## COMMENCEMENT NOTICE

1. Baccalaureate Service, Sunday, June 16. Seniors and faculties will assemble in academic costume on the campus knoll at 10:30 a.m. and will march from there to the University Armory, where the exercises will begin at eleven o'clock. Placards will indicate the points of assembly for the respective college groups.

2. Commencement rehearsal. All seniors will assemble in the University Armory on Friday, June 14, at 9:30 o'clock, for a rehearsal of the graduation procedure. It is important that all seniors be present.

3. Commencement, Monday, June 17. All candidates for degrees will assemble in Cap and Gown at nine o'clock on the Parade Ground at places indicated by the placards for the respective groups.

4. Senior Women. Senior women taking part in the Commencement exercises should wear plain white collars, light dresses and dark shoes. Flowers should not be worn at the exercises.

5. Senior Men. Senior men should wear white collars, dark ties, dark suits, and dark shoes.

6. Faculties. On June 17 all faculties will assemble in the Armory at 9:15.

7. Participation in Functions. While all members of the senior class may participate in senior activities and the Baccalaureate service, the exercises on Commencement Day are definitely restricted to those seniors who will receive their degrees on June 17.

8. Invitations and tickets. These may be secured at the Information Window, Registrar's Office. The number of invitations issued to each candidate is limited to ten, but any reasonable number of tickets may be had upon request.

## NOTICE TO ALL STUDENTS REGARDING THE REFUND OF GENERAL AND MILITARY DEPOSITS

All students who are now in residence, or those who have been in residence this year, but who did not secure a refund of their general or military deposits when they left, may secure a cash refund of the same during the week of June 11 to 15, inclusive. Students who fail to avail themselves of this opportunity will have their refunds mailed to their home address sometime after the opening of the first term of the summer session. **STUDENTS WHO WISH TO SECURE A CASH REFUND, MUST GET THE SAME DURING THE WEEK OF JUNE 11 TO 15. NO CASH REFUNDS WILL BE GIVEN OUT AFTER THESE DATES, FOR GENERAL DEPOSITS OR MILITARY DEPOSITS PAID IN SOMETIME DURING THE PRESENT ACADEMIC YEAR.**

Students who receive a cash refund are reminded that after securing the same they are no longer privileged to borrow University property, or incur in any way, any additional charges. Students taking books from the University Library, are cautioned against incurring fines for late return of books, after they have had a clearance signed at the Library.

### Refund Procedure

1. Before calling at this office for a refund, students should make sure that all University property that has been loaned to them is returned. This includes the checking in of all lockers, and locker keys, library books and cards, athletic equipment, military equipment, etc. Lockers in the Library, Old Library, and Folwell Hall may be turned in at Window 23, Registrar's Office. Students will be charged for any equipment that is not returned when the refund is issued.

2. Students should call for a clearance slip, at the Registrar's office.

3. This clearance slip must be signed by the proper person at all offices designated thereon. No refunds can be given unless the clearance slip is so filled out.

4. On returning the clearance slip to the Registrar's office, the refund order will be written.

### REFUND ORDER SCHEDULE

In accordance with the notice printed above, students may secure a cash refund by following the procedure listed.

For the purpose of issuing these refunds, the students will be divided into alphabetical groups. **STUDENTS MUST REPORT ON THE DAY SCHEDULED FOR THEIR GROUP. IT WILL NOT BE POSSIBLE TO TAKE STUDENTS AHEAD OF THE DAYS SCHEDULED FOR THEM.** Students who secure a clearance on the day set aside for them, but who do not get a refund order that day, may come in the next day for refund order.
