» Match Notes

► MINNESOTA OPENS BIG TEN HOME SLATE

Minnesota will look to rebound from a 0-2 start in Big Ten play as it hosts Northwestern (9-5, 0-2) and Illinois (10-2, 1-1) this weekend. The Golden Gophers will play Northwestern on Friday, Oct. 3 at 7 p.m. and will take on Illinois on Saturday, Oct. 4 at 7 p.m. Last season the Golden Gophers defeated Northwestern in both meetings, including a 3-0 victory at home on Nov. 8, 2002. Minnesota split the season series with Illinois losing at home in five games and winning at Illinois in four games. Northwestern is led by Erika Lange who is averaging 4.35 kpg and 1.14 blocks per game. Iwona Lodzik is also averaging 4.30 kpg and 2.65 digs per game. Last week Northwestern lost 3-1 at home against Illinois and fell to No. 23 Wisconsin on the road 3-2 after leading 2-0. Illinois defeated Northwestern in four games last week, and lost in four games to No. 23 Wisconsin. Illinois is led by Lisa Arganbright who is averaging 3.91 apg and 1.27 blpg. Melissa Vandrey is also averaging 3.37 kpg and 1.51 dpg. Both matches will be webcast on gophersports.com this weekend by Tom Witschen.

► BUSSE MOVES TO 11TH ON THE MINNESOTA ALL-TIME KILLS LIST

With 39 kills on the weekend, Cassie Busse moved to 11th on the Minnesota list in career kills with 1,098. She is currently 56 kills away from tying Martie Larsen for 10th on the list. With two more kills Busse would become only the 11th player in the history of the program to record 1,100 kills.

► SEVERAL MINNESOTA PLAYERS AMONG BIG TEN LEADERS

Minnesota has several players among the Big Ten leaders in different categories. Cassie Busse is currently first in service aces per game (0.67) and fourth in kills per

game at 4.38. Paula Gentil is first in digs per game at 4.78 dpg. Lindsey Taatjes is ninth in the conference in assists per game at 12.32, while Trisha Bratford is 11th in kills per game at 4.06. In the first weekend of conference play Busse led the Big Ten in kills per game with 5.57 kpg in two matches. Lisa Reinhart was sixth in service aces per game at 0.57 and Paula Gentil was sixth in digs at 3.29.

► GOPHERS END TOUGH NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Minnesota finished non-conference play as one of only two teams in the top 25 to play five or more top 25 opponents. Hawai'i led the nation by playing seven top 25 teams. Minnesota was second with five top 25 opponents. The list included No. 2 Hawai'i, No. 13 UCLA, No. 22 Louisville, No. 3 Florida and No. 6 Northern Iowa. The Golden Gophers defeated No. 6 Northern Iowa on Sept. 17, marking their highest ranked victory since Dec. 5.

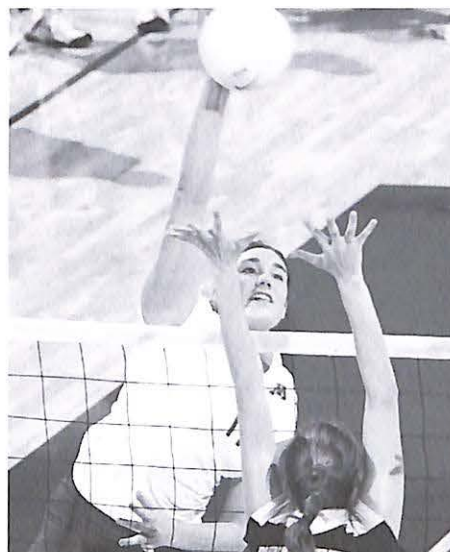
► MINNESOTA FINISHES SECOND AT UF HILTON CLASSIC

Minnesota started Big Ten play 0-2 for the first time since 1993. That season the Golden Gophers managed to regroup to go 14-6 in conference play. In its first match at Indiana, Minnesota suffered its first loss in a Big Ten road opener in eight such matches under head coach Mike Hebert. The Hoosiers won the first two games 30-22 and 30-25. In game three, Indiana led Minnesota 29-26, but the Golden Gophers fought off five match points and led 32-31. However, Indiana responded by scoring the final three points of the game to win 34-32 on its way to claiming the match. In the Purdue match on Sept. 27, the two teams split the first two games each winning 30-25. In the third game, Minnesota had a chance to put the game away as it jumped out to a 28-22 lead. Purdue answered with seven straight points to go up 29-28 and moved on to the 31-29 game three victory to go up 2-1 in the match. Purdue claimed the fourth game 30-24 to win the match, despite a career-high 24 kills, along with nine digs from Cassie Busse and 17 kills from Trisha Bratford.

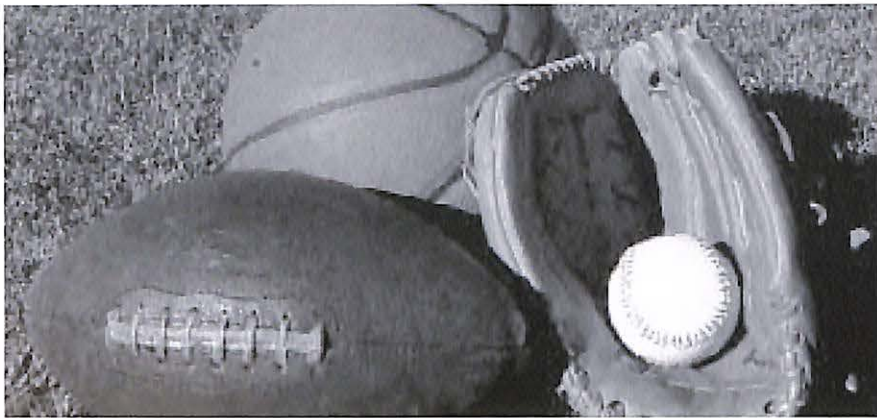

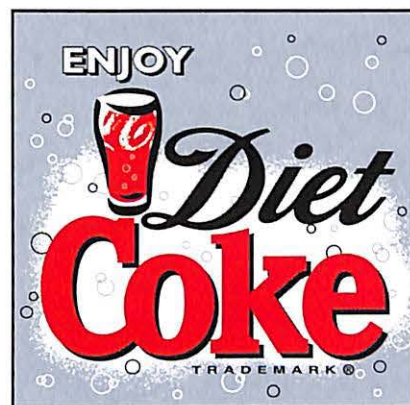

head coach **MIKE HEBERT** »

Last year, Mike Hebert helped guide the Minnesota program to heights it had never reached in Big Ten play the previous 21 seasons. The 2002 squad became the first in the program's history to win the Big Ten title. Before Hebert's arrival in 1996, the program had finished as high as second in Big Ten play three times in 15 years. Hebert has delivered three second place or higher finishes in seven years, including the school's first Big Ten title which was the fifth of his career.

Hebert first stepped into the Sports Pavilion as the head coach of the Golden Gopher volleyball program in 1996. Prior to his arrival, trips to the NCAA Tournament were few and far between. Hebert changed that. His Minnesota program is now an annual entry in the NCAA Tournament. He has guided the Golden Gophers to the big dance in six of his seven years at Minnesota. Three times (1999, 2000 & 2002) in the last four years the Gophers advanced to the Sweet 16, and in all of the NCAA appearances, Minnesota made it into the second round.

During his tenure, Hebert has continued to raise the bar on the program's expectations. This year is no different, as Hebert embarks on his eighth season at Minnesota and his 27th overall in the coaching ranks. Throughout his first seven years Hebert has prepared this program to compete at the highest level. He has also helped turn the Sports Pavilion into one of the best volleyball atmospheres in the nation, as Minnesota has averaged more than 2,000 fans a match since Hebert's arrival as head coach.

Hebert's last four seasons at Minnesota have been special. In 2002, Minnesota set a school record for wins (in the NCAA Era) with 32, and tied a school record for Big Ten victories with 17. Hebert guided the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten championship in school history, and took the team to their third "Sweet Sixteen" in four seasons. The team also produced two All-Americans for the second time in three seasons, had three All-Big Ten players, three all-district players and was fifth in the nation in attendance. For these accomplishments Hebert was named Big Ten Coach of the year for the second time at Minnesota and for the fifth time overall. Hebert is one of only two coaches in Big Ten history to be named the conference coach of the year on five different occasions.

In 2001 Hebert passed two milestones during the season. He coached the 1,000th

match of his coaching career, on Aug. 31, 2001, with the Gophers defeating Radford. On Sept. 19, a Minnesota victory over Iowa marked Hebert's 700th career coaching victory. He became the sixth active NCAA Division I head coach to surpass the 700-win plateau. The 2000 team recorded what was then a school record 30 wins, and came within one point of winning the school's first-ever Big Ten title. The team produced two All-Americans, three All-Big Ten and all-district players, and recorded a school-record 15-match winning streak, Minnesota's only top five ranking in the volleyball program's history and the fourth-best attendance in the nation. The 1999 season saw Minnesota win 27 matches, in what was the third-highest total in the NCAA era of volleyball for the Gophers. Hebert was rewarded with the 1999 Big Ten Coach of the Year award and the 1999 AVCA District Coach of the Year honor.

In Hebert's seven years at Minnesota (1996-2002), the Gophers are 173-66 (.724), 93-47 (.664) in the Big Ten and have participated in six NCAA Tournaments. Minnesota went to the NCAA Tournament in 1996 and 1997, the first time the Gophers had qualified for NCAA postseason play in consecutive seasons. The Gophers have been among the top 12 nationally in attendance in all seven seasons.

Hebert moved to Minnesota for the 1996 season after 13 successful seasons at Big Ten rival Illinois. He led Illinois to four Big Ten titles, two perfect 18-0 conference records and 11 consecutive NCAA tournament appearances, including the Midwest Regional seven times and the NCAA semifinals in 1987 and 1988.

A self-proclaimed program builder, Hebert took the Illinois volleyball program, as well as collegiate volleyball in the Midwest, to a new level. While at Illinois, Hebert's programs continually drew record-setting crowds, leading the nation in attendance in 1992 and 1993. In 1992, Illinois set what was then an NCAA record, drawing 52,666 fans into Huff Hall for 17 home matches.

Hebert coached collegiate volleyball for four years at Pittsburgh (the final two as both the women's and men's coach), three years at New Mexico, 13 years at Illinois and the last seven years at Minnesota. During that time, Hebert has compiled a 745-323 mark and a .698 winning percentage, making him one of the winningest volleyball coaches in the nation. While at Illinois, he had an impressive 323-127 (.718) record, finishing in the upper half of the Big Ten for 11 consecutive years.

In forming the model for consistency and program building, Hebert has posted 20-win seasons in 14 of the last 18 years and a 25-18 (.581) NCAA Tournament record. Hebert was named National Coach of the Year in 1985 after leading the nation with a 39-3 record. He won Big Ten Coach of the Year honors in 1985, 1986, 1988, 1999 and in 2002 and was the president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association from 1985-88.

Hebert added yet another milestone to his successful coaching resume in 1997, earning his 600th career coaching victory with a 3-0 win over Mercer on Sept. 5. In 1992, Hebert collected career win No. 500 as Illinois defeated Purdue, 3-0, in Champaign, Ill. The 1987 season marked the 300th career victory for Hebert and his 100th victory at

ent of the Honda Award, given to the nation's top collegiate volleyball student-athlete. In 1996, Hebert's Minnesota team produced the first Gopher to be named an NCAA first team All-American, outside hitter Katrien DeDecker. In 2002, Minnesota had two All-Americans on the same team for the second time in three seasons with Cassie Busse and Paula Gentil. Both players return to this year's team.

This past summer Hebert coached the U.S. National Team at the Pan American Games. Hebert has held a wide variety of responsibilities on the national and international level. During the summer of 1998, Hebert joined the coaching staff of the USA Men's National Team and head coach Doug Beal as an advisory member. In this capacity, Hebert assists in such areas as talent evaluation, system of play, technical training concepts, program organization and future planning.

Hebert served as head coach of the U.S. women's team competing at the 1991 World University Games in Sheffield, England. The USA women's team also competed in the 1991 Pan American Games in Havana, Cuba. Hebert traveled to the 1989 Canada Cup and 1990 Cuba Cup as part of a series of assignments with the U.S. National Team.

In 1988, Hebert was the head coach of the U.S. National "B" team, which included squad members training for the 1992 Olympic team.

During the summer of 1987, Hebert served as head coach of the U.S. women's team that competed at the World University Games in Yugoslavia. He was the assistant coach of the U.S. women's team at the 1981 World University Games in Romania and served as a head coach of the North team at National Sports Festival VI in 1985.

Hebert began his coaching career at the University of Pittsburgh, where from 1976-79, he compiled a 129-52 mark with the women's team and a 60-21 record as the men's coach. In building the program, he won the EAIW Eastern Region Coach of the Year award in 1978 and 1979.

From 1980-83, Hebert coached the women's team at New Mexico, establishing a 60-57 record and advancing to the NCAA regional championships in 1981 with a 26-17 mark. Hebert was named the Intermountain Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1980.

Hebert received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of California Santa Barbara in 1966, and his Ph.D. in philosophy of education from Indiana in 1974. He is the author of two books, including a co-written auto biography titled *The Fire Still Burns*.

Hebert and his wife Sherry reside in Minneapolis. Hebert has two daughters, Becky (who is married and resides in Mesa, Ariz.) and Hillary (who graduated in June 2000 from the University of Minnesota and attends Denver Law School).

Illinois, making him the first coach in Illinois history to record 100 wins at the school. He recorded his 200th Big Ten victory in 1998, as Minnesota defeated nationally-ranked Ohio State at the Sports Pavilion in four games.

Hebert has also assembled an all-star list of talented players during his college coaching career, as he has produced 13 All-Americans, including three-time All-American and U.S. national team member Mary Eggers. Eggers was the 1987 recipi-

Junior outside hitter Erin Martin is the emotional spark plug for the Golden Gophers.

When studying weather, the barometer is used to analyze atmospheric pressure. But the Minnesota volleyball team has its own kind of barometer. It is used to gauge the pressure in game situations. It is junior outside hitter Erin Martin. And the pressure readings can be gathered from her emotional way of playing on the court.

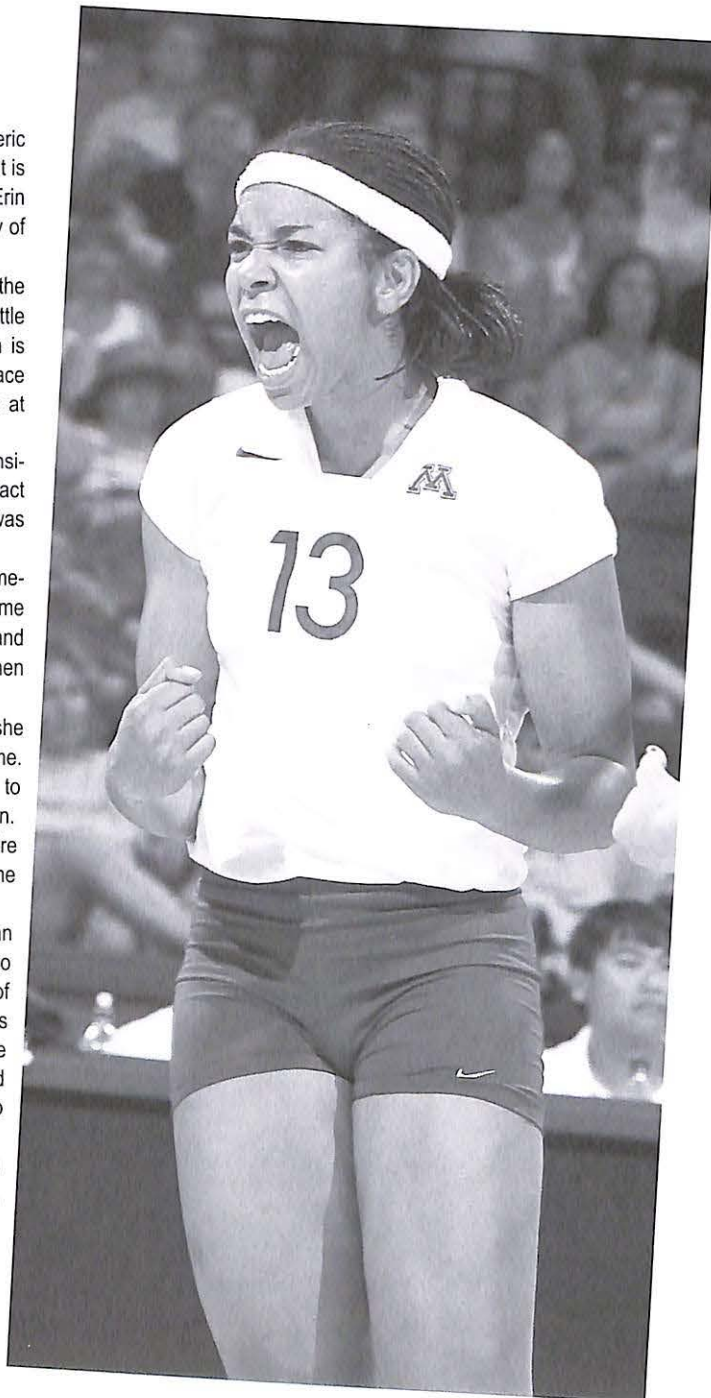

The sport of volleyball has always gotten Martin riled up. It's where she always gives 100 percent and encourages her teammates to do the same. Through her play and words, she encourages her teammates to continue to play hard and persevere, even when she herself may be feeling a little down.

"We have a phrase of 'fake it 'til you make it'. If you're not feeling the fire that night, then you've just got to fake it until something happens in the game that can turn it around or sparks something inside," Martin commented.

As one of the more experienced Golden Gophers, Martin feels more of an emphasis to provide emotional support and help fuel Minnesota's charge to repeat as Big Ten Champions. Martin has latched on to the responsibility of getting others excited and picking up the team when victories may look less than simple. "Our coaches put a lot of emphasis on the veterans leading the team and other things as well. I feel like that's kind of my job as a veteran and leader of the team. I'm not a captain or anything, but I do what I can to help our team out," Martin remarked.

Now that Minnesota is beginning their Big Ten schedule and is looking for continued success in conference play as well as advancing to NCAA play, Martin's enthusiasm is more important than ever. The pressure can be read in her emotional play. She left with these words to spark the team's and fans' confidence and get both fired up: "We are a team that is here to play. We're not a team to be messed around with."

He is finishing his master's degree at Long Beach State in kinesiology and exercise science.

Heffernan and his wife, Carol, have a one-year old daughter, Kate and reside in Plymouth.

David Boos enters his second season as the assistant coach of the Golden Gopher volleyball program. Boos, a Delafield, Wis., native, is the Gophers'

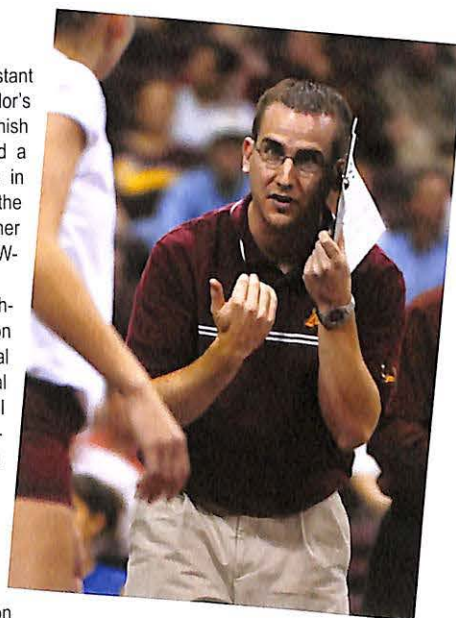
Boos began his coaching career at Wisconsin-

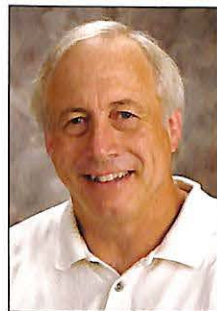
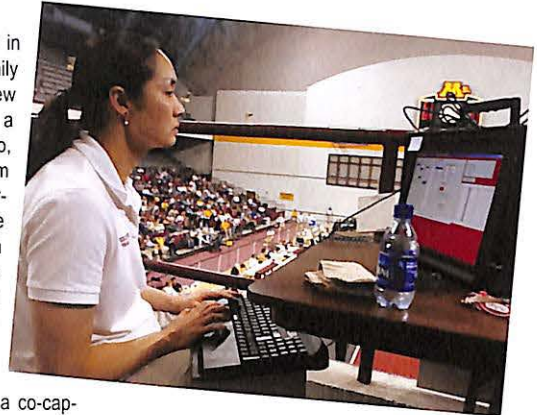

► eighth season at Minnesota

Not all members of an athletic team are recruited to the team. Volunteer assistant coach Dennis Amundson started attending Minnesota practices early in 1996 and is now in his eighth year with the program, lending both perspective and a statistical mind for the Golden Gopher volleyball team. He also works with the Gopher setters during

practice.

"In our first month as a coaching staff (January 1996), we started conducting individual workouts at the Bierman building," said head coach Mike Hebert. "This guy begins to come to the workouts to watch the players. A few days later, he is shagging balls around the gym. Then he is handing balls to us, and the next thing you know, he is a volunteer assistant coach."

Hebert is very comfortable having Amundson around, both as a coach and as a friend. "'Aame' is just invaluable to this volleyball program," said Hebert. "First of all, he keeps me sane. He is someone in my age-group that I can talk to. The daily banter that

we have is wonderful. Second, he has a tremendous even-keel perspective toward life. He is our spiritual advisor."

Amundson, a veteran of coaching many sports to youth, including approximately 20 years of high school volleyball and 15 years of junior volleyball, enjoys his involvement with Hebert and the Minnesota volleyball program. "I am intrinsically motivated to work with the Gophers," said Amundson. "It is fun to make all of the work worthwhile."

On the bench, Amundson follows many different aspects of the match. He is charting the plays Minnesota calls, what pattern the attackers run, whether the pass was in or out of system, and marking down tendencies of the opponent block and any changes in formation. Amundson and Hebert have developed their own statistical system to rate the Gopher players where every touch of the volleyball is evaluated. The system has allowed Hebert and the rest of the volleyball staff to look at the team much differently than from a traditional volleyball box score.

Amundson and his wife, Jeri, reside in Maplewood.
