Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers have already been through enough ups and downs to last a normal season. But there is more in store just around the corner.

After playing a Siebert Field doubleheader Wednesday against St. Cloud State, the Gophers return to the Metrodome Friday night for a single game against Iowa State U. at 7:30 p.m., with two more games starting at 1 p.m. Saturday at Siebert Field against the Cyclones.

The "ups" thus far include Minnesota taking four early March games in the Dome against Ball State, and then showing its best finish ever, 2-2, at the Third Annual WHEATIES Tournament of Champions last weekend, also in the Dome.

The "downs" have to include dropping eight of 10 spring trip games in Texas and Arizona, even though the Gophers at one point led in seven of those losses, and then the 11-0 one-hit drubbing in an exhibition game before nearly 8,000 fans Monday evening against the American League Minnesota Twins.

However, there is no way in the world the Gophers are supposed to defeat a pro team, so the latter "down" is not all that disastrous.

This year's WHEATIES tournament was, by all measurements, outstanding. Nearly 11,000 fans were in attendance the three days and saw Team Cuba take the championship by defeating UCLA 3-0 in the title game.

Host Minnesota, which finished 1-3 in the first two years of its own tournament, this year recorded wins against defending champion Michigan (8-5) and the U. of Maine (13-4) offsetting losses to Team Cuba (5-2) and UCLA (2-0).

UCLA and Maine finished tied with the Gophers at 2-2 behind Team Cuba's 3-1 record with Michigan finishing fifth at 1-3.

Gopher senior catcher Mike Halloran and freshman second baseman Brian Raabe were both named to the WHEATIES All-Tournament team. It was the second straight year Halloran made the honor squad.

Raabe was one of the leading hitters in the tournament batting .538 on seven hits in 13 trips to the plate. He also scored five runs and did not make an error in the field handling 14 chances.

Halloran batted .333 (4 of 12) and threw out five would be base stealers. He also knocked in four runs in the tourney.

Another bright spot for Minnesota last weekend was the complete game pitching of freshman lefty Denny Neagle (NEG-lee). He earned his first collegiate win against Maine in spacing 10 hits over seven innings. Neagle walked only two batters while striking out eight. He owns the best earned run average on the Gopher varsity, 2.96 covering 24.1 innings pitched.

A major injury hurt Minnesota's chances last weekend when sophomore center fielder J.T. Bruett, while legging out a double against Team Cuba, suffered a second hamstring tear of the spring. He is expected to be out of action until the Gophers open Big Ten play.

Bruett is hitting a solid .341 and leads the team in stolen bases with 10. He had totaled 15 hits in 12 games played before going out with the injury.

Among the Gopher regulars, sophomore outfielder Jay Kvasnicka (kwas-NICK-ah) leads Minnesota in hitting with a .407 average. Raabe is next in line with a .383 mark while senior right fielder Tom Ward is just behind Bruett at .333 with junior third baseman Jeff Goergen hitting .311.

Goergen has the most hits of any Gopher, 23, and has driven in the most runs, 13. Halloran and freshman catcher/designated hitter Joe Wallraf have each driven in 10 baserunners.

Following the Friday-Saturday Iowa State series, Minnesota returns to Siebert Field for double headers Monday vs. Mankato State and Tuesday against the U. of Wisconsin-Oshkosh. Then it's down to Omaha, NE, for a pair against Creighton U. Wednesday before the first Big Ten series Saturday and Sunday, April 18-19, at Siebert Field against the University of Wisconsin.

SCRIMMAGE SET FOR GRIDDEERS AS PART OF CLINIC

A big weekend is on tap for the University of Minnesota football team which is about to reach the end of the second week of its month-long spring practice session.

First of all, the Golden Gopher Spring Football Clinic is scheduled Friday and Saturday, and several hundred high school and junior college coaches from throughout the area are expected to be on hand.

Throw in a full-scale intra-squad scrimmage Saturday afternoon....with those visitors watching....and Coach John Gutekunst appears to have a full agenda planned for his proteges.

The clinic gets underway with registration at 7:30 a.m. Friday. Lecture and demonstration sessions will take place in the morning and afternoon, and Friday afternoon's practice session will be open to those visiting coaches.

More lecture and demonstration periods are on tap Saturday morning, and then in mid-afternoon Gutekunst will push his charges through their third scrimmage of the spring session.

"Our first scrimmage last Saturday had some good things and some bad things," Gutekunst said. "We had some good efforts on defense, but our offensive execution wasn't what we want.

Then on Tuesday the Golden Gophers went at it again, and while some progress was noted, Gutekunst hopes for even more improvement by this weekend.

Thus far much of the attention has been paid to the new people....redshirts and transfers...as well as returnees who are being tried at new positions:

That would be especially true at the quarterback position where three-year starter Rickey Foggie did not see any action on Saturday. In direct contrast, John Bobinski and Les O'Hara got much of the work. Bobinski was three-of-six for 27 yards while O'Hara was four-of-eight for 23. But he threw two interceptions. Alan Holt, Foggie's back-up a year ago, also saw enough scrimmage time to complete five-of-ten for 57.

Among the "new" runningbacks getting a taste of things in the first scrimmage were Reggie James who carried eight times for 19 yards and Albert McGee who had 15 yards in nine tries.

On the defensive plus side were the two interceptions (with 37 yards in returns) for Warren Berry, and the efforts of veteran Tim Juneau at defensive tackle where he is being tried for the first time.

But it is early, and Saturday's scrimmage for the visiting coaches could tell a lot more as Gutekunst continues to look for progress, for replacements for his departed seniors and for depth both on his offensive and defensive units.

Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers open defense of their 1986 Big Ten West Division title this weekend when the Wisconsin Badgers visit Siebert Field Saturday and Sunday. The schools play doubleheaders beginning at 1 p.m. each day.

Wisconsin began its conference play by taking three of four at Northwestern last weekend. The Badgers, who last year made their first trip to the Big Ten championship tournament, return more players this year than any other West Division team.

"Wisconsin's strength this year is in their pitching staff," Gopher head coach John Anderson said today. "Northwestern did not score more than three runs in any of the four games last weekend.

"No, I'm not surprised at Wisconsin getting off to such a good start. They have been steadily improving the last few years and would like nothing better than to knock us off this weekend.

"For us to at least break even in the four games we'll have to tighten up our defense and get more of the timely hitting we saw last weekend against Iowa State."

Minnesota swept all three games against the Cyclones. The Gophers won 5-4 with a solo run in the 9th inning at the Metrodome Friday, and then came from behind twice to win 6-5 and 8-5 Saturday at Siebert Field.

Third baseman Jeff Goergen singled in second baseman David Contreras who had opened the 9th inning with a double for Friday's win. Iowa State had tied the score at 4-all with solo runs in the seventh and eighth innings.

Sophomore Shane Kangas gained his fourth win of the season against no defeats with some sharp relief pitching. Freshman Denny Neagle (1-1) pitched the first six and one-third innings, but was not as sharp as in previous outings.

In the first game Saturday, the Gophers trailed 5-1 going into the sixth inning. Minnesota rallied for five runs with three coming on a bases loaded double by freshman second baseman Brian Raabe. Raabe then scored the go ahead run when senior Tom Ward grounded a single to right field.

Junior hurler Darren Knight (1-3) gained his first victory of the season in relief of starter Mike Pavelka. Knight gave up a home run off the first ball he pitched, and then shut out ISU for three innings.

In the nightcap, Minnesota trailed 4-1. The Gophers tied the score in the fourth inning when shortstop Jay Anderson cleared the bases with a double into the right field corner. He later belted a two-run homer in the fourth run fifth inning which clinched Minnesota's third straight win.

Kangas was again the right man in the right place when he relieved freshman starter Jim Tatur in the third inning. Kangas allowed ISU five hits but only one run the rest of the way running his season record to 5-0. Last season Kangas was 4-0 for Minnesota.

Sophomore outfielder Jay Kvasnicka (kwas-NICK-ah) has been on a recent tear at the plate while filling in for the injured J.T. Bruett in center field. Kvasnicka leads all Gophers at the plate with a torrid .488 average. He has 21 hits in 43 appearances having played in 18 games.

Coach Anderson and his staff may face a problem this weekend as Bruett is expected to be fully recovered from a hamstring injury. Both Bruett and Kvasnicka are left-handed batters, so expect to see the latter move to a different spot on defense, or possibly become the designated hitter against RHPs. Bruett was batting .341 when he went out of the lineup in the first game of the WHEATIES Tournament of Champions.

Anderson said he is not at all certain of who will pitch when this weekend against Wisconsin, but added he will probably use Knight, Pavelka, Neagle and Steve Fregin in starting roles.

It is also hoped that Ward will be ready to go full time in right field against the Badgers. He has been limited to recent DH duty after also suffering a hamstring pull in the tournament.

GOLDEN GOPHER GRIDDEERS PASS HALF-WAY POINT OF SPRING DRILLS

A short week of practice faces the University of Minnesota football team as Coach John Gutekunst gives his griddeers Easter weekend off while moving past the half-way point in this year's spring session.

The Golden Gophers are slated to take part in a controlled scrimmage on Friday and then get a couple days away from football before gearing up for the rapidly approaching Spring Game.

Gutekunst put his club through two scrimmages last week, and the results brought different reactions from Minnesota's second year head man.

On Wednesday, Gutekunst was less than satisfied with his team's effort. "You can't slide until fall," he told his players. "The Big Ten is too dominant a league not to be giving it your all every day."

Apparently the Golden Gophers took those words to heart, and on Saturday the hard-hitting scrimmage brought a brighter appraisal from Gutekunst.

He was especially pleased with the defensive unit which "Did a great job" on goal line work. He also admitted that injuries were taking their toll on the offensive line's effectiveness, but maintained "We must get better."

In last Saturday's scrimmage, conducted as part of the annual spring clinic for area high school and college coaches, 11 Golden Gophers took their turns at carrying the ball.

Marcus Evans would up as the leader with 39 yards in 11 attempts while Darryl Thompson, last year's Big Ten Conference rushing leaders, had 20 in five.

Four quarterbacks also saw playing time. They included John Bobinaki, Les O'Hara, Alan Holt and Minnesota's starter the last three years, Rickey Foggie. It was Foggie's first real taste of work in scrimmage situations this spring, and he responded with four of nine passing attempts for 54 yards.

Foggie's top target was flanker Jason Bruce who caught two for 50 yards. Ray Armstrong also had two receptions for 22 yards while seven other U of M candidates would up as receivers Saturday.

On the defensive side of things, new faces continued to dominate the scene including junior college transfer Doug Evans who seems to be learning Minnesota's system in a hurry. Ron Goetz, a letterman at fullback last year who is being given a trial at outside linebacker this spring, also was a prominent figure on Saturday.

After the weekend off, Minnesota will return to drills next Monday and head into its final seven practices....plus the Spring Game which again will follow the Team Minneapolis vs. Team St. Paul format.

The 1987 spring practice finale is scheduled for 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 2, in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. A special picture and autograph session with players and coaches will begin at 9:15 a.m. Tickets are priced at \$2.00 for the Spring Game and may be purchased through the athletic department ticket office in the Bierman Building (612-624-8080).

Minneapolis, MN---Dave Snuggerud, sophomore left winger from Minnetonka, was named recipient of the John Mariucci Most Valuable Player Award at the Annual Gopher Blueline Club hockey awards banquet Sunday in Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's baseball Gophers, clinging to an early Big Ten West Division lead, hit the road for four games at Northwestern Saturday and Sunday.

The teams play doubleheaders at 1 p.m. CST each day.

Minnesota is coming off taking three of four games at home from Wisconsin in its opening weekend of conference action. As usual, Minnesota did it the hard way against a Wisconsin team that most experts say is the most improved squad in the Big Ten this season.

After the Badgers won the series opener 4-1 at Siebert Field behind the exceptional pitching of lefty Tom Fischer, Minnesota took the next two games in rather dramatic fashion, and the third on shutout pitching by its own Mike Pavelka.

Fischer limited the Gophers to just five hits with the lone UM run scoring on a sacrifice fly by Mike Halloran. Halloran later in the series won two straight games with late inning blows.

Gopher Shane Kangas suffered his first collegiate loss in the series opener. He was 4-0 at UM last year, and had won six decisions this spring until bested by Fischer. Kangas did come back to win Sunday's first game in relief and now stands at 7-1 for the season.

In the second game Saturday, the Badgers twice had one-run leads only to see Minnesota battle back to tie matters, and then win it in the 10th inning.

Outfielder Jay Kvasnicka (kwas-NICK-ah) doubled home a run in the 7th inning to make it 2-all, and after Wisconsin catcher Craig Brown homered in the 8th, Tom Ward's single created another tie when Jay Anderson scored from second base.

Nothing more happened until the 10th inning when Anderson led off with a double to left, and after a strike out and an intentional walk, Halloran grounded a single to left scoring Anderson from second base to gain the 4-3 win.

Darren Knight, in relief of freshman starter Denny Neagle (NAY-gul), gained the win with 4 1/3 innings of 3-hit pitching. Knight is now 2-3.

In Sunday's first game, the teams traded one-run leads until the 7th inning. Then Kvasnicka led off with a pinch hit single, and Halloran blasted a triple to the wall in right center to score the winning run in the 3-2 decision.

Kangas, who pitched to one batter in the 6th inning in relief of starter Steve Fregin, was credited with the win.

The final game of the series belonged to Pavelka. After being out practically all of the last two seasons due to surgery for nerve damage to his pitching shoulder (L), Pavelka sparkled in allowing the Badgers but three singles while striking out four and walking two. The Badgers only got one baserunner as far as second base, and the Gophers turned two double plays behind Pavelka.

The rangy left-hander is now 2-1 on the season and gives coach John Anderson and the Gophers high hopes he has returned to the form exhibited his freshman year when Pavelka was 6-2, with a 4-0 Big Ten record.

The Gophers, now 19-15 on the season after winning 10 of their last 11 games, play doubleheaders Tuesday at home against Wisconsin-Stout State, and another pair Wednesday at St. Cloud State before the Northwestern series.

At Northwestern Saturday, Anderson is expected to stay with his starting rotation of Kangas, Neagle, Fregin and Pavelka, but could not say Monday as to which order they would take the mound.

Halloran ended the opening weekend of Big Ten play with a sparkling .538 league batting average. He went 7 for 13 at the plate with three runs batted in. For his efforts, he was rewarded by being named Big Ten Player of the Week. Kvasnicka, who leads the Gophers in batting for all games this year with a .491 average (28 of 57), was 4 for 9 on the weekend, .444, while third baseman Jeff Goergan was 4 for 12 and is batting .333 in the Big Ten.

END OF SPRING FOOTBALL PRACTICE IN SIGHT

With the end of spring football practice just over a week away at the University of Minnesota, a quick evaluation will bring totally different responses from Golden Gopher coaches.

John Gutekunst, for example, figures that there is progress being made in some areas, but in others nothing good has happened. It is causing Minnesota's second-year head coach some concern.

Last weekend's controlled scrimmage was a classic example of the situation. "We did a pretty good job defensively," he analyzed before giving his squad the Easter weekend off, "but there were times when our offense was an embarrassment. Offensively we wasted the defense's time."

This week is expected to bring continued hard work to the Golden Gopher camp as attempts are made to resolve the problems which still plague the 1987 contingent. And that work will include a mid-week scrimmage as well as a more involved wrap-up on the weekend.

And all of that will set the stage for next week's final days of practice before the Spring Game takes place at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on Saturday, May 2, at 11 a.m.

An autograph and picture session with the Golden Gopher players and coaches is slated on the Metrodome turf beginning at 9:15 a.m., and an open house tour of the football facilities is scheduled following the game.

Gutekunst hopes for another big turnout for that spring football finale, but he also hopes that his club will perform in an improved fashion for the Minnesota faithful.

Biggest concern at the moment seems to be the lack of productivity by the offense, and that may be as a result of an inability to replace those three offensive line graduates from a year ago....center Ray Hitchcock and tackles Jim Hobbins and Norries Wilson.

Dan Rehtin and Dan Liimata looked like heir apparents coming in to spring drills, but injuries have continued to take their toll....and during the interim Gutekunst had hoped that some of the young candidates would come to the front.

On defense, some of the position changes and the progress of new people has been more encouraging. For example, in last weekend's scrimmage, Dale Conant, sophomore linebacker, scored the days' first touchdown when he picked off an errant lateral/pass and romped 25 yards to score. Moments later, Jason Brouwer, a redshirt freshman inside linebacker, got a safety for the defense by sacking quarterback Les O'Hara in the endzone.

And there were other "bit plays" by the defense. Trint Trip made a couple of them, and other young Golden Gophers who seemed to excell on that unit were Bob Coughlin and Mike Sunvold, both redshirt freshmen.

78th ANNUAL DRAKE RELAYS UP NEXT FOR TRACK TEAM

Coming off last weekend's six first place performances vs. Iowa/Northern Iowa, Coach Roy Griak's Gopher track squad will compete this weekend at the prestigious Drake Relays Track Meet. The 78th annual Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa gets underway Thursday and will have finals on Friday and Saturday at Drake Stadium

Junior sprinter Rod Hutton (Shakopee, MN) won the 200 and 400 meters last Saturday in Iowa City to lead the Gophers first place showings. Sophomore Frank Bjorkli (Pommelvik, Norway) won the 1,500 meters and his twin brother Roger, won the 5,000 event.

Other first place finishes for Minnesota were Carson Hoeft (So. Plymouth, MN) in the 800 meters, Mike Vukovich (Sr. Co-captain, Park Ridge, IL) in the high jump; Jon Briese (Fr. Cottage Grove, MN) in the 110 HH and Robert Miller (Sr. Sauk Centre, MN) in the 3000 meter steeplechase event.

Those Gophers along with veteran distance runner Paul Gisselquist (Sr, Co-captain, Richfield, MN) will be the top hopefuls for places this weekend at the Drake Relays. Ron Backes won the Drake shot put title three consecutive years and was Minnesota's only champion last year. Middle Distance runner Jim Scott (So. Bloomington, MN) could also be a place winner in the 800 meters.

GYMNASTS AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS THURSDAY-SATURDAY IN LOS ANGELES

The Golden Gopher men's gymnastics team will be making their 8th trip to the NCAA Championships under veteran head coach Fred Roethlisberger this weekend. UCLA and Pauley Pavilion are the hosts for the 1987 Division I men's championship and the ten team field is loaded.

Arizona State is the defending NCAA team champion and the Wildcats were not good enough to be named to the 1987 ten team field selected last week by the NCAA based on the top five team scores through the 1986-87 season.

Minnesota was paced all season long by senior captain Collin Godkin (Milwaukee, WI). Godkin won the Big Ten all-around championship and also won two individual events at the conference meet. The Gophers senior leader is a top candidate for the Nissen Award (college gymnastics Heisman Trophy) and he will be one of the top five contenders for the NCAA all-around championship this weekend. Godkin will also be a national champion contender on four individual events. "Winning the Big Ten all-around definitely put Collin at the next level and to the heights he wants to go this year in gymnastics," said Gopher coach Fred Roethlisberger. "He was the top gymnast at Big Tens and he will look for that performance at nationals too."

Godkin has a high all-around score of 56.64 this season and his top competition will come from Penn State's Chris Lux (56.12), Houston Baptist's Alfonzo Rodriguez (57.24), Nebraska's Neil Palmer (56.10), and Tom Sclesinger (Nebraska, 57.02). At least 15 other gymnasts are at 55.50 or better in a tough field of all-arounders.

The Gophers finished third at the Big Ten meet behind champion Ohio State and fellow NCAA team qualifier Iowa. Other top Gopher competitors are two-time NCAA pommel horse All-American Steve Braun (Sr. Bloomington, MN) and freshman all-around star Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT). Braun is a two-time Big Ten place winner in his speciality event and was tied for fourth last year at the NCAA's in the pommel horse. McKiernan was a surprise fourth at the Big Ten meet in all-around and is the most improved Gopher gymnast through the 1986-87 season.

Minneapolis, MN---As usual, the Big Ten West Division baseball race is on another collision course. With eight games remaining in conference play, one game separates the three leaders.

Minnesota (6-2) holds the top spot, but is just a single decision ahead of Illinois and Iowa who are both 5-3. No problem guessing Minnesota's remaining opponents. You're right. . . Illinois and Iowa.

The Gophers host the Illini in 1 p.m. doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday at Siebert Field, and next weekend travel to Iowa City to play the Hawkeyes four times May 9-10. Minnesota is the defending Big Ten West Division champion.

The opening game Sunday against Illinois marks the first telecast ever from Siebert Field. KITN-TV, Ch. 29 in the Twin Cities, will carry the game live.

The Gophers held on to its slim lead by taking three of four at Northwestern last weekend while Illinois was sweeping Wisconsin and Iowa was idle.

It was a combination of stingy pitching and the lusty hitting of sophomore shortstop Jay Anderson (Bloomington Jefferson) that keyed Minnesota last weekend.

After splitting two games Saturday, sophomore pitcher Steve Fregin (Little Falls) and junior Mike Pavelka (Minnetonka) delivered complete games Sunday allowing the Wildcats only one unearned run as the Gophers won 11-0 and 3-1.

Fregin (4-1, 1-0) came within a decision at first base of throwing a no-hitter. The lone safe blow off came on a bunt single in the first inning. The call, of course, was controversial, but final. Fregin struck out five and walked three while turning in his third complete game of the season.

In the second game, Pavelka (3-1, 2-0), who is returning to form shown three years ago, recorded his second straight complete game and has yet to allow an earned run to be scored in 14 innings of Big Ten pitching. The lone NU run came on a single, a two-base error and a ground out in the first inning.

Pavelka walked two and struck out one while allowing the Wildcats just four singles. He now leads all Gopher pitchers with a 3.24 ERA in 33.1 innings.

Pavelka presents quite a comeback story. After posting a 6-2 record his freshman year, 4-0 in the Big Ten, he suffered through two operations and a total rehabilitation of his pitching shoulder recovering from nerve damage. But persistent labor the last two years has returned him to the form that saw him become a high draft choice following his senior year at Hopkins High School.

On Saturday, junior pitcher Darren Knight (Anoka) evened his season record at 3-3 by taking an 8-5 decision with a save by Shane Kangas (Anoka). Knight hurled 5 2/3 innings giving up six hits and three runs.

Freshman lefty Denny Neagle (2-2, 0-1) dropped the second game 6-2 as the Gophers were held to five hits by NU hurler Tom Borgula, now 5-1.

At the plate, several Gophers contributed big with key base hits. But none rained havoc on the Northwestern pitching staff like Anderson. For the weekend, Anderson's totals ended as follows: 4 home runs, 3 doubles, 1 run-scoring single, 5 runs scored, 11 runs batted in, and the game-winning RBI in all three Gopher victories. In college baseball, that's literally a month done up in one weekend.

His 8 for 13 (.615) performance at the plate raised his Big Ten bat average to .400 and his all-games mark to .341. For his efforts, Anderson was named Big Ten Player of the Week, and also voted Co-National Player of the Week by COLLEGIATE BASEBALL.

Actually, Anderson batted for the cycle in home runs. He hit a solo blast, a two-runner, a three-runner and a grand slam. His three run homer came in the 4th inning of the 8-5 win bringing the Gophers from an 0-1 deficit.

In the 11-0 decision, he hit his solo homer early, and keyed a 7-run sixth inning with his grand slam. Then in the 3-1 victory, he again provided the winning margin with a 2-run homer in the first inning.

Minnesota forces simply hope Anderson and Co. did not use up so many base hits that they come up empty this weekend against the Illini.

MINNESOTA TO END DRILLS WITH SPRING GAME SATURDAY

A month of spring practice will draw to a close for the University of Minnesota football team Saturday when it holds this year's Spring Game at 11 a.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Team Minneapolis will square off with Team St. Paul in that annual event, with a special picture-autograph session involving players and coaches set to begin at 9:15 a.m.

Coach John Gutekunst ran his squad through its final tune-up scrimmage last Saturday, and immediately following that session the 1987 senior members of the Golden Gopher contingent conducted a team draft.

That final scrimmage may have been the most productive....and most encouraging.... session of spring drills, and it properly set the stage for Saturday's Spring Game.

Darrell Thompson, an All-Big Ten performer last fall as a freshman, was the big news as he carried 13 times for 135 yards, a total that included runs of 50 and 60 yards. His 50-yarder went for a touchdown, and he also scored on a four-yard run and again during the goal-line situation drills at the scrimmage's end from three yards out.

Rickey Foggie also got a lot of work and hit on six of 16 attempts for 98 yards. Gary Couch turned out to be the top receiver of the day with four grabs for 81 yards. Jason Bruce had two for 49. Roselle Richardson had a good day at fullback with 35 yards in nine carries. He added a six-yard touchdown run.

In next Saturday's finale, Alan Holt is expected to open at quarterback for Team St. Paul while John Bobinski has been tabbed as the starter for Team Minneapolis.

Larry Beckish, Minnesota's offensive coordinator, will coach Team Minneapolis. His staff will include Billy Miller, John Palermo, George Wemeier, Bob Rohde, Carl McGee, Matt Wannebo and Mike Pendino.

Dick Biddle, the Golden Gophers' defensive coordinator, will head up the St. Paul Staff. His assistants will include Jim Hueber, Bishop Harris, Vince Okruch, Booker Brooks, Dana Noel, John Morrison and Les Boyum.

Named honorary media coaches for Saturday's game are WLOL's John Hines for Minneapolis and Bob Berglund for St. Paul. Honorary Captains for Minneapolis are Pug Lund and Bill McMoore. For St. Paul the honorary captains are Ed Widseth and Doug Kingsriter. All four are former Golden Gophers.

A special Open House also is on tap Saturday following the game at the U of M's football complex. The facility will be open from 2 p.m. until 6 for tours.

There have been three games in the St. Paul-vs-Minneapolis rivalry, and Team Minneapolis holds a 2-1 edge going into Saturday's contest. In 1984, Minneapolis won 24-17. St. Paul evened the series with a 23-17 verdict in 1985 but last year Minneapolis prevailed again 27-17.

Minneapolis, MN---"One more time" is the call for the U. of Minnesota baseball team this week when the Gophers head south to play doubleheaders against the U. of Iowa Friday and Saturday.

The call in question is for the Golden Gophers to win two of the four games at Iowa to repeat as Big Ten West Division champion. As usual, it will not be an easy task.

Iowa stayed right on Minnesota's heels last weekend as both teams took three of four Big Ten outings. Minnesota, after dropping its series opener to Illinois 6-2 Saturday, came back to win a two-day, 12-inning contest, 3-2, and then take the last two games Sunday by 3-2 and 5-1 scores.

Iowa swept the first three games at Wisconsin only to drop the final contest 8-7 to the Badgers. That means the Hawkeyes remained one game behind Minnesota with an 8-4 Big Ten record. The Hawks are 26-20 overall. Illinois fell to third place in the West at 6-6.

Minnesota upped its season mark for all games to 31-17 to go with its 9-3 Big Ten log. Last season the Gophers went down to the final conference game before winning the division title with a 10-5 record.

Not only is the top division spot up for grabs this weekend, but so are the two spaces allowed teams for entry into the Big Ten championship tournament the following weekend. Michigan, leading the East Division with an 11-1 record, has already clinched its title and will host the tourney games May 15-17. Purdue, 10-6, is the other East Division entry.

"Thinking ahead to the tournament is one thing. Getting there is entirely more difficult," says Gopher head coach John Anderson. "There is nobody in all baseball Iowa would rather defeat than ourselves.

"They are a proven team this year and will come at us as hard as they can. Playing at home is a big bonus for Iowa and I'm certain the fans who attend are in for some great college baseball.

"As for Minnesota, well, we were pretty fortunate last weekend. A bounce or two one way or the other and we could be trailing Iowa going into this weekend. Our pitching, however, won for us again.

"We are not about to change anything as far as our pitching staff goes. We will use the same rotation starting (Darren) Knight and (Denny) Neagle Saturday with (Steve) Fregin and (Mike) Pavelka going Sunday. They, too, have proven themselves. I just hope we can do a better job of hitting and get them a few more runs to work with this weekend."

Illinois also featured strong pitching last weekend. The Gophers got seven hits in the first game, losing 6-2, and then had but six hits in each of the next three games covering 26 innings.

The second Illinois game was something else. Sophomore outfielder Jay Kvasnicka (kwas-NICK-ah) cracked out his second home run of the day, also the second of his career, in the sixth inning to tie matters 2-2.

The teams then came up empty for four more innings until the game was suspended by darkness after the 10th. When play resumed at noon Sunday, it took Minnesota two more innings before outfielder J.T. Bruett knocked in the winning run with a two-out ground single to right field. The run was unearned.

Sophomore pitcher Shane Kangas won his 9th game of the season with three innings of scoreless relief, the 10th inning Saturday and the 11th and 12th Sunday. Neagle, a freshman, pitched first first nine innings Saturday. Kangas is now 9-1 overall and 2-1 in the Big Ten.

The teams then had two more games to play Sunday and Minnesota received route-going performances from Fregin (5-1, 2-0) and Pavelka (4-1, 3-0). Fregin won 3-2 giving up seven hits, no walks and fanning four.

Pavelka pitched his third straight complete game allowing just one unearned run. In conference play, the junior lefty has not allowed an earned run for a perfect 0.00 ERA in 21 innings. He gave up four hits and did not walk a batter Sunday. Tom Ward hit a 2-run homer, his 7th, in the first inning to give Pavelka all the runs he needed for the 5-1 decision.

ST. PAUL WINS SPRING GAME IN PRACTICE FINALE

Team St. Paul stymied Team Minneapolis 22-8 at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome last weekend to even the series at 2-2 and end spring practice for 1987 at the University of Minnesota.

Quarterback Alan Holt, a backup to Ricky Foggie last fall, used his experience to advantage, and it made the difference. Holt was 11-of-19 for 159 yards including a 46-yarder to Gary Couch for St. Paul's lone TD.

The rest of St. Paul's scoring came from senior kicking specialist Chip Lohmiller who connected on field goal attempts from 30, 28, 31, 22 and 47 yards.

Minneapolis didn't score until the final period when defensive tackle Trint Trip chased Holt through and out of the endzone for a safety, and Dennis Carter caught a John Bobinski pass (35 yards) for a TD.

"Holt showed a lot of poise," Coach John Gutekunst said. "He played well, and his experience showed. Overall the game went well. It was a very good effort.

And those words of praise came in spite of the fact that several first-team type players did not play because of injuries sustained during a gruelling month of spring drills....or were carried over from last fall.

Included in that category, in addition to Foggie, were Dan Rechten, Carlos McGee, Pat Hart, Jon Melander, Paul Anderson, Doug Mueller, Skeeter Akre, John Williams, Mike Turgeon and Bryan Suess.

All of those Golden Gophers are expected to be fully recovered by the time Coach Gutekunst whistles the start of fall drills in August, and their return should bolster Minnesota's ranks considerably.

Even so Gutekunst was pleased not only with the finale last weekend but with the entire spring practice session which he called "productive" as a preparation for the 1987 season.

There were several position changes of note, many having to do with strengthening Minnesota's defense which lost nine starters off last year's Liberty Bowl entry.

Included in that category would be people like Ron Goetz and Tim Juneau who moved from the offensive side of things to outside linebacker this spring and responded well.

Offensively Gutekunst knows he still has some holes to fill in his front line where both tackles and the center have graduated, but he still hopes that some new people and a position change or two, will resolve those current shortcomings.

And he does know that he'll have Darrell Thompson, the Big Ten's leading rusher last fall, in camp next August to join Foggie and fullback Roselle Richardson to form what could be an explosive Golden Gopher backfield.

Minnesota fans already are looking ahead to 1987 and a seven-game home schedule which begins on September 12 when Northern Iowa invades the Metrodome. First Big Ten game at home is Purdue on October 3.

Minneapolis, MN---For the seventh time in as many seasons, the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers are headed for the Big Ten Championship Tournament.

By taking three of four games at Iowa last weekend, the Gophers, for the second straight season and fifth time in seven years, won the Big Ten's West Division championship. Minnesota, 35-20 overall, ended 12-4 in the Big Ten.

Minnesota, after playing two games Tuesday at home vs. Augsburg College, meets Big Ten East Division runner-up Purdue (34-17-1) at 1 p.m. EST in a first round game Friday at Ann Arbor, MI. Host East champion Michigan (46-9) plays West runner-up Iowa (28-26) in the other first round game. The tournament features a double elimination format.

"At the beginning of the season, and particularly after returning from our spring trip to Texas and Arizona, I had a difficult time believing this Minnesota team had the talent necessary to get this far," says six-year Gopher head coach John Anderson.

"I guess I just didn't realize how deep these men could reach within themselves to become winners. They certainly made a believer out of me. This team has become awfully close with great belief in one another.

"As for the tournament, well, we have only won it twice in six years, so our overall performance is not all that great. But to get there seven straight times is, I believe, a considerable accomplishment. I don't really know if we have enough tools to win this one, but I can remember going to Ann Arbor in 1985 as the second place team from the West and winning it all. I hope history finds a way of repeating for us. It would be a great reward for members of this team."

Anderson added that until he finds out more about Purdue and Michigan, he had no idea about his pitching rotation.

You can be certain, however, that two pitchers--junior Mike Pavelka (5-1, 3.05 ERA overall, 4-0, 1.08 B10) and sophomore Steve Fregin (fra-GREN) (6-1, 3.54 overall, 3-0, 1.30 B10)--will each get a starting call sometime during the tournament.

Minnesota and Michigan did meet once this season at the Metrodome in Minneapolis during the Tournament of Champions. The Gophers won, 8-5, but Michigan committed four errors during that contest. "I do not expect Michigan to ever commit that many errors in a tournament game," Anderson commented.

It was the pitching of starters Fregin, Pavelka and Darren Knight (4-4, 3-1) with a save by reliever Shane Kangas that led Minnesota last weekend in Iowa City.

Knight won the series opener 4-2 giving up just two runs while striking out eight in six innings. Kangas gained his third save of the year by retiring the side in the seventh. That win automatically put UM into the tournament.

After suffering through a home run barrage by Iowa's John Kuester (one off Knight with no outs in the 7th inning of the first game, and three more in three times at bat in the second game Friday) when the Hawks won 6-3, Fregin and Pavelka came through with wins Saturday.

Fregin pitched his second 1-hitter of the Big Ten season in defeating Iowa 3-0. It was also his third consecutive complete game in the conference and the win gave Minnesota the West Division championship.

In the nightcap, Pavelka finally gave up three earned runs after going 24 and 2/3 innings of allowing just one unearned run in the Big Ten. He stayed on long enough to gain his 4th conference victory against no defeats in the 15-8 Gopher win. Kangas pitched the final three innings but was not at all sharp. He allowed five runs on eight hits, three of them home runs.

Catcher Mike Halloran had six hits in 14 plate appearances while second baseman Brian Raabe was 5 for 11 and third baseman Jeff Goergen was 5 for 12 with five runs batted in. Iowa scored all but two of its weekend runs on homers while the Gophers, for the second time in Big Ten play this season, did not get a single ball over the fence. UM was also blanked on home runs by Wisconsin.

The defending champion Gopher tennis team came up short in defense of the league title losing to Michigan 5-2 in the championship match last Sunday at 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington, MN.

Svensson will be Minnesota's lone participant at this year's NCAA meet. Last season, Minnesota won the Big Ten title and was selected for the 16 team NCAA championship field.

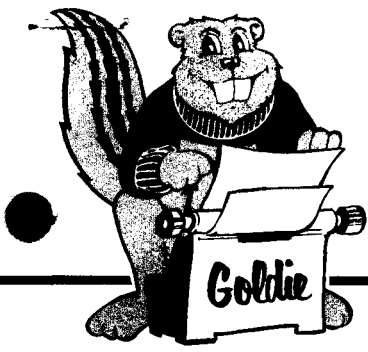

BSB INVITED TO NCAA REGIONAL

Minneapolis, MN---On Monday, everyone connected with the U. of Minnesota baseball program believed the season was over. Gear was turned in and the coaching staff was heading out for some serious scouting of high school games.

After all, the Gophers had just returned from the Big Ten tournament after a hasty exit following consecutive losses to Purdue (9-3) and Michigan (9-8).

Low and behold, a short phone call put everything in reverse. Minnesota received, and quickly accepted, a bid to the NCAA West I Regional in Palo Alto, CA, where UM opens its bid to go further by taking on host Stanford U. at 4 p.m. PST (6 p.m. local time) Friday, May 22. The Gophers are 36-23 for the season.

The Stanford Cardinals (44-16) are the power of the west coast ranked #2 in one national poll, and #4 in another. Other matchups in the six-team regional include Wichita State (58-16) vs. UC-Santa Barbara (30-23-2), and Washington State (42-17) vs. Oral Roberts (45-17).

The tournament runs through Monday, May 24, and features and double elimination format.

If Minnesota wins its opening game against Stanford, the Gophers play at 12:30 p.m. PST Saturday against the Wichita St.-UC-Santa Barbara loser. Should the Gophers lose to Stanford, their next game will be at 9 a.m. PST Saturday against the Washington St.-Oral Roberts loser. Two losses and you are out, while the regional winner advances to the College World Series (CWS) beginning Friday, May 29, in Omaha, NE.

This marks the 15th time Minnesota has appeared in an NCAA Regional. On its very first try in 1956 under the late head coach Richard "Chief" Siebert, Minnesota won its first national baseball championship. Siebert also directed Gopher teams to NCAA titles in 1960 and 1964, plus additional CWS appearances in 1973 and 1977. Dave Winfield (NY Yankees) was a star on the 1973 Gopher team while Paul Molitor (Mil. Brewers) led the '77 club.

Minnesota's overall post season record shows 39 wins against 26 losses, and is 17-7 in its five trips to the CWS. Teams have competed in 12 Mideast and Midwest regionals, and made single stops at the Rocky Mt. and Southern Regionals.

This NCAA venture is the third under Gopher head coach John Anderson. Now in his sixth year as boss of the UM diamond program, Anderson directed the Gophers to the 1982 and 1985 Midwest Regionals, both at Stillwater, OK, after winning Big Ten championships both seasons.

LAST WEEK AT THE BIG TEN

After winning its fifth conference West Division title in seven years, the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers suffered a hasty exit from the Big Ten tournament held at Ann Arbor, MI, last weekend.

Minnesota dropped both its games, 9-3 to Purdue Friday and 9-8 to host Michigan the next day.

Considering that pre-season rankings predicted a fourth place Minnesota finish in its divisional play, it was really a surprise that this year's Gopher nine made its seventh consecutive appearance at the conference tourney. Only Minnesota and Michigan have made it that far every year.

Youth and inexperience, particularly among the pitching staff, was supposed to hold Minnesota back this year. So all this team did was win the fourth highest number of games in the school's baseball history, and project head coach John Anderson further into the national college baseball limelight.

Minnesota's last win this season, a 7-0 decision against Augsburg (MN) College on May 12, was the 200th win in Anderson's six years at the Gopher helm. Every research avenue was exhausted to reveal that at age 31, Anderson has become youngest NCAA Division I coach to win 200 games.

His career record at UM now reads 200 wins, 128 losses and one tie for a winning percentage of .609. His teams have won some form of championship (2 Big Ten, 4 West Division) every year during his six campaigns.

The Gophers could only stand and watch in amazement last Friday as Purdue totaled 17 base hits, nearly half of them bloopers or topped infield grounders, en route to its 9-3 victory.

But the real reason for Purdue was undefeated freshman pitcher Pete Altenberger (8-0) who did Minnesota a base hit after the fourth inning. At that stage UM had eight strikeouts and a 3-1 lead.

Purdue, however, got to Gopher starter Pavelka (5-2) in the sixth inning scoring five times to take the lead for good. Pavelka and Altenberger came into the game as the #1 and #2 pitchers during the Big Ten's regular season. But Pavelka just didn't have his usual good stuff this time out and exited after facing the first four batters in Purdue's 6th inning rally. Reliever Shane Kangas finished up for the Gophers.

Minnesota, after Purdue opened with a run in the first inning, scored twice in its first time at bat. Jay Kvasnicka doubled in the first run while Mike Halloran singled the other.

Jay Anderson scored the final Gopher run in the third inning by singling and coming around on an error and singles by Tom Ward and Bruce Bates.

On Saturday, Michigan jumped to a 5-2 lead after five innings off Gopher starter Steve Fregin (6-1). But Minnesota began to chip away and tied the game at 5-5 in the 8th inning. Michigan came back with two runs in the same inning taking a 7-5 lead into the final frame.

But the Gophers, with four of the first five batters hitting singles, went ahead 8-7 with three runs in the 9th. Paul Weinberg knocked in the first with a line single. Another scored on an error with J.T. Bruett plating the lead tally on an infield grounder.

The roof then caved in on Gopher reliever and loser Karl Johnson (3-4). A walk, a stolen base, a third strike passed ball and a fielders choice grounder scored the tying run for Michigan. A single loaded the bases with no outs before freshman Denny Neagle replaced Johnson and gave up a long single to Bill St. Peter to score the winning run.

ANDERSON ON THE GOPHERS

"To say the least, we were not expecting an NCAA bid today (Monday)," the coach offered. "At the same time, however, I believe the young men on this team deserve the chance to compete against the best from other sections of the country.

"I have to feel awfully proud of the way this Minnesota team played all year. After getting off to a slow start, they battled adversity all season but never once gave up. They simply believed they could win. That's why losing two in a row at the Big Ten tournament hurt so much.

"I honestly believe we went through more injuries to more individuals than in any other year I have been at Minnesota. We had seven players out at one time or another with pulled hamstrings. That's brutal.

"Many veterans and the newcomers, too, continued to pick us up game after game. And several of our rookie pitchers provided key performances to back up some spectacular pitching by veterans who were not predicted to do all that well.

"Pitchers Mike Pavelka, coming off two redshirt seasons because of shoulder surgeries, and sophomore Steve Fregin finished one and three in the Big Ten. Junior Darren Knight went from starter to reliever to starter. Sophomore Shane Kangas was our top winner with nine plus three saves while freshman Denny Neagle became our fourth starter and was consistent from the beginning.

"Between them, these ten had 26 of our 36 wins. What more can a coach ask?

"Losing seniors Mike Halloran (C) and Tom Ward (OF) will hurt a lot next season. This pair, our co-captains, provided badly needed leadership, particularly for the younger members of this year's varsity squad. Replacing the latter, besides their outstanding baseball talents, will not be a simple task.

"But now both Halloran and Ward, plus their teammates, get another chance. We hope to make the best of it. But to go up against the likes of the other five teams in this regional, well, that's asking quite a lot.

"We originally looked at this year's Minnesota team as being a year away because we were so young. That shows you how much I know. I guess that's why I am so proud of this club. They have yet to quit in a single game. They have become real battlers.

"I believe the best illustration of that was last Saturday against Michigan. We were down 5-2 in the 6th inning, but scored two in the 7th and another in the 8th to tie 5-5. Michigan got two more in the 8th, but we scored three times in the 9th and I believed we had them. But give credit to Michigan, they came back with the winning runs in the same inning.

"Our kids battled like crazy, but it just wasn't our turn. Hopefully, we can do better this week.

Dave Skrien, a former Golden Gopher player and coach, has been named the new administrative assistant to Head Football Coach John Gutekunst at the University of Minnesota.

Skrien will be responsible for football recruiting at the U of M and replaces Vince Okruch who held that post for one year before being assigned duties as runningback coach by Gutekunst this past spring.

A native of Morris, MN, the 58-year old Skrien was captain of the Minnesota team in 1950 when he played fullback under the legendary Bernie Bierman.

After graduating from the University of Minnesota, Skrien played for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian Football League for two seasons and helped that club win the Western Division championship and gain a berth in the Grey Cup game.

His coaching career began at Albert Lea, MN, High School and was followed by stints as assistant coach at Ball State, at the University of Minnesota under Murray Warmath and at Boise State.

He also coached in the professional ranks, both as an assistant and as the head man, at British Columbia, Edmonton, and Saskatchewan....all in the Canadian League....as well as at Memphis in the World Football League.

In 1976, Skrien returned to Minnesota as the recreation coordinator for the city of Richfield while also serving as head coach at Golden Valley Lutheran College.

Skrien has both his B.S. and his M.S. degrees from the University of Minnesota.

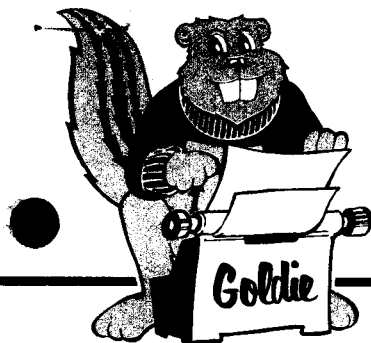

BASEBALL ENDS AT 36-25

Minneapolis, MN---In the beginning, particularly after the first game, little on the positive side was expected from the 1987 U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers. Minnesota lost its season opener 18-1 to Nebraska at the Metrodome.

But when the season ended last Saturday IN Palo Alto, CA, another winning chapter had been added to Minnesota's rich baseball heritage.

Although the season ended on sour notes--losing all four games in Big Ten and NCAA Regional tournaments--the Gophers ended up with a 36-25 season record marking the 25th consecutive winning campaign in UM baseball history.

Included was a repeat as champions of the Big Ten's West Division with a 12-4 conference log, a seventh straight trip to the Big Ten playoffs, and the school's 15th appearance at an NCAA regional.

It also marked the sixth straight year in as many tries that a team headed by head coach John Anderson had won some form of Big Ten championship (two conference titles outright and four West Division crowns). It was also Anderson's third trip to an NCAA regional.

In fact, Minnesota's final win of the season, a 7-0 decision against Augsburg (MN) College May 12, was Anderson's 200th career coaching victory making him, at age 31, the youngest NCAA Division I head coach to reach that milestone. Anderson's six-year record now reads 200-130-1 (.606%).

Minnesota played in one of the strongest of the eight regional fields last weekend. Host Stanford drubbed the Gophers 12-1 the first day before Minnesota was eliminated in its next outing by Oral Roberts, 7-0.

The latter decision was ONLY the second time Minnesota was held scoreless all season. The other blanking was recorded by UCLA at the Gophers WHEATIES Tournament of Champions in the Metrodome. The Uclans won that outing 2-0.

INDIVIDUAL STANDOUTS

Although coaches stress the theme "team" rather than individual accomplishments, performances by the latter always stand out.

For starters, sophomore outfielder Jay Kvasnicka (kwas-NICK-ah) (Delano) captured the 1987 Gopher batting title with a .368 average for all games played. Kvasnicka was originally slated for spot duty as a reserve, but took over early in center field when soph starter J.T. Bruett (Oconomowoc, WI) was sidelined twice by a hamstring pull. After batting above the .400 mark through the middle of the season, Kvasnicka became the starting left fielder after Bruett returned.

One of two Gopher seniors, right fielder Tom Ward (Richfield) ended second in hitting with a .349 average while the other senior, catcher Mike Halloran (Edina), finished with a career best average of .341 at the plate.

Junior third baseman Jeff Goergen (Owatonna) established a pair of individual Minnesota records this spring. Goergen bettered his own mark of 197 official at bats set last year by going to the plate 202 times this spring. He also broke the record of games played in a season by appearing in all 61 Gopher contests this year. He averaged .337 by banging out a team high 68 hits.

The previous mark of 58 games played was set last year by Tim McIntosh. The 61 games is also a Minnesota team high.

Freshman pitcher Denny Neagle (NAY-gul) (Gambrills, MD) ended with the lowest earned run average, 3.45, among players who hurled more than 40 innings. Neagle's record ended at 2-2 with one save thrown in. Junior Mike Pavelka (Minnetonka) was next with a 3.79 mark and a 5-3 record after pitching for the first time in two years following a pair of shoulder surgeries.

Sophomore Shane Kangas (Anoka) was the most active Gopher pitcher. He appeared in 20 games, earned a team high nine wins against only two losses and had three saves as a reliever. Kangas, however, also set a UM record by giving up and all-time high 98 hits while pitching 73 and 1/3 innings.

Sophomore Steve Fregin (fra-GEEN) had the best Gopher record, six wins against one loss, to go with a 3.92 ERA. He recorded a pair of 1-hitters in Big Ten play.

Strangely enough, not a single UM player made the All-Big Ten first team as chosen by the coaches. Further, only Halloran made the second team, while Pavelka, who led the conference with a 4-0 record and the lowest ERA, 1.08, only made the third team along with Kvasnicka, junior first baseman Paul Weinberg (St. Paul Cretin) and freshman second baseman Brian Raabe (New Ulm). Fregin, who ended 3-0 with a 1.30 ERA in Big Ten play, was not mentioned.

Raabe also set a UM standard by participating in 35 double plays. The Gophers set a new team high in double plays with 67.

ANDERSON ON THE '87 SEASON

"We kind of found out the hard way that we were not ready to step up to the next level with our performance at the NCAA regional," the coach offered.

"At the same time, this team came much further than I had originally anticipated. Of the 25 players we took to Texas and Arizona on our spring trip, 19 were freshmen and sophomores. That was the main reason we ended 2-10 down there.

"In that sense we didn't really know what to expect this season. I can tell you now, however, that I am awfully proud of the way these players came along. There were a number of times we could have hung it up. But they never quit battling and were certainly a representative Minnesota team.

"Now the challenge is can we improve to that next level. All but two of our players return. What these men do to improve themselves this summer and next fall and winter will decide just how good we can be in 1988. I believe they will pay the price to make that improvement, too. If everybody stays healthy, we could really have something going next spring. I wish the 1988 season started tomorrow."

SVENSSON UPSETS MCENROE IN FIRST ROUND OF NCAA TENNIS: LOSES NEXT ROUND

Gopher sophomore Jonas Svensson (Vetlanda, Sweden) upset #10 seeded Patrick McEnroe of Stanford 6-4, 6-4 in the opening round of the NCAA singles championships last week in Athens, Georgia.

The unseeded Svensson, Minnesota's only singles competitor in the NCAA's, lost his second round match to Scott Warner of Nevada-Las Vegas 7-6, 6-4 and was eliminated from the tournament.

Svensson closes the season 31-16 overall. Coach Jerry Noyce's Gopher team was 15-17 in duals this year and finished runnerup to Michigan at the 1987 Big Ten Championships losing 5-2 May 10 at 98th Street Racquet Club.

Sophomore Carson Hoeft (Plymouth, MN) was Minnesota's top finisher with a third place in the 1500 meters running a 3:47.68 race. Hoeft was sixth after the qualifying runs and improved for a third place showing in last Sunday's finals.

Gopher co-captain Paul Gisselquist (Sr. Richfield, MN) was fifth in the 10,000 meters in a time of 29:31.24. It was Gisselquist's second straight 5th place finish at Big Tens. He earlier qualified this outdoor season for the NCAA nationals in the 10,000 and will race in Baton Rouge, LA June 3-6 at NCAA's.

Other Gopher place winners at the Big Ten Championships where Minnesota placed 10th with 14 team points were: Peter Walker (Fr. Austin, MN) 5th in the pole vault 15-10, Dan Mensing (Jr. Blue Earth, MN) 5th in the shot put 51-8, John Siekmeer (Fr. Mahtomedia, MN) 6th in the shot put 50-10 $\frac{1}{4}$, Robert Miller (Sr. Sauk Centre, MN) sixth in the steeplechase 8:59.61 and Mike Vukovich (Sr. co-captain Park Ridge, IL) 5th in the high jump 6-10 $\frac{3}{4}$.

Illinois won the men's team championship unseating defending champion Wisconsin 122 $\frac{1}{2}$ to the Badgers 86. Indiana was third at 85 followed by Michigan 58, Ohio State 48, Iowa 39.5, Purdue 38, Northwestern 26, Michigan State 25 and the Golden Gophers 14 team points.

87-88 GOPHER OUTLOOK WITH HEAD COACH DOUG WOOG

"A big factor weighing on our success in 1987-88 is predicated on which of our players makes the U.S. Olympic Team. The only position where we could be physically shorted, however, is in goal.

"If either John Blue or Rob Stauber makes the Olympic team, the one remaining will have to play an awful lot of hockey for Minnesota next season.

"We could also lose a lot of offensive punch, too, if forwards like Dave Snuggerud, Paul Broten, Tom Chorske and defenseman Todd Richards make the U.S. team.

"So I believe the concerning news is if we lose some Olympic candidates. The good news, however, would be that when we get them back a year later, they'll be much better hockey players.

"All of us here at Minnesota are really pulling for each of our players who are reaching for a star this summer. To represent the USA at an Olympics is as high an honor an amateur athlete can achieve. I wish each of them good luck.

"At the same time back home, a big key for us this season will be improvement of players returning on our squad who didn't play as full-time regulars last year. Forwards Jon Anderson, Chris May and Brett Strot (as in VOTE), plus defensemen Brett Nelson and Jeff Pauletti simply must move up one notch and be consistent performers if we are to succeed without some of our more experienced players coming back.

"Having already lost seniors Corey Millen, Steve MacSwain, Gary Shopek and Tim Bergland, we will have some difficulty in scoring. It will be of further concern if we lose any other big scorers to the Olympics.

"As for our recruits this year, our coaching staff went for speed, quickness and skill players who have good hands and good hockey sense. I believe the youngsters we have coming in have the proven ability to see the entire rink. How quickly they adjust to hockey in the WCHA is, of course, another matter.

"The WCHA, as usual, will be extremely competitive. What with several key players lost throughout the Association both to graduation and the Olympic Team, I expect to see teams move up in the ranks and make solid runs for league honors in 1987-88. That, by itself, will make for an extremely entertaining year for the fans. Not for the coaches, necessarily, but certainly for the fans."

GOPHER HEAD COACH DOUG WOOG

Returning to your alma mater as a head coach in any sport is not always considered by some the best possible career move.

Some looked at it that way in the spring of 1985 when Doug Woog accepted the offer to head up the University of Minnesota hockey program. There were those negative thinkers who believed the position should have gone to other candidates. To Woog, however, opinions of others did not make any difference. He was exactly where he had someday hope to be, head coach of the Minnesota Golden Gopher hockey program.

Now, two seasons do not make an entire career, but what Woog has already achieved has silenced the doomsayers.

The record achieved by Woog's first two teams reads 69 wins against 27 losses and one tie for a winning percentage of .716. That latter figure is top of the line in anyone's league. The 69 wins are believed to be the most of any NCAA Division I team covering the past two seasons.

Included in his won-lost mark to date are two second place finishes in the WCHA, two runner-up spots in the WCHA playoffs, and as many trips to the NCAA Final Four where his Gopher teams earned a pair of third place trophies.

Maybe Woog's crowning achievement has been defeating the #1 team from the East both years in the first round of the NCAA playoffs. Each year the Gophers were seeded #4 in the West and had to go back on the road. Both series were played on the Boston University campus as the Gophers first knocked off the host school, and this year defeated Boston College which was playing its entire "home" season on the road while its new rink was being constructed.

Woog is always the first one to admit that since taking the Minnesota coaching position, "I have not scored as goal, made a check or a pass, or stopped a single shot on goal. Our players have done the job on the ice. All I sometimes do is open the gate on the bench."

Modest words for a young man who has come through the ranks of coaching on every amateur level in the State of Minnesota, plus internationally at the junior, U.S. National and Olympic levels. In addition, Woog has long been an active national member and has chaired several key committees for AHAUS.

Possibly the most important move Woog made when selected as Gopher head coach was to surround himself with an able staff. Former Gopher defenseman Bill Butters and another Minnesota native, who gained All-America status for Wisconsin, Dean Talafous, joined Woog as full-time assistants. This past year skating and conditioning expert Jack Blatherwick also became a full-time staffer.

Two more men, Bob Shier and former UM goalie Paul Ostby, aid in various ways as part-time assistants on administrative, coaching and scouting levels.

Woog has steadfastly maintained one aim in building his Minnesota teams. "Naturally, recruiting Minnesota high school players is our primary aim," the coach often says. He always quickly adds, however, that "we are not 100% limited to this lone area. Whenever the correct time and candidate arrives, we will gladly recruit from other states and Canada when the situation is right for us."

Woog has stated publicly on several occasions that is is not anti anyplace, but nearly pro-Minnesota when it comes to evaluating incoming talent.

Maybe, just maybe, he is following something that went before at Minnesota. When Gopher teams of 1974, 1976 and 1979 captured NCAA championships, each of those teams were made up entirely of Minnesota high school products.

1987-88 Pre-Season Outlook

Minnesota's tedious task of rebuilding its basketball fortunes made some progress during the 1986-87 season, but it was slow and at some times extremely painful for first-year coach Clem Haskins and his Golden Gophers.

After going 7-3 through the non-conference portion of last year's schedule, Minnesota opened the Big Ten campaign by winning two straight at home.

Then, however, their lack of experience met reality, and the out-manned and out-sized Golden Gophers wound up losing 16 straight conference games to opponents ranked among the nation's best.

Even in defeat there were highlights, however, and many of the losses were of the slimmest of margins.....like the 72-70 setback at Indiana and the 72-71 heartbreaker at Northwestern.

Now Coach Haskins begins his second year at the Minnesota helm striving to get the Golden Gophers back on track and in the process improve last year's overall record of 9-19 and Big Ten mark of 2-16. He will attempt to continue his re-building program with a squad consisting of nine letterman, three non-lettering returnees and four promising new freshman.

Three seniors stop the list. They are Tim Hanson, a 6-5 forward who played in all 28 games last year and averaged 6.5 points per outing; David Holmgren, a 7-0 center who was slowed after knee surgery but still managed to see action in nine games; and Kim Zurcher, a 6-2 guard who played in 27 games and averaged 9.0 points per assignment.

Two juniors are available.....Ray Gaffney, a 6-2 guard who started 27 times last season and averaged 7.1 points per game, and Jon Retzlaff, a 6-2 guard who came to Minnesota as a walk-on and saw limited duty in 10 games.

That makes the sophomore class the backbone of the squad, and six of the letterman returning for the 1987-88 fit into that category. The improvement they show and their ability to contribute the second time around will determine, to a great extent, Minnesota's success this season.

Willie Burton, a 6-7 forward; Jim Shikenjanski, a 6-9 center; and Richard Coffey, a 6-6 forward, rank at the head of the class. All three started at various times during the '86-'87 campaign, and all three showed promise for the future.

Also in the picture as returning sophomore letterman are Connell Lewis and Terence Williams, both 6-1 guards. Mario Green, 6-2 guard who was redshirted last year after shoulder surgery, and Melvin Newbern, a 6-4 guard, also are available.

And that leaves the freshman class to fill in Minnesota's remaining holes. Included among the yearlings are Walter Bond, a 6-5 forward; Kevin Lynch, a 6-5 guard-forward; Marlon Maxey, a 6-8 center; and Erik Wilson, a 6-10 center.

A year ago Minnesota shot only .450 from the field (.373 from the three-point range) and averaged only 29.9 rebounds in Big Ten play. Its opponents shot .527 from the field (.433 in the three-point department), and Big Ten foes registered 33.2 rebounds per game.

Those were two major disadvantages that contributed heavily to Minnesota's lack of success during the conference season a year ago, and Coach Haskins knows the Golden Gophers must improve this season if they are to be more successful.

HEAD COACH CLEM HASKINS

Clem Haskins, 43, was named head basketball coach at the University of Minnesota in April of 1986, and he will be holding the reins of the Golden Gopher cagers for the second time in 1987-88.

Haskins came to Minnesota from Western Kentucky where he was the head coach for six seasons, compiling an overall record of 101-73 with the Hilltoppers.

In 1985-86, Western Kentucky finished 23-8 and gained a berth in the NCAA tournament where it eventually fell in the second round to the University of Kentucky.

"I am really excited about the job of head basketball coach at the University of Minnesota," Haskins said. "Anyone in my profession wants to coach THE state university, and that in itself makes the position here very attractive."

Haskins knows his job with the Golden Gophers remains a tough one, however. "The Big Ten is an excellent basketball conference," he pointed out. "I have great respect for the teams and their coaches, but I feel that in time we will be able to compete respectably even though it may take three or four years of rebuilding for us to get back into that kind of position."

Ranking as one of the most popular athletic figures in Western Kentucky history, Haskins assumed the coaching reins at his alma mater in the spring of 1980 and wasted little time making his presence known there.

His 1980-81 Hilltoppers reeled off 21 wins (The school's 25th 20-victory season) against only 8 losses, won the Ohio Valley Conference regular season and tournament titles, and represented that league in the NCAA Tournament. Along the way, Haskins became the first "rookie" coach in OVC history to be named conference Coach-of-the-Year and he was honored by NBC-TV as its "Rookie Coach-of-the -Year."

He then guided his 1981-82 Toppers to co-championship honors in the OVC and an appearance in the NIT where they were eliminated by eventual runner-up Purdue. The 1981-82 WKU five wound up 19-10. His 1982-83 cagers, the University's first to compete in the tough Sun Belt Conference, went 12-16 while trying to adjust to their new environment. The 1983-84 squad was a deceptively strong 12-17 in a rebuilding year. Haskins' youthful 1984-85 five was one of the most feared .500 clubs around and finished just one game out of fourth place in the rugged, senior dominated Sun Belt. And then there was the 23-8 record of 1985-86.

However, Haskins' name was first associated with Hilltopper cage successes after he came to the Western campus in the fall of 1963 as a highly touted All-Stater from Taylor County High School.

He went on to become perhaps the most dominant player in the history of the OVC. "Clem the Gem" was, and remains, the only player in the league's history to be named the OVC Player-of-the-Year three consecutive seasons. A consensus All-America choice as a senior, he was named to various All-American teams in each of his three varsity years.

When Haskins graduated he held Hilltopper records for: points in a game (55 vs Middle Tennessee as a sophomore--still both school and OVC marks); field goals in a game (in that same game and again, still school and league standards); three-year career assists (still a record); three year career points; career scoring average; career field goals; and career field goal attempts.

His 1,680 career points rank him number two on the school's three-year list and his career scoring average (22.1) is still second among Hilltoppers.

The three Western teams he played on won 66 of 81 games, a winning percentage of .815. The 1964-65 club went to the quarter-finals of the NIT and the 1965-66 and 1966-67 teams claimed OVC titles en route to consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament. During his senior year the Toppers ran off one string of 21 straight victories--again, still school and OVC records.

Haskins was the third player selected in the National Basketball Association draft in 1967 and went on to play nine outstanding seasons with the Chicago Bulls (1967-70), Phoenix Suns (1970-74), and Washington Bullets (1974-76).

After returning to the Western campus in 1977 to serve as a part-time assistant on Coach Jim Richards staff, Haskins moved up to full-time assistant status the following year when Gene Keady, current Purdue Head Coach, took over the program. The three Hilltopper teams he worked with as an assistant won 54 of 87 games (.621), a league title (1979-80), two league tournaments (1977-78 and 1979-80), and twice represented the OVC in the NCAA Tournament.

Haskins, who holds the Bachelor of Science (1967) and the Master of Arts (1971) degrees from Western, is married to the former Yvette Penick and they have three children—Clemette, Lori, and Brent.

MILTON BARNES - ASSISTANT COACH

Milton Barnes, 28, is in his second year as a member of the University of Minnesota basketball coaching staff after being lured to Gold Country by top man Clem Haskins.

Barnes came to Minnesota from the University of Detroit where he served as the top aide in 1985-86. Prior to that, Barnes had held posts of graduate assistant, part-time assistant, and full-time assistant at Kent State, Eastern Michigan University, and at Detroit.

"I feel very good about the opportunity to be on the staff at Minnesota," Barnes said. "I have a great deal of confidence in the potential of the basketball program and the University of Minnesota, and it is an honor to work with Coach Clem Haskins."

Haskins said he was "really excited" about having Barnes on the Minnesota staff. "It is great to have a young coach like Milton with us," Haskins said. "He adds class, charisma, and knowledge of the game to our program. He also has a fine rapport with the players, and that is a real plus in basketball today."

A product of Saginaw, Michigan, Barnes was a basketball standout in high school there and went on to play four years at Albion College before being graduated in 1979. He was an all-conference selection his junior year and senior seasons and served as team captain in his final campaign.

JAY WILLIAMS - ASSISTANT COACH

Jay Williams was tabbed by Head Basketball Coach Clem Haskins as one of his assistants on his first coaching staff at the University of Minnesota.

Williams, 34, is a native of Mishawake, Indiana, and graduated from Penn High School there in 1971. He competed in track, tennis, and basketball at that level and gained prep All-America honors in basketball.

Then Williams enrolled at the University of Oklahoma where he was a three year starter and team captain as a senior. He received his B.S. degree from Oklahoma in 1976.

During the 1976-77 campaign, Williams held a graduate assistant's post at Central State University in Oklahoma and received his M.S. degree in the process.

In 1977-78, Williams was as assistant under Haskins at Western Kentucky. That stint was followed by tours of duty at UW Milwaukee, Purdue, and Northern Illinois, and he joined the Golden Gopher staff after three years at that latter school.

At Minnesota, Williams handles the bulk of the scouting and recruiting chores for Coach Haskins as well as assists with the normal on-the-floor coaching duties.

Married, Williams and his wife, Shelley, have a 2-year old daughter, Brittany.

DON EVANS - ASSISTANT COACH

Don Evans again joins the Clem Haskins team of coaches for the 1987-88 basketball season at the University of Minnesota and his expertise is a welcome commodity for the Golden Gophers.

Evans hails from Owensboro, Kentucky, and he was graduated from Daviess High School there in 1972. Then it was on to Brescia and Kentucky Wesleyan before enrolling at Western in 1976 where he was introduced to Coach Haskins and served as a student manager in basketball until being graduated.

He received his B.S. degree in business accounting and physical education in 1981 from Western and a year later his M.A. degree in physical education from that same institution.

His coaching career began during those years from 1981 through 1983 when he served as a graduate assistant at Western Kentucky. Then Evans was an assistant coach at Trimble County High School in Kentucky for one year before returning to Western Kentucky as an assistant coach for the 1984-85 and 1985-86 campaigns under Coach Haskins.

Still single, Evans is an avid golfer, likes to fish, and enjoys listening to music in his spare time.

DAN KOSMOSKI - VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH

Dan Kosmoski remains on the University of Minnesota campus in 1987-88 to serve as a volunteer coach under Clem Haskins.

Kosmoski is a graduate of the University of Minnesota and played basketball for the Golden Gophers during the 1975, 1976, and 1977 campaigns.

In fact the 1977 team, of which Kosmoski was an integral part, set a U of M record, a 24-3 won-loss record.

A product of Owatonna, Minnesota, the 30 year old Kosmoski got his real start in athletics there where he earned 11 varsity letters in track, football, and basketball.

He was an All-State selection in both football and basketball in his senior year, and he was named the Jesse Owens Athlete of the Year from Owatonna in 1975.

After receiving his B.S. degree from Minnesota, Kosmoski began his coaching career as an assistant to former teammate Phil Saunders at Golden Valley Lutheran College.

At Golden Valley, Kosmoski was responsible for recruiting, academic advising, and scouting in addition to normal on-the-floor coaching duties. Golden Valley teams during that span from 1977 through 1984 compiled a record of 110-37, won five Central Conference titles and 3 JC Regional championships.

ABOUT THE "U"

When the University of Minnesota was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on the east bank of the Mississippi River with little more than the pioneers' faith in education.

The school struggled financially in its early years and was forced to close during the Civil War. But the institution survived, partly because of the guidance and financial aid of Minneapolis businessman John Sargent Pillsbury, who is known as "the Father of the University." The Morrill Act or Land-Grant Act, signed into law by President Lincoln in 1862, also played a major role in the school's survival by giving each state land to be used to provide education for the people of the state.

From those faltering origins, the University has grown into the single greatest center of creativity in the state. The students it educates, the ideas it generates and the medical, scientific, agricultural and economic activities it stimulates represent an enormous resource that contributes directly to Minnesota's economic, intellectual, and cultural life.

Today, the University of Minnesota is an international research institution, a land-grant school with a strong tradition of education and public service, and a metropolitan university. The Twin Cities campus, the largest in the University's five-campus system, is among the most comprehensive in the nation, with 18 colleges that offer a full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs in northeastern Minnesota. The Morris campus, in the western part of the state, provides a four-year liberal arts program. And two year technical colleges in Crookston, in northwestern Minnesota, and Waseca, in southern Minnesota, provide paraprofessional and technical education, primarily in agriculture-related fields.

Under the leadership of its president, Kenneth H. Keller, the University has embarked on a course designed to build on its traditions of excellence to make the University one of the top five public institutions of higher education in the nation. Keller's plan, entitled "Commitment to Focus", is aimed at concentrating the University's efforts and resources on what the institution does best. By focusing on the special capabilities of the University, Keller hopes to foster cooperation rather than competition among the state's higher education institutions.

Research is key among those special capabilities. Research accomplishments at the University have improved the lives—sometimes even saved the lives—of people throughout the world.

Among the achievements that have come from the University researchers have been the continuing success of the world's leading kidney transplant program at the University of Minnesota Hospital and Clinic, the development of the phenomenally successful wheat variety known as 'Eva' wheat, the development of the world's first total body X-ray scanner, the isolation of uranium isotope U-235, the virtual elimination of dozens of poultry and livestock diseases, and the production of a live calf from freeze-dried sperm. In addition to fostering research projects that have obvious and immediate benefits, the University is a center for the basic research that makes scientific breakthroughs possible.

Service to the people of Minnesota is another way the University plays an important role in the quality of life in the state. More than 150 University programs reach out to Minnesotans, solving problems and bringing to communities the University's vast store of knowledge. The Minnesota Extension Service, for example, reaches almost a third of the people of Minnesota each year through almost 22,000 educational programs.

A variety of cultural and sports events also brings Minnesotans in touch with the University. Performances by major dance troupes are highlights of the year. Large crowds attend Gopher football, basketball, and hockey games. The Centennial Showboat and free concerts on the Northrup Mall are popular summer attractions. Children enjoy the touch-and-see room at the James Ford Bell Museum of Natural History and the animal barns of the St. Paul campus.

Of course, one of the University's most important contributions to the state is its graduates. At the University, students are exposed to knowledge—the newest and the most ancient—and emerge prepared to tackle today's problems.
