LOCKER NOTICE

THE FASCINATING LAND OF THE ANZAC

Australia, on the bottom of the world, always has a fascination for us. Possibly some of us never will get over the early impressions which our geography gave us, that everything grew wrong side up and as different as could be. But in fact there are many things about the island continent that make it different and hence interesting. Miss Graccio Leggo Houlder, a native daughter of Australia, will talk to the summer session on Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 in the Music Auditorium, and tell many of these interesting things. She is making a lecture tour of America for the first time and finding eager audiences everywhere. (This in spite of the fact that she cannot report an acquaintance with Uncle Bim.)

The lecture will be well illustrated with many colored lantern slides, showing both city and rural life in Australia, including fine reproductions of the bird and animal life, particularly the several types of marsupials. The lecture is open to the public.

NOTICE TO DEPARTMENTS

A departmental budget record has been devised by the Business Office which will permit departments to maintain a record of obligations against their budgets. The record is so devised that it can be checked with the budget control records in this office. A number of departments have already adopted this form. Any others interested may apply to this office for instructions and forms.

On and after August 1, 1926, all automobiles owned by the University must have a University number. Departmental number series should be abandoned. TIMELY LECTURE FRIDAY EVENING

Every resident of Minnesota should be interested in the problem of the lowering of the lake levels, which is assuming dangerous proportions. The future of the state as a playground is at stake, and every citizen should endeavor to secure all possible information regarding the causes of the condition.

Mr. H. M. Wheeler, Chief Lecturer of the U. S. Forestry Service, will discuss one, at least of these causes in his lecture on Reforestation and Lake Levels, Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the Music Auditorium. There is no question about the effect upon water supplies of the cutting of the forests; the question remains, what can be done about it by growing new forests. To aid in the presentation of the problem Mr. Wheeler will use many colored lantern slides and some motion pictures.

REICTAL ON FRIDAY

This week's musical offering will be given by Mr. Abe Pepinsky, of the Faculty of the Music Department and conductor of the University Symphony Orchestra, and Mr. Henry E. Gribenow, tenor, of the department of music of the Minneapolis public schools. Mr. Pepinsky will play solos for both the violin and viola, making an interesting comparison between the two instruments—or perhaps it would be proper to say between the two sizes of the same instrument. Mr. Gribenow will contribute groups of songs. Miss Winifred Reichmuth will act as accompanist.
