## J. L. A. UPHOLDS MEMORIAL PLAN

Committee Answers Objections to the Main Memorial Given in Wednesday's Daily

To the editor of the Daily:  
In reply to the objections mentioned in your editorial of Wednesday regarding the text of the Old Main Memorial petition, the Committee wish to say, that it has incorporated nothing in the text of its address to the Board of Regents that can be construed as objectionable.

In answer to the first of the objections offered, namely, that "the important central location of the Old Main site made the ground on which the walls stand in great demand for building purposes," we would beg to be understood as offering no unsurmountable obstacle to the erection of any building upon any portion of the old site. The Regents themselves are the best judges as to the use of the small plot required for the Memorial. If at any future time the ground be needed for building purposes, certainly no one will be obliged to deplore any expenditure of hard-won funds when it shall become necessary to sweep away the monument. It is, however, more than likely, even if any building at all equivalent in size ever replace the old one, that such will, in its modern construction, so vary from the Old Main in proportions as to admit of the retention of the south-east or south-west angle of the old rear walls.

## HOW THE AMENDED CONST. WILL READ

Text of Athletic Association Constitution with Amendments Inserted—All Should Read

The amendments themselves appear in heavy type.

### Art. III.

Sec. 1. Any professor or student of the University of Minnesota shall be eligible to membership in this association, and may become a member by subscribing to the constitution, and by paying an annual due of five dollars (\$5.00), which shall entitle him to free admission to any athletic contest held on Northrop Field for one year.

Sec. 2. Any graduate of the University of Minnesota may become a member of this association, without the privilege of voting, by fulfilling the conditions specified in Sec. 1.

### Art. VII.

Sec. 1. There shall be a board of athletic control composed of officers of this association and four student members, who shall be chosen by the association, two members of the faculty, to be chosen by that body, and four members of the alumni, to be chosen by the directors of the General Alumni Association of the University of Minnesota.

Sec. 4. The Vice-president and one undergraduate academic member shall each hold office for a period of two (2) years, beginning at the annual election in February, 1903. The secretary and one undergraduate member from the College of Engineering or the School of Mines shall each hold office for a period of two years, beginning at the annual election in February, 1905.

### Art. X.

There shall be an annual meeting of this association the first Saturday in February.

## STARRETT AND BLACKBURN WIN IN HOTLY CONTESTED ELECTION

Battle of Ballots Rages from Eight a. m. till Two p. m. and it Takes Five More Hours to Make the Count—Anxious Groups Gather to Learn Results of Count—Scenes at Poles Exciting but Orderly

### ALL OVER TILL NEXT YEAR

Yesterday morning the long looked for '07 Gopher election was pulled off. As early as 9 o'clock, some of the Sophomores were waiting to cast their ballots.

There was no stuffing of ballots or electioneering. The committee prevented the former by stationing two men at the polls. Registrar Johnson prevented electioneering by ruling that none should be done within fifty feet of the polls.

The strength of the class did not make itself manifest until about ten o'clock. From that time until the closing of the polls there was a steady stream of prospective Juniors waiting to cast their first ballot.

At two o'clock, the judges of election left the Registrar's office, and cheered by the entire Sophomore class, repaired to the Y. M. C. A. building to count the votes.

It took the judges five hours to finish the count. Long before seven o'clock a group of anxious candidates gathered to hear the report of the committee.

Finally two members of the committee came down stairs to break the news. Some slunk off unhappily to eat a cold supper, while the successful candidates received enough congratulations to last them until this morning's breakfast.

Out of the candidates for associate positions, there were two associate artists, four academic men, three associate girls, and two engineers chosen.

#### GIRL'S BASKET BALL.

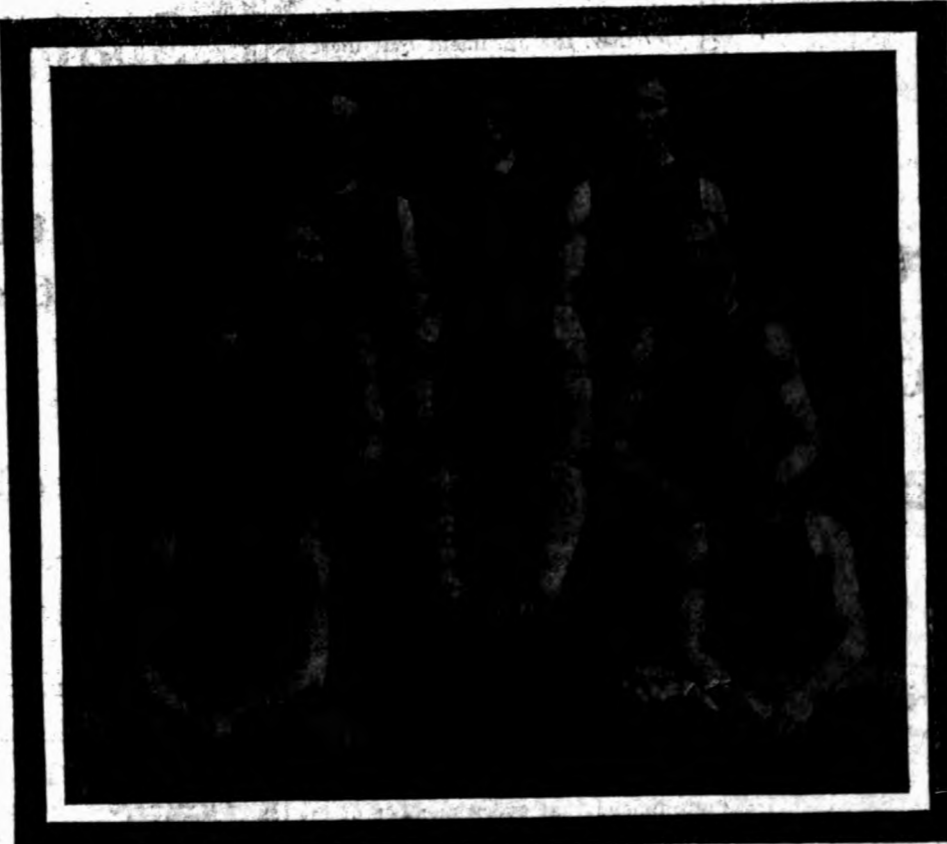
'Varsity Quint Plays Practice Game With Drummond Hall.

The Main Memorial scheme just now being pushed by the U. L. A. is endorsed by the Minnesota Daily. However, thru an error in make-up, Wednesday's issue of the Daily contained an article setting forth objections to the retention of an angle of Old Main for memorial purposes. This article was news-matter containing the opinion of one of the faculty on the matter. In the make-up of the paper the article was shifted to the editorial page and the head omitted. It therefore was taken for an editorial and the committee appointed by the U. L. A. reply to the objections in a communication in this issue.

The policy of the Daily is in perfect accord with that of the committee, which includes members of the Daily staff. The petition to the Regents will be circulated this week and next week.

The statement by Dr. Williams which appeared in yesterday's Daily left little to be said in the way of argument on the proposed increase in the alumni representation on the athletic board. It is with the desire of keeping the question before the mind of the student body that we continue the discussion of this subject.

There seems to be an impression that such an increased alumni representation, and perhaps an increased faculty representation, is necessary to protect athletics from the pernicious effects of politics. We do not believe either that any such danger exists or that this is the way to meet it.

Tho there always will be keen rivalry for positions on the board and clever political work in connection with the election, yet these things are right and proper. We do not believe that the fact that a man is a politician renders him unfit to serve, nor do we believe that Minnesota students will ever knowingly elect a dishonest or incompetent man, certainly never a dangerous number of such men.

Granting that there is a possibility of political corruption in the student part of the board neutralising this danger will never bring reform. Left to themselves the students will remedy the evil and become more upright and more loyal by so doing.

Further, the argument that increased alumni representation will bring increased interest on the part of the alumni seems wanting in force. Its probable result will be to increase the number of interested alumni by two.

Any attempt to increase the faculty representation is even more ill-advised according to our view of the situation.

The faculty always have and always will render an invaluable service to the cause of clean athletics, but to shift the control of athletics to the faculty and alumni, who may also be faculty members would be to deprive the student body of the greatest advantage of college athletics—personal interest and responsibility.

Thru the General University Committee the faculty has a powerful instrument for guarding the purity and honesty of our athletics. It would seem that the faculty could do more thru this instrument than thru an added member on the board.

There is much to be said on both sides of this question and we would recommend that every member of the association give it his earnest consideration between now and January 21.

One of the most vital of the sentiments which goes to make up and bind together a university is a pride in the past of the institution. Minnesota has a past now covering more than half a century. A past, which

more than we realize, shapes the present. It is a part of which to be proud. It speaks of struggle and hardship, of a fight for existence, won against odds.

It is not necessary to tell the details of the plan for preserving a portion of the Old Main, they have al-

ready been set forth. We only ask that every Minnesotan do his part toward keeping this monument.

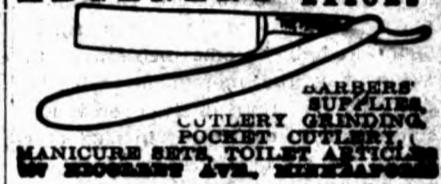

All that the petitioners ask is a small corner twenty feet high, the sides of which shall measure at their base about ten feet.

The second objection, that "it would be but a few years before they would crumble into disreputable decay," seems one of inconsequence when it is considered that this masonry has already stood since 1856. Here in the State of Minnesota historic structures are notoriously treated with shameful lack of respect—witness the Sibley House at Mendota, and the towers at Snelling, but in other states and countries many of us have seen vine-clad relics of masonry which have withstood the test of the elements for centuries together. The committee contends that the Old Main Building is historic, and fails to see why its walls or any portions of them are more likely to crumble into disreputable decay in the capacity of a monument than they were in the capacity of a Main Building.

We have ascertained that the faculty member who raised the above two objections spoke off-hand to the reporter who interviewed him, without adequate information as to the spirit of the movement. Furthermore, being neither an alumnus nor for long a resident at the University, he naturally lacked the finer feelings of sentiment and association which in a great measure prompt this petition.
