**EDITORIAL COMMENT.**

Now that the championship game is a thing of the past partisans of Minnesota are trying to figure out how it all happened. No excuses are being offered. Chicago seems to have won fairly, although there is a lurking suspicion in the minds of those who saw the game that potentially at least Minnesota was as strong or stronger than Chicago. It is a strange fact that Minnesota teams never seem to be playing up to their full capacity. Outside of the last quarter, the team did not seem to be fighting the fight of which it was capable.

It is easy to sit back and criticize after a game is over. But we mean no criticism. The team played a wonderful game and was beaten only because the luck broke well for an equally good team; by which we mean that Chicago has a team of which she may justly be proud. However the fighting spirit shown by the Gophers during the last quarter of the game was an inspiring thing to see and after the first sting of defeat had passed the sentiment was unanimous that Minnesota has a powerful team. There is no criticism, no excuse to offer. We simply look to the team to defeat Illinois next Saturday and keep Minnesota in second place. The team has reflected great credit upon itself, its coach, and upon the University because Minnesota cannot claim the championship this year does not lessen the glory of second place nor the championships we have had in the majority of the years since 1905.

Would Pay for Burned Lumber.  
The All-University Council has undertaken the responsibility of collecting the \$80 demanded by the contractor who lost his lumber in the bonfire the night the team left for Wisconsin. At the mass meeting Friday evening \$26.20 was collected to go toward paying for the lumber. 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**GOPHERS FIGHTING GAMELY ARE DEFEATED BY COACH STAGG'S BATTLING MAROONS**

first downs to 12 of Chicago, gaining 247 yards by rushing to the Maroons' 216. Shaughnessy punted 14 times to Norgren's 10. His punts netted more on the average than his adversaries. The Gophers' gains were counteracted however, by their misplays. Their fumbles lost them 105 yards. The Gophers barely held their own in the first half, but greatly outplayed the Maroons in the second. Their endeavors should have been worth more than one touchdown.

Minnesota had fought as desperately throughout the game as she did after Chicago's second score, it is certain that there would have been a different story to tell. The Gophers until the last quarter played a conservative game, using rarely any open plays. These tactics proved a slow and generally a fruitless way of making gains, for the Chicago forwards were coached for the line rushes. Nevertheless the Gophers hammered away with them until it was too late. After Norgren's second score, Minnesota grew furious. Then it was that she opened up and took chances, and then it was that she made big and easy gains. A steady march to the Maroon goal won a touchdown.

Shaughnessy, Solon, Lawler and McAlmon were the stars for Minnesota. Shaughnessy's punting and line-rushing were good for gains whenever used. He played hard at all times, giving the Maroons all the trouble they wanted in stopping his plunges and covering his punts. Solon showed up with even more brilliancy than in the Badger game. He was everywhere the ball went, down under punts and in the line. He probably carried the ball more effectively than his teammates and was therefore called upon to carry the ball over the Maroons' goal line for the touchdown. He then kicked goal. Lawler proved himself equal to the occasion Saturday. His playing was marked with precision and good judgment. He handed Norgren's long tumbling punts with apparent ease. He managed the team masterfully, especially in the first period. McAlmon assumed the duties of the captain in the absence of Aldsworth. His work was excellent. Being more carefully watched than his running-mates, he was less fortunate in getting away for long gains. However, he did respond with good gains when called upon. Mattern played a fighting game, but having been marked by Stagg as a man to watch, he was not able to effect any

of the sweeping end runs that characterized his work at Madison. The Maroons showed a keen desire, to lay him out when ever the opportunity was offered, but as at Wisconsin he would not be laid out no matter how roughly handled. Al Bierman alternated with Mattern at the right half position. He played a prominent part in the dashing plays of the last quarter. Robertson opposing Des Jarden, had few minutes of rest, but nevertheless gave the giant Chicagoan the hardest tussle he has had since they met on Marshall field last year. Robertson's passing was unmarred, which places him in a good position for conference recognition. Ostrom and Sawyer on the left wing of line held their own against Shull and Harris. They were under unusual pressure in opposing the rushes of Norgren and Gray. Dunnigan, supplying for Rosenthal, was called upon for all he had, and he responded well. Thinking that in the absence of the regular guard, the right wing would be easy, the Maroons hit it hard and often. Barron and Dunnigan opposed them with equal might. Stagg recognized the strength of the Gopher line and accordingly coached his men for open work. Bernie Bierman who was elected to take Aldsworth's place at right end was under almost constant pressure. He handled

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all plays that came his way like a veteran, on several occasions picking his man from among a thicket of interference and downing him. Fegan and


Fournier who went in to relieve Bierman at times did splendid work. Norgren and Russell showed up as (Continued on Page Four).

the bright and shining lights for Chicago. Norgren's punting and line-bucking was a special feature of the opponent's work. Russell proved to be a cool, shrewd, and fast quarter. The Maroons were deadly tacklers, seldom allowing a man to slip through their hands. On the other hand the Gophers' displayed poor tackling form. Often it took half a dozen men to down a Chicago runner. Chicago had excellent plays, and carried them out without a hitch. Their line was generally impenetrable, and if occasionally a Gopher did slip through the backs brought him down in short order. The Maroon machine was smooth running as a general rule, each play being executed by the whole team and not by individual.

The National convention of the Catholic Student Association of Amer-

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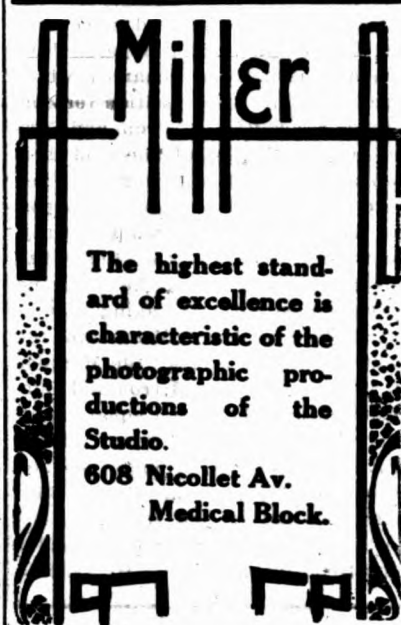
