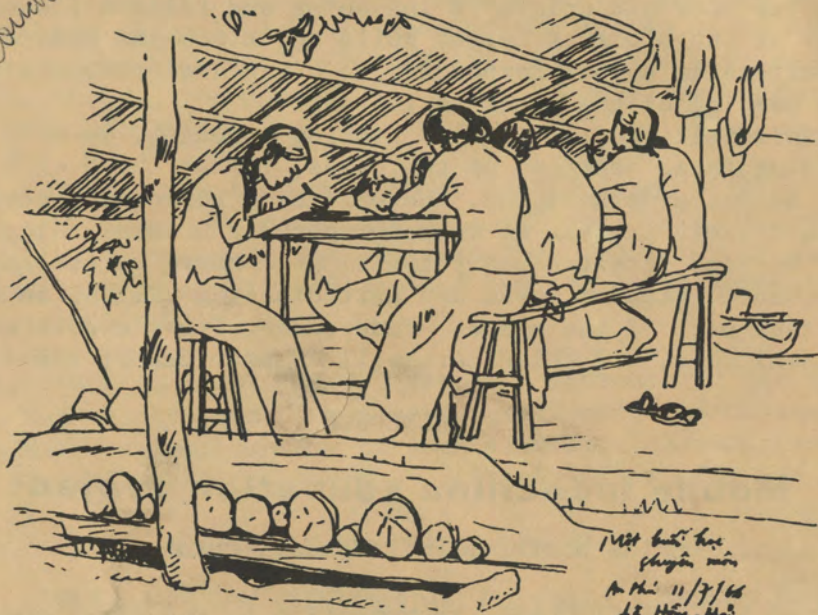

ANTIWAR CLASS

Last summer on the U of M campus the strike Constituent Assembly sponsored the first antiwar summer school class. Many campus and community antiwar organizations contributed teachers and resources to the class. It lasted nine weeks, involving over 150 people in study and action concerning the ten year old crisis in Indochina and related issues. Many of the students helped build the Hiroshima Week demonstrations in August responding to Nixon's continued air war and bombing of the dikes in Vietnam.

This fall, reflecting our growing strength, we will be holding three sections of the class, two at the U of M and one at Gustavus Adolphus. We will seek to involve people in a dynamic process of increasing their understanding of the war and simultaneously their commitment to the antiwar movement. Student input and participation will be an important part of the class. Independent Study credit will be available, and child care will be provided at the class.

Oct. 3 & 4 FIRST CLASS Introduction to the class and two films. "Why Vietnam?" is a 1965 production by US Dept. of Defense featuring Rusk, Johnson, and MacNamara explaining our escalating commitment in Vietnam. "So the People Should Know" was produced by the Pentagon Papers Project

Oct. 10 & 11 HISTORY OF VIETNAM Panel lecture by members of the Committee of Concerned Asian Scholars (CCAS)

Oct. 17 & 18 CULTURE OF VIETNAM Paula Giese was an assistant professor of Humanities at the U of M for five years. She will show how the strength and beauty of the Vietnamese resistance to American aggression has grown out of their culture and history.

Regional Antiwar Conference

Teach-In October 21 featuring Tony Russo of the Pentagon Papers case.

Oct. 24 & 25 ECOCIDE A visual presentation will reveal the use of chemical and biological weapons on the people and countryside of Vietnam. It will be accompanied by a panel from Science for Vietnam (SVN)

Oct. 31, Nov. 1 AIR WAR The "Automated Battlefield" slide show depicts the changing nature of the warfare in Indochina and will explain some of the contemporary economics of war production. Dave Zilly, a Vietnam veteran and member of the Honeywell Project/NAM will comment on the current crisis.

Nov. 7 & 8 WAR AND TECHNOLOGY A video-tape of Hilary Rose, chairwoman of the British Society for Social Responsibility in Science, will discuss the complicity of science with genocide in Vietnam and how the establishment coopts scientists.

Nov. 14 & 15 IMPERIALISM The NET documentary "Who Invited Us?" deals with US military interventions from the Mexican-American War through Vietnam. (Banned from TV) It will be accompanied by a speaker from SDS.

Nov. 21 & 22 WAR AND ECONOMICS A video-tape of the testimony of Dick Roberts, a Marxist economist and staff writer for "The Militant", from the Corporate War Crimes Investigation will show the relationship between the war in Southeast Asia and the current economic crisis. It will be followed by a discussion led by members of Economists for Peace and the Young Socialist Alliance.

Nov. 28 & 29 RACISM AND THE WAR This class will feature the film "No Vietnamese Ever Called Me Nigger" and will focus in on both racial discrimination against oppressed nationalities in the military and how racism is used to justify the genocide of Asians in Indochina.

Dec. 5 & 6 WOMEN AND THE WAR A variety of issues and questions are involved in looking at women and the war; included are the struggle to control one's own destiny, the roles of women in Vietnamese society, and the effects of the war on the lives of women in this country. These will be discussed by a panel of local women activists.
