JUNIOR ALBUM OUT TODAY

The 1903 Gopher is a Record Breaker in Every Respect

Well, the Gopher is out at last, on time, too, which is a triumph in itself. But that is only the beginning. To say the thing in one sentence, it is about the prettiest little animal ever seen on the campus. Incidentally we may state that it is the largest ever known of its species and has cost the most to catch—about \$2900.

It sounds a bit peculiar—we had been looking forward to seeing this book for weeks, yet when we had it in our hands we almost hated to open it. But the reason was that we could hardly take our eyes off the cover. Japanese vellum, with back of green ooze calf and the lettering in three colors, red, green and gold, the effect is really dazzling.

Special attention has been given to Athletics. Dr. Williams himself, contributes "A Review of Minnesota Foot-

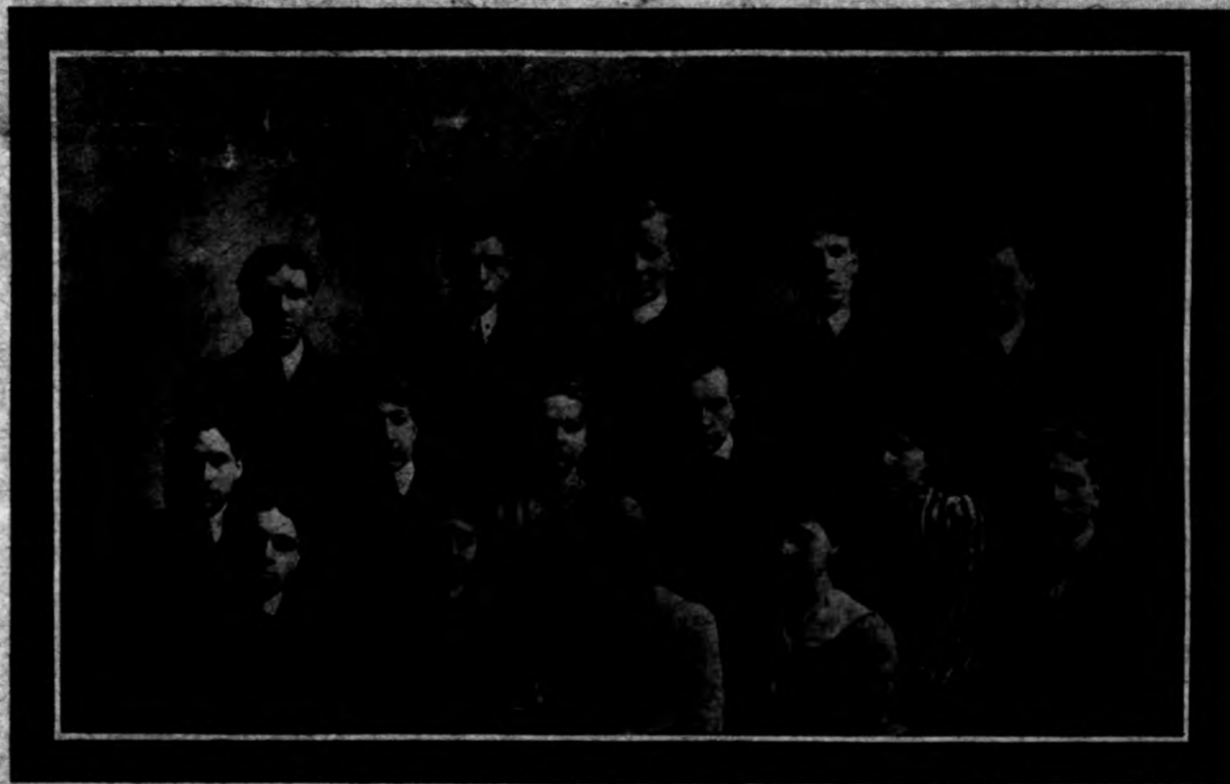
CUP PRESENTATION

Condition Examinations

The faculty of the college of science, literature and the arts, at its meeting last Saturday, voted that hereafter students conditioned in work of the first semester may have an opportunity to remove their conditions either at the end of the second semester or at the beginning of the first semester of the following year. And students conditioned in the work of the second semester may have an opportunity to remove their conditions at the beginning or end of the first semester of the following year, at the times regularly set by the program for such examinations. This means that if a student attempts the first examination, and fails, he shall not be allowed to try the next examination, but shall be held to take the work over in class as required in the case of failures.
