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DULUTH--The details of a ten year, \$15,095,000 UMD building program were revealed Saturday by Provost Raymond W. Darland.

The 35 point plan was presented to members of the Legislative Building Commission who toured the UMD campus Saturday as part of their visits to all state facilities. After the UMD sessions, the legislators visited the Arthur M. Clure Public Marine Terminal, inspected foreign ships and took a boat ride around the harbor.

Dr. Darland explained that the ten year plan recently was approved by the University of Minnesota Board of Regents and will be presented to the 1963 Minnesota Legislature.

"We believe this to be a sound, carefully thought out program of construction which will fulfill the campus needs of the 4,000 students we expect at UMD by 1970," Darland told the legislators. "It is imperative that we move along with our schedule in order to be able to adequately provide for this 25 per cent increase in enrollment."

Darland emphasized that the \$15,095,000 represents funds which the legislature will be asked to provide. Additional funds for dormitories, health service, a theatre and an auditorium will have to come from federal sources, gifts and grants.

The Provost also noted that \$1,461,000 was approved by the last legislature for construction of a Home Economics-General Purpose Classroom building (\$896,000), a Humanities building addition(\$505,000), and campus improvements(\$60,000). This money will not be made available unless Amendment #2 to the Minnesota Constitution is approved in the up-coming November election, he said.

Darland explained that Amendment #2 would eliminate what he called the archaic \$250,000 state debt limit. "The future of the entire state building program---including all UMD construction plans---is dependent on passage of this amendment," the Provost said.

Dr. Darland then spelled out the UMD building requests which will be presented at the next five sessions of the Minnesota Legislature.
