SECOND SUMMER TERM BEGINS MONDAY UMD will offer 145 courses and 10 workshops along with a complete recreation program for the five-week Summer Session term starting Monday. Workshop topics include cast metal sculpture, vocational education institute, teaching reading through English, workshops in transportation, construction and manufacturing, dynamics of interviewing, problem solving by television, and two Majorie Arch sewing seminars. Students who have not already registered for second term should do so on Monday at the Records Office, 104 Administration building.

MEDICAL FUNDS FORTHCOMING? After weeks of rumors, the word from Washington this week is that Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Casper Weinberger has approved a \$6.6-million grant to build a new UMD School of Medicine building. Once official, it would allow UMD to ask the 1976 Legislature for an additional \$1.4-million to complete the \$8.2-million project. It also could trigger construction of the \$1.9-million medical library, funds for which were approved in 1973.

ALL ABOARD! The University Singers leave Tuesday, July 22, for a four week concert tour of Finland, Russia, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. The 40-member choir, directed by Vernon H. Opheim, will participate in summer festivals in several countries and will premiere a new work by composer Bengt Johansson July 24 in Helsinki.
