: **August 1, December 1, February 1, April 1**. Decisions are made within three months. Kellogg National Fellowship Program. This program provides opportunities for qualified professionals in academic, public or private sector settings to stretch their perspectives, explore new interdisciplinary pathways, and develop a richer knowledge and experience background. The goal is to prepare people for expanded leadership roles in a society where issues grow more complex each year. Awards of up to \$35,000 for a three-year period, plus 12 1/2 % of annual salary (not to exceed a total for three years of \$20,000) will be made to up to 50 people who have leadership potential. Fellows will then carry out nondegree, interdisciplinary, self-directed activities to take them beyond the confines of their profession. They will also participate in

Foundation-sponsored seminars to explore a wide variety of problems and issues to develop leadership skills. (These fellowships are not awarded for pursuit of basic research or to complete a degree.) The deadline is December 14. Applications must be submitted through the University Graduate School, which has additional information, or contact Kellogg National Fellowship Program, W.K. Bush Leadership Fellows Program. This program seeks accomplished, motivated individuals who are eager to prepare for greater leadership responsibilities within their professions and communities. Approximately 40 awards will be made for academic training, internship training or both. Applicants, who must be between the ages of 28 and 54, are selected on the basis of personal strengths, intellect, involvement in the community, and ability to articulate goals and plans for the future. For fellowships lasting from four to 18 months, the deadline is November 30, 1990. For shorter fellowships, lasting from three to 10 weeks, the deadline is February 28, 1991. American Institute of Indian Studies Short-term Postdoctoral Grants for Research in India. AIIS has recently announced a short-term grant competition for 1991-92. The deadline is November 1, 1990, earlier than in previous years. Awards are designed for support of research projects that will take from one to four months. Fulbright-Hays Faculty Research Fellowships Abroad. The Department of Education is seeking applications under Fulbright-Hays training grant programs, including faculty research abroad, and doctoral dissertation research abroad. About \$690,000 will be available for 25 three- to 12-month faculty research fellowships averaging \$28,000 each; and \$1.5 million for 85 doctoral dissertation research awards averaging \$17,500 each. The application deadline will be October 29, 1990. Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad. This program has similar objectives and emphases as the one, above, but is designed for groups of faculty and students doing research abroad. FIPSE Comprehensive Program. The Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) has announced its 1991 general competition for new awards to increase access to and strengthen higher education. Preapplications will be due October 16, 1990. Final applications, by invitation only, will be due March 1, 1991. Priorities for this round include: strengthening undergraduate curricula; improving retention and completion rates; developing a "learning friendly" campus ethos; improving international education; reforming teacher education; upgrading graduate education; stimulating education financing reform; developing education for a changing economy and devising educational uses of technology. Luce Scholars Program. The Luce Foundation invites two nominations from the University of Minnesota for non-Asian specialist young scholars to be Luce Scholars, for a year of intensive internship work in businesses or public agencies in Asia. Nominees must be less than 30 years old, have no prior exposure to Asian studies, demonstrate leadership capacity, and have attained at least a B.A. degree. The fellowship is not to be used for study, research or teaching but, instead, provides the equivalent of a paid internship for a year of work in Asia, through contacts the Luce Foundation makes on behalf of fellows. The purpose is to expose young scholars to Asian affairs. Junior members of the faculty, or graduate students, may be nominated. Application is through the Graduate School,

Humanities and Fine Arts

American Council of Learned Societies 1990-1991 Fellowships and Grants. The general programs of the ACLS support postdoctoral research in the humanities; research in the social sciences with a predominantly humanistic emphasis will also be considered. The Ph.D. or its equivalent is required. Younger scholars and independent scholars are encouraged to apply. The Area Programs, sponsored jointly by the Social Science Research Council, support postdoctoral and predoctoral research and study in the humanities and social sciences. All programs administered by ACLS require U.S. citizenship or permanent residence. Additional information or application forms may be obtained by writing to the address below; requests for application forms must include the following information: citizenship or permanent residence, highest academic degree received, academic or other position, field of specialization, proposed subject of study, period of time for which support is requested, and the specific program under which application is contemplated. ACLS Fellowships for research in the humanities. Six to 12 months of support between July 1, 1991 and December 31, 1992. Maximum award: \$15,000. **Deadline: October 1, 1990.**

ACLS Research Fellowships for Recent Recipients of the Ph.D. for research in the humanities for applicants whose Ph.D. will have been conferred between January 1, 1988 and December 31, 1990. Same tenure as above. Maximum award: \$10,000. **Deadline: October 1, 1990.**

ACLS Grants-in-Aid to support expenses of humanistic research in progress. Grants to be expended between April 15, 1991 and April 15, 1992. Maximum award: \$3,000. **Deadline: December 14, 1990.**

ACLS Grants for Travel to International Meetings for scholars in humanistic disciplines to participate in international meetings held outside North America. This program has been temporarily suspended due to lack of funding.

Fellowships for Postdoctoral Research in Chinese and East European Studies. Up to \$25,000 is provided for six to twelve months of research or writing between July 1, 1991 and September 1, 1992. **Deadline: November 15, 1990.**

George A. and Eliza Gardner Howard Foundation Fellowships. The Foundation awards a limited number of fellowships for independent projects in fields selected on a rotational basis each year. For 1990-91, applications will be accepted in Creative Writing and Literary Criticism. The program is focused on younger people in mid-career whose work to date is evidence of their promise, normally at the rank of assistant or associate professor. Application is by nomination by the College of Liberal Arts only (the college can nominate two candidates). The internal deadline to apply for nomination will be October 15, 1990. National Humanities Center Fellowships. October 15 is the deadline for applications for 1991-1992 residency fellowships at the NHC. These fellowships are available to scholars in all fields of the humanities, and also in fields normally associated with the social sciences and arts, as long as proposed work has a humanistic dimension. The program is open both to scholars of demonstrated achievement as well as to younger scholars (up to ten years beyond the Ph.D.) who plan to work at the NHC for an academic year. Applicants submit the Center's form, a curriculum vitae, a 1000-word project proposal, and three letters of recommendation. NEH Research Conferences. This program has a single annual deadline, January 15. This is a significant change and requires careful adjustment in planning research conferences that might be appropriate projects for NEH support. Grants may not begin until October 1 of the application year, and it is strongly recommended that the actual conference not be planned earlier than a year from the application deadline. In other words, to seek support for a conference that will take place between January and December 1992, you must apply by January 15, 1991. Program objectives are to advance the state of research in a field or topic of major importance in the humanities. ORD has program descriptions and application forms. Proposal drafts may be submitted for staff review at any time, but no later than six to eight weeks before the January 15 deadline.

J. Paul Getty Postdoctoral Fellowships in the History of Art and the Humanities. This program is designed to advance the discipline of art history by supporting the work of outstanding young scholars who show promise of making a substantial and original contribution to the history of the visual arts. Fifteen postdoctoral fellowships are available in 1992-92 for those who have received their Ph.D. degree within the past six years. Senior research grants are awarded to scholars, particularly teams working on a collaborate projects. Scholars of all nationalities may apply. Most grants are between \$2,000 and \$250,000. **Deadline: November 9, 1990**. NEH 1990 Younger Scholars Awards. November 1, 1990 will be the deadline for this program, providing support to college students below the senior year conducting research or writing a paper under the close supervision of a humanities scholar. Awardees are expected to work full-time for nine weeks on these projects. Awards are \$2,200 for college students; each stipend includes \$400 for the project advisor. Harvard Mellon Humanities Faculty Fellowships. Harvard University will award at least 11 one-year Faculty Fellowships in the Humanities in fields ranging from Afro-American studies to visual and environmental studies. Applications are encouraged from scholars working on significant interdisciplinary projects. Applicants must have received the Ph.D. prior to June 30, 1989 and have completed, at the time of appointment, at least two years post-doctoral teaching in the humanities at the college or university level. Rockefeller Foundation Fellowships in the Humanities. For 1991-92, fellowships will be offered as year-long residencies at host institutions selected for their potential to promote individual scholarship in the humanities. Each institution selects scholars to receive Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship stipends. Fellowships support research that furthers understanding of contemporary social and cultural issues and extends international or intercultural scholarship. The Foundation seeks to promote the interdisciplinary dialogue that is the hallmark of new scholarship in these areas, provide outstanding resources to individual scholars, and fortify the institutions that are advancing this work.

The 24 residency sites and application deadline for each are listed below. (There will be six new institutions in 1991-94.) Applications are submitted directly to the host institution. Social and Behavioral Sciences

Social Science Research Council. Grants for Advanced International Research.

Grants are available for periods usually ranging from two months to one year to individuals with Ph.D. degrees or equivalent research experience for research in the humanities or social sciences. These programs are designed to support research in one country, comparative research between countries in an area, and comparative research between areas. Grants may be used for travel, research, and maintenance expenses. Program areas include: Africa, Japan, Korea, Latin American and the Caribbean, the Near and Middle East, Russia and the Soviet Union, South Asia, and Southeast Asia. Grant amounts and desired focus vary according to the program; ORD has additional information. The deadline in all cases is December 1.

Advanced Research Fellowships in Foreign Policy Studies. These support up to two years of research on the processes of U.S. foreign policy making, including examination of forces and institutions that are not the typical focus in this area: Comparative studies of policy-making processes; analysis of influences of institutions, groups or broad societal forces on these processes; use of theories and insights from diverse social science disciplines. The program permits--but does not require--fellows to acquire additional training through formal course work, tutorials, or supervised study. Awards will not exceed \$35,000. Deadline for applications is December 1.

Also note the following SSRC program, initiated in the last year:

Public Policy Research on Contemporary Hispanic Issues, providing postdoctoral fellowships, public policy fellowships, and a summer workshop on statistical research methods. Its purpose is to encourage the development of theory and research on the Hispanic population that can inform public policy debates and initiatives affecting the population. It is also designed to increase the research capacity of Hispanic scholars. Postdoctoral fellowships are available to scholars who have completed the Ph.D. within the last seven years. A \$24,000 stipend is provided for up to two years of full-time research and writing. The application **deadline** is January 16, 1991. National Science Foundation/National Research Council Minority and Graduate Fellowships. Through the NRC, the NSF provides fellowships for graduate students and minority graduate students. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or nationals, college seniors, first-year graduate students or others who have completed only a limited amount of graduate study. A \$13,500 stipend is provided, for twelve-months of study and tuition waiver. Fellowships are awarded for study and research leading to master's or doctoral degrees in the mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, including the history and philosophy of science. The **deadline** for both the minority and graduate fellowships is **November 9, 1990**. Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues Grants. This program supports scientific research in social problem areas not likely to receive support from traditional sources. Recently, social problem areas have included such topics as rights of children, homelessness in America, family preservation, stereotyping in society, attitudes in the workplace, domestic violence, and cross-cultural values. Proposals are encouraged that involve uniquely timely research opportunities, underrepresented institutions and new investigators. Grants of up to \$1,000 are available. **Deadlines** are **December 1, 1990 and April 1, 1991**. For additional information, contact: Society for Psychological Study of Social Issues, P.O. Social Science Congressional Fellowships. Several professional associations provide Washington fellowships for scholars with the Ph.D., in social science disciplines, providing four-month to one-year residencies in Washington, to facilitate work on public policy and interdisciplinary implications of the professions. Congressional fellowships may include research, briefings, speechwriting, and communication with lobbyists or constituents:

American Anthropological Association Congressional fellows are placed with a congressional staff for a ten-month period, beginning in November. A \$25,000 stipend is provided. American Historical Association and the Library of Congress jointly sponsor the J. Franklin Jameson Fellowship in American History to support scholarly research in the library collections. American Political Science Association Congressional fellows work in Washington for 10 months, including an orientation, two office assignments, speakers and activities related to various areas of government. Fellows, who have completed the Ph.D. in the last 15 years, receive a \$20,000 stipend and travel allowances. Application **deadline** is **December 1, 1990**. IV. TRENDS AND PROFILES

Changes in NSF Proposal Review System. In response to concerns about its review process, NSF has made three important changes, that will now provide: 1) an opportunity for investigators to suggest names of persons who should not be asked to review their proposals; 2) additional information to PIs whose proposals have been declined about the context and reasons for the declination; and, 3) guidance for PIs and their institutions who wish to request reconsideration of declined proposals on the basis of the substance, as well as the process, of the review.

More than two-thirds of proposals to NSF are declined, often for budgetary or programmatic reasons that are not directly connected to the scientific merit of the proposal. These new policies should assist applicants in revising proposals that will be more competitive, making it even more important than before to plan on resubmitting proposals that are not successful the first or even second time.

Debt for Development Coalition. A new organization, funded with \$400,000 from the U.S. agency for International Development, plans to clear obstacles that have impeded "debt swaps" that might support work on Third World development. The Coalition, including the National Association of Universities and Land Grant Colleges, an association of AID-funded environmental organizations, and smaller coalitions promoting Third World Development, will advance the concept that banks can convert their debt into philanthropic efforts by: networking among top managers of U.S. banks; selling Third World governments on the advantages of working with U.S. nonprofits; giving technical assistance to interested nonprofits; and asking Congress for new tax incentives that will make the swaps more attractive. It is estimated that U.S. universities and nonprofits could handle \$60 billion in debt, that could be given by banks as a charitable donation or purchased from banks from a third party at a deep discount. These funds could be used in such capacity-building projects as boosting agricultural capabilities, or working on eradicating parasitic diseases.

Corporate and Foundation Proposals at the University. The University Foundation continues to work to develop and maintain a more accurate view of contributions from these important sources to research, teaching and other activities. A database has been set up to compile corporate and foundation proposals and awards, and information about foundation personnel, objectives, and links to the University of Minnesota. Part of this effort has been the development of a "tracking list" of major national and local foundations in which the University has special interests or concerns, or that themselves have requested central University ranking and/or clearance of proposals. Although we should know about any contact you have with all foundations, it is particularly important that you let us know if you have plans to work with those listed below.

Resource Reminders:

CLA Research Development Fund. Funds are available to assist in the development of proposals for external funding. Support is offered for costs of photocopying proposals, postage, travel to discuss proposals with agency representatives, and other activities related to proposal preparation. Contact ORD for additional information and application instructions.

New ORTTA Resource. Much of the information from ORTTA, previously included in the monthly Research Review newsletter, is now accessible through the University's public access computer bulletin board, including such topics as up-to-date fringe benefit rates, deadline information, SPIN indices and search ordering, the NIH Guide, and much more. The October Research Review includes access instructions.

SPIN Searches. The new ORTTA bulletin board makes it easy for faculty with access to computers to request SPIN searches. Please remember that CLA's Office of Research Development also has direct access to SPIN, too (as well as to other funding guides), and can construct specialized searches for CLA faculty seeking information about potential external sources of funding for research, curriculum development, or training programs.

II. FUNDING NOTES

Internal

Office of International Education Development Grants. Grants may cover: establishment of collaborative research, training or service; educational exchanges of faculty; completion of individual research of an international nature; curriculum development; international seminars and other programs held at the University of Minnesota or involving international scholars outside the University; participation in international professional conferences held outside the U.S. Applications are due February 15 for April, May, and June activities; May 15 for July, August, and September

activities. Information and application forms are available from the OIE Development Grant Coordinator, 624-5580.

Bush Sabbatical Program. Supplementary sabbatical income is provided for mid-career faculty who seek to integrate research and undergraduate teaching. Tenured faculty who have not received a Bush fellowship before, and who are eligible for a regular University Sabbatical Furlough may apply. CLA has established a November 30 deadline for its internal review. The college then forwards its recommendations to the Office of Educational Development Programs to meet a January 11, 1991 deadline. Information about the CLA review process is available in the Faculty Affairs office, 624-9839; application forms and additional information about the program are available from the Academic Affairs office, 624-6556.

Single Quarter Leave. This program is designed to advance special studies, research, scholarly writing, and self-improvement programs that will enrich and strengthen individual knowledge and understanding of scholarship and/or university teaching for faculty members with regular appointments. Applications are reviewed first by the college; November 30 will be the CLA deadline for applications for Single Quarter Leaves. After its review, the college will then forward its recommendations to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs for final review in early January. For questions about the CLA review process, call the Faculty Affairs Office 624-9839; application materials have been distributed to each department.

CLA National Fellowship Supplements. CLA faculty are encouraged to request nomination by their department chairs for supplements to major national fellowships they may receive during a non-sabbatical year. This program provides up to 50% of base salary, to total with the fellowship no more than 100% of salary. This should make it easier for faculty to apply for and accept major fellowships even in years when they would not be eligible for a sabbatical. A request should be made as soon as the external application has been submitted. For additional information contact ORD or the Dean's office, 624-9839.

Minnesota Supercomputer Institute Resource Grants. The MSI provides research grants for computer time on the supercomputers of the Institute. These grants are awarded on the basis of competitive review. For projects beginning July 1, 1991, the application deadline is April 15, 1991. In addition, research scholarships are offered for postdoctoral associates or visits by senior researchers. The deadline for these funds is January 15, 1991. General

American Philosophical Society. The APS grants about \$400,000 a year in support for scholarly research in all areas of knowledge. Approximately 700 applications are reviewed each year; about 30% of applicants receive funding. Grants may cover living costs while away from home; microfilms, photostats and photographs; consumable supplies; and necessary foreign and domestic travel. The maximum grant that will be made for a full professor is \$3,000; up to \$4,000 for others, in keeping with APS's long-standing practice to encourage research by younger and less well-established scholars. The APS will also consider making supplemental grants for travel if an applicant has received other grants (e.g., NEH, Guggenheim, SSRC) that do not include travel that is necessary to the applicant's research program. Deadlines for applying are: August 1,

Kellogg National Fellowship Program. This program provides opportunities for qualified professionals in academic, public or private sector settings to stretch their perspectives, explore new interdisciplinary pathways, and develop a richer knowledge and experience background. The goal is to prepare people for expanded leadership roles in a society where issues grow more complex each year. Awards of up to \$35,000 for a three-year period, plus 12 1/2 % of annual salary (not to exceed a total for three years of \$20,000) will be made to up to 50 people who have leadership potential. Fellows will then carry out nondegree, interdisciplinary, self-directed activities to take them beyond the confines of their profession. They will also participate in Foundation-sponsored seminars to explore a wide variety of problems and issues to develop leadership skills. (These fellowships are not awarded for pursuit of basic research or to complete a degree.) The external deadline is December 14, but applications must be submitted through the University Graduate School and are due there on December 10, 1990. Bush Leadership Fellows Program. This program seeks accomplished, motivated individuals who are eager to prepare for greater leadership responsibilities within their professions and communities. Approximately 40 awards will be made for academic training, internship training or both. Applicants, who must be between the ages of 28 and 54, are selected on the basis of personal strengths, intellect, involvement in the community, and ability to articulate goals and plans for the future. MacArthur Foundation Research and Writing Grants for Individuals. Grantees have included scholars, journalists, policy analysts, and others interested in approaches which move beyond disciplinary boundaries and which are currently underfunded. Younger women and men and non-U.S. researchers are especially encouraged to apply. Grants range from \$10,000 to \$60,000 for an individual application and up to \$120,000 for a two-person project. Social Science Research Council. Grants for Advanced International Research. Program areas include: Africa, Japan, Korea, Latin American and the Caribbean, the Near and Middle East, Russia and the Soviet Union, South Asia, and Southeast Asia. Grant amounts and desired focus vary according to the program; ORD has additional information. The deadline in all cases is **December 1.**

Advanced Research Fellowships in Foreign Policy Studies. These support up to two years of research on the processes of U.S. foreign policy making, including examination of forces and institutions that are not the typical focus in this area: Comparative studies of policy-making processes; analysis of influences of institutions, groups or broad societal forces on these processes; use of theories and insights from diverse social science disciplines. The program permits--but does not require--fellows to acquire additional training through formal course work, tutorials, or supervised study. Awards will not exceed \$35,000. Deadline for applications is **December 1.**

Also note the following SSRC program, initiated in the last year:

Public Policy Research on Contemporary Hispanic Issues, providing postdoctoral fellowships, public policy fellowships, and a summer workshop on statistical research methods. Its purpose is to encourage the development of theory and research on the Hispanic population that can inform public policy debates and initiatives affecting the population. It is also designed to increase the research capacity of Hispanic scholars. Postdoctoral fellowships are available to scholars who have completed the Ph.D. within the last seven years. A \$24,000 stipend is provided for up to two years of full-time research and writing. The application deadline is January 16, 1991. For additional information, contact the SSRC at the address below.

Harry Frank Guggenheim Foundation. This foundation sponsors an international program of scientific research and scholarly study concerning, in Mr. Guggenheim's words, "Man's Relation to Man." Its long-term aim is to improve the human social condition through a better understanding of the causes and consequence of dominance, aggression, and violence. Grants are made to individuals for individual projects, either through an institution on behalf of the researcher, or directly to the individual. Most awards range from \$15,000 to \$25,000 for periods of one or two years. Applications are due February 1, 1991 for a decision by June. IV. PROFILES AND TRENDS

Congress Boosts Agency Budgets. As we go to press, the federal FY 1991 budget process has just ended with passage of all major appropriation bills. Spending increases for education, health and social service grants are part of a compromises bill for the chief federal funding agencies. In addition, a five-year deficit reduction budget plan will end the months-long fiscal crisis and avoid the mid-year program cuts that investigators had been warned to expect. The Education Department received an 11 percent increase to \$27.4 billion, including an extra 13 percent for FIPSE, a total allocation of \$92 million, and an extra \$5 million for international education (see story, below). NSF and NEH will receive comparable increases, too. Funds will increase for research across HHS: NIH will receive \$8.3 billion, an increase of almost 10 percent, targeted primarily to raise the number of new and competing grants (to about 6,000). And, within ADAMHA, NIMH will get an 18 percent increase in research funding, and the NIDA will receive a boost of 17 percent.

Arts Hot Line. The American Council for the Arts is developing an arts hotline that will provide toll-free information serving visual artists nationally. Beginning this October, visual artists can call from anywhere in the United States and reach the Arts Resource Consortium Library. Staff will match interests of callers with a database of information resources on funding, housing, insurance, health and law. The database includes foundation and government funding programs, arts council programs, arts service organizations and others who provide information, technical assistance or other services to visual artists. The toll-free number is 1-800-232-2789.

Federal Support for International Education Programs To Expand. Despite administration efforts over the past decade to eliminate U.S. Department of Education international programs, it appears that international efforts will be revitalized. Possible new initiatives include a clearing-house for information on Eastern Europe that could promote student and faculty exchanges. Currently, about \$40 million is allocated to international education; the most current Senate appropriate bill calls for an increase of \$7 million for FY 1992. Department of Education officials have not yet defined exactly what it will do, or what niche it hopes to fill in international education efforts, although interest is particularly strong in strengthening study-abroad programs.

Social and Behavioral Science Reorganization at NSF. A new NSF advisory committee on social and behavioral sciences -- the Task Force Looking to the 21st Century -- has begun to examine the need to restructure NSF's Biological, Behavioral, and Social Sciences (BBS) directorate. The task force will consider a separate directorate for social and behavioral sciences, prompted by recent ups and downs in funding for social sciences. Increased attention has been called for in areas including: economics research, specifically within the context of global environmental change, cognition, political science, and anthropology. A final report from the task force is due on April 1, 1991.

NIMH Renews Interest in Social Science Research. The National Institute of Mental Health has renewed interest in funding social science research, despite the agency's major emphasis on the neurosciences. Agency officials believe that the social sciences have a significant role to play under NIMH's current priorities, including brain-related disorders, child and adolescent mental health, and treatment of the chronically and severely mentally ill. Potential research areas encompass epidemiology, mental health services research and financing issues, research on attitudes and behaviors, and studies relating to minorities and special populations. In fiscal year 1989 NIMH research grants in sociology-related areas totaled about \$30.4 million, with grants to sociologists alone totaling almost \$18 million.

National Endowment for the Humanities: Summer Seminars for College Teachers. March 1, 1991 is the deadline to apply to direct a summer seminar in 1992. This program provides support for six- to eight-week seminars in which college teachers can enrich their knowledge of the subjects they teach, work with distinguished scholars and with other college teachers who share similar interests, and undertake an individual project. Seminars are characterized by the scholarly and teaching quality of their directors, the breadth and appeal of the seminar topics to teachers of undergraduate students, the significance of the topics to the humanities, and their promise of engendering collegiality and promoting intellectual stimulation for participants.

Prospective directors are strongly encouraged to discuss their proposed seminars with NEH staff well before the application deadline. Full-year fellowships have been awarded by the National Endowment for the Humanities to two CLA faculty members: John Archer (Humanities) for a project on "Architecture and Culture: The Eighteenth-Century English Villa," and Luise White (History) for work on "Blood and Fire: Popular Culture and Local History in East and Central Africa." Professor Archer will also receive support from the American Institute of Indian Studies for field research in South Asia as part of his larger project.

Kent Bales (English) and Michael Paige (OIE) have received a \$35,000 grant from the USIA for a reciprocal student exchange program with Hungary.

Luther Gerlach (Anthropology) has been awarded \$30,000 by the Weyerhauser Family Foundation for a project on ecological interdependence: A Study of Wetlands and Wildfowl Management.

Allen Isaacman (History) was awarded an advanced research grant for international research by the African Studies Committee of the Social Science Research Council for a study of commodity production, rural differentiation and peasant protest in colonial Mozambique.

Gordon Legge (Psychology) received the 1990 Glenn A. Fry Award of the American Academy of Optometry, for research contributions in the area of vision.

IV. TRENDS AND PROFILES

NIH Considers Draft Plan to Reduce Research Costs. In mid-December, the National Institutes of Health began debate on steps designed to restrain biomedical research costs and stabilize funding. Designed to meet Congressional criticisms that the NIH annual budget has increased while the number of new research projects funded has decreased, the plan would weigh more heavily total grant costs and program priorities in funding decisions, although scientific merit would remain the chief factor. Congress set a goal of 6,000 new and 24,000 continuing research project grants for NIH over the next four years.

To ease multiyear commitments and free money for new awards, legislators urged shortening grants and giving more weight to project costs during review. At the same time, however, NIH was told to end the practice of making across-the-board cuts in reviewer-recommended grant levels. NIH staff have been instructed to find other ways to achieve grant quotas and to hold annual grant increases to 4 percent.

The draft plan would also:

- *Limit the average length of research project grants to four years;
- *Implement cost management measures tying the average cost of research project grant increases to the biomedical research inflation index;
- *Abolish the category of approved but unfunded applications. Only applications meriting funding would receive scores and percentile rankings and proceed to second-level review;
- *Increase research training funds more than 3 percent a year if possible, but not at the expense of training stipend increases;
- *Base growth of research centers on available appropriations rather than on an arbitrary ceiling on the number of centers;
- *Seek approval to keep the same indirect cost rate for all years of support.

Critics fear that the plan may threaten the peer review system, which has historically assessed only the scientific and technical merit of applications. By factoring in project costs, it is suggested, this plan raises the specter of a "bidding war" in which the cheapest grants would stand the best chance of funding. Moreover, such steps could lead to funding smaller and shorter grants simply because they cost less, with resulting "salami-style" grant-writing, bite-sized programs and bad science.

The plan is expected to be completed for congressional review in the spring. (FGC Weekly, December 24, 1990)

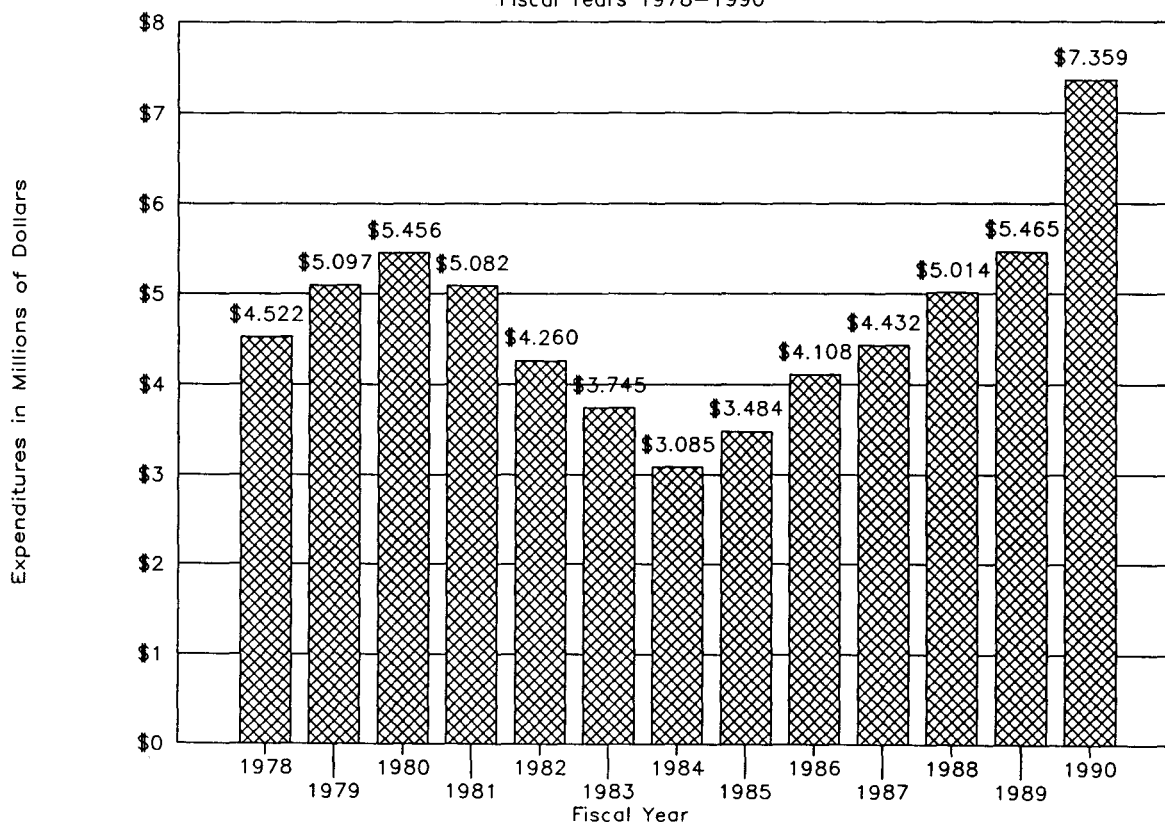
I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

College of Liberal Arts Sees Upward Trend in Externally Funded Activities.

Latest figures show that CLA faculty continue to increase their activities supported by external grants. As the graph, below, illustrates, the total sponsored expenditures for 1990 increased by 34.6% over the amount spent in 1989, to \$7,359,480. This is considered the most accurate measure of externally funded activities. Looking ahead, we are also pleased to report that for the period between July 1 and December 31, 1990, CLA faculty have received \$4,540,872 in grant awards, a 36.9% increase over the same period last year.

Small, But Important: PHS Proposal Type Size. NIH has recently issued a clarification on type size in PHS 398 applications, the standard form used for applications to all NIH institutes, ADAMHA agencies, and others. Since proposals not conforming to these requirements will be returned, and because it would be difficult to make changes at the last minute against a tight deadline, it is important to follow the instructions: the face page must have type density of 10 characters per inch. For the rest of the proposal, type must be standard size, which is 10 to 12 points. If constant spacing is used, there should be no more than 15 characters per inch; if proportional spacing is used, it should average 15 characters per inch. And, there should be no more than six lines of text in each vertical inch.

Fringe Benefit Rate Change. Substantial increases in fringe benefit rates for university employees have recently been proposed to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. These estimated rates must be used when calculating grant budgets since the college will not receive additional funds to cover unbudgeted fringe benefit charges. The new rates are as follows:

Since the rates for the period from July 1 are much higher than those used when grant proposals were submitted in the past year, care must be taken when awards are made to assure that the additional costs will be covered within the grant. Colleges have received no additional funds to cover these increased costs. Future changes will be announced in ORTTA's Research Review and on their on-line bulletin board. Humanities and Fine Arts

National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships for University Teachers.

June 1 is the annual deadline to apply for fellowships that provide junior and senior scholars with six to twelve months' support (a maximum stipend of \$30,000) for advanced study or research in history, philosophy, languages, linguistics, literature, archaeology, jurisprudence, the history, theory and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion, and aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches. Work supported by NEH Fellowships may contribute to scholarly knowledge, to the conception and substance of individual courses in the humanities, or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Projects may address broad topics or focus on research in a specialized field. Applications are evaluated according to the quality of the applicant's work as a teacher, scholar, or interpreter of the humanities; the significance of the contribution the proposed project will make to thought and knowledge in the applicant's field and to the humanities generally; the conception, definition, organization, and description of the proposed project; and the likelihood that the applicant will complete the project. National Endowment for the Humanities Research Division Texts Program.

June 1 is also the deadline for two grant lines in this program:

Translations. Support is provided for individual or collaborative projects to translate into English works that provide insight into the history, literature, philosophy, and artistic achievements of other cultures and that make available to scholars, students, teachers, and the public the thought and learning of those civilizations. Applications may propose to translate from any language, and the texts to be translated may be either primary sources or secondary works. Eligible projects include translations of significant single works, the complete works of a writer or school, and collections or anthologies. Applications must demonstrate that the texts to be produced will be of value to a diverse audience but are not likely to be commercially profitable. Awards are made for up to three years, and usually range from \$3,500 to \$100,000 per year.

Editions. Grants in this category support various stages in the preparation of authoritative and annotated editions of works and documents of significant value to humanities scholars and general readers. Support is provided for projects that make available important texts and documents that have been either previously unavailable or accessible only in seriously flawed editions. Applicants must demonstrate that the form (printed, microform, or a combination) proposed for the edition represents the most effective means of disseminating the material. Awards are made for up to three years and usually range from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

Wenner Gren Foundation for Anthropological Research. The Wenner-Gren Foundation supports research in all branches of anthropology, including cultural/social anthropology, ethnology, biological/physical anthropology, archeology, and anthropological linguistics, as well as closely related disciplines concerned with human origins, development and variation. Grants up to \$10,000 are available for basic research in these areas. The Foundation is interested in seeding innovative approaches and ideas, and in encouraging aid from other funding agencies; it particularly invites projects employing comparative perspectives or integrating two or more subfields of anthropology. Its grant program includes:

For the future, we may expect to see significant changes in Fulbright programs, based on recommendations of a presidentially appointed panel. In a report issued in February, more funds were requested for the program which has been expanding activities without sufficient increases in funding. Further, the report says too much emphasis has been put on exchanges with many countries; instead, more financial support should be offered to scholars working in a smaller range of countries. It also recommends that the number of awards for students be increased, and that the two kinds of awards for faculty--teaching and research--be merged, and awarded on the basis of research proposals. (Chronicle of Higher Education, February 27, 1991).

IV. PROFILES AND TRENDS

FY 1992 Federal Budget Prospects. Within a "hold-the-line" budget plan, the administration has submitted a proposal to Congress that would still expand competitive grant opportunities in research and selected health and education areas. The National Science Foundation, for example, would gain 17.5%, including increases of 13% for biology and behavioral sciences to 23% for computer sciences. The NIH would see an overall 6 percent increase, but research project grants would grow almost 9 percent, and would fund 5,785 new and competing research project grants, the same number as this year. In the administration budget, the National Endowment for the Humanities would receive a 5 percent increase to \$178 million but, reflecting recent controversies over art and obscenity, the budget of the National Endowment for the Arts would stay level at \$174 million. This would be first time that the budget of NEH surpassed that of NEA. In the coming months, as the federal budget process works its way through Congressional appropriations committees, all of these figures may be subject to considerable changes.

Science education is a high priority, with \$225 million allocated across several agencies, and 28% of the increase going to precollege programs. Even agencies that traditionally have funded mainly graduate and postgraduate research training will be part of the plan, including NIH and ADAMHA, where plans are underway for a new grant program for kindergarten through twelfth-grade science education. NSF will be at the center of the coordinating effort, working with the Department of Education toward systematic science and math education reform. (Information from Federal Grants and Contracts, New York Times)

NSF Plans to Restructure Biological, Behavioral and Social Science Directorate. A task force appointed to review the structure and future of NSF's BBS Directorate will recommend in an interim report that a separate directorate of Social, Economic and Psychological Sciences (SEPS) be established. It would encompass economics, geography, law, linguistics, political science, psychology, sociology, and related disciplines. It would also include interdisciplinary fields such as cognitive science and decision, risk and management sciences. The placement of anthropology, however, remains undecided, as some agreed that it should remain with biological sciences, while others recommended that it be moved to the new SEPS directorate. Anthropologists will determine their eventual home. Unresolved issues include the placement of some kinds of neuroscience and information, robotics and intelligent systems research which may be moved to SEPS. Final recommendations are due later this year, but it will not be until 1993 that the structural changes are completed. (COSSA Washington Update)

I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Thanks: To everyone who responded to our request for information for our CLA Awards Database project. It is not too late to return your printouts if you have not already done so. Please contact us if you have any questions.

Congratulations: To CLA faculty who have made this year, not yet over, the most productive -- in terms of external awards received -- ever. Cumulatively, from July 1 through March 31, 1991, CLA has received 81 awards for \$6,454,928. This is a 9.5% increase in the number of awards over the same period last year; it is a 41.5% increase in the dollar amount awarded! We project that total awards for this year will be close to \$7 million, a record for the college. Please let us know if you would like a more detailed breakdown of these figures.

Sabbatical Planning: It is not too early to start looking for sources of sabbatical support for 1992-93. For instance, applications are due June 1, 1991 for NEH fellowships that can be used during that period. Other major fellowships typically used during a sabbatical include ACLS, Guggenheim, and Fulbright, all with deadlines in early fall 1991. A planning schedule should start with requests for application forms and information in mid-July, followed by submission of applications from mid-September to early October. The last application to submit could then be for the internal Bush sabbatical fellowship, due in late November. There may be other more specialized sources of support for your particular project; a place to start is our information brochure on funding sources for sabbaticals.

Guggenheim Fellowships. Fellowships are awarded to scholars of high intellectual and personal qualifications who have already demonstrated unusual capacity for productive scholarship or unusual creative ability in the arts. The Fellows are usually between 30 and 45 years old, but there are no age limits. Appointments are ordinarily made for one year, but in no case for a period shorter than 6 consecutive months. Amounts of grants are adjusted to the needs of the Fellows; teachers receiving sabbatical leave on full or part sabbatical salary are eligible for appointment. Guggenheim fellowships may not be held concurrently with other fellowships. (For 1991, the Foundation awarded 143 fellowships for a total of \$3.8 million. There were 3,092 applicants.) National Endowment for the Humanities Travel to Collections. NEH Summer Stipends for summer 1992 provide \$4,000 for college and university teachers to pursue two consecutive months in full-time study or research. NSF Faculty Awards for Women Scientists and Engineers. This program, new in 1990, is expected to continue in 1991-92, to recognize outstanding and promising women in academic careers of research and teaching, and facilitate the further development of their careers.

Applicants must be nominated by an appropriate official of their institution. There is no limit to the number of nominees from an institution, but there can be only one nominee per department per year. Nominees must be U.S. citizens, nationals or permanent residents, hold the Ph.D. degree in science or engineering, and be a tenured faculty member but not Full Professor when nominated.

In the first year of this program, awards consisted of an annual grant of \$50,000 per year for up to five years. Up to 100 awards were expected to be made. Institutions are also expected to make a significant commitment to the support of awardees, including full academic-year salary for the awardee.

As NSF continues to review the results of the 1990 competition, a firm application date for 1991-92 has not been set, but it is expected that it will be delayed until Spring 1992. IV. PROFILES AND TRENDS

Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. Under the direction of Charles Blitzer, who left the presidency of the National Humanities Center to become director two years ago, the Wilson Center has reaffirmed its emphasis on "pure" scholarship -- as contrasted with the more applied, social-policy related work done at many Washington think tanks. Created in 1968, the Center's purpose is to provide resident fellows with the many resources and contacts Washington can offer while, at the same time, allowing them to pursue a scholarly focus. With a \$10-million budget, 37 fellows are selected on a competitive basis to pursue a wide range of topics connected in some way to international scholarship; in 1990-91, projects ranged from Dutch painting from 1609-48 to armed forces in societies without wars.

Until recently scholars were asked to apply through one of six program areas: Asian, East and West European; International Studies; Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies; Latin American; and United States. However, this requirement has been eliminated as part of Blitzer's plans to encourage fellows work across these areas on themes such as ethnicity, federalism, and cities.

Fellowships, averaging \$36,000, to work at the Wilson Center have become increasingly competitive. Over the last two years alone, applications for the 37 spots have doubled from 404 to 750. The application deadline for 1992 residencies will be October 1, 1991. National Endowment for the Humanities: Trends and Opportunities. According to Richard Ekman, Director of the Division of Research at NEH, grantseekers should pay more attention to the "market dimensions of scholarship." Given concerns voiced by some in the humanities community about fragmentation and specialization of study, scholars should be aware of "bigger questions and broader phenomena" within which their projects are located. This is particularly important for those seeking support for the larger kinds of projects usually supported by the Research Division. Among areas of current interest at NEH are international studies, language programs (especially Japanese, Chinese, Arabic, and Russian).

He offers some advice on proposal strategies. 1) Seek preliminary staff reaction to a draft proposal. 2) Carefully select experts in your field for the readers you are asked to recommend. 3) Perhaps most important, write for the review panel--although you cannot find out who is on the panel, you can find out how it will be composed. Panelists are necessarily generalists, so a proposal must be written to lead readers to an understanding of its purpose and importance in a broad context. 4) If you are not successful, write for verbatim reviewers' and staff comments. Proposals that respond to these comments have a better chance the second time around.
