

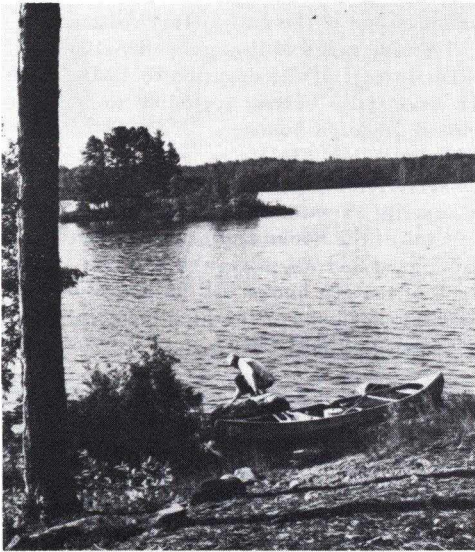

UMD REGISTRATION UP FOUR PERCENT OVER '61

A record first term Summer Session enrollment of 1,040 students has been announced by UMD Provost Raymond W. Darland.

The total is 11 higher than the 1959 record and 35 higher than 1961, Darland said. Of the 1,040 students, 142 are graduate students and 898 undergraduates.

University Recorder True E. Pettengill said total University of Minnesota enrollment for first term is 10,459, 395 or four percent higher than a year ago.

For the entire University, the male students number 6239, the female contingent 4220.

Pettengill noted that a number of summer institutes on the University campuses helped increase the final count. The Morris campus registered 61 students for their first summer session since becoming part of the University.

CALLING ALL CANOERS

The Superior-Quetico National Forest wilderness north of Ely has been chosen for the annual Summer Session canoe trip July 13, 14, 15.

Reservations now are being accepted at Kirby 186. Detailed trip information also is available.

A three-man party, including physical education instructor Loren Myhre who will serve as canoe master for the trip, traveled 45 miles last weekend pinpointing campsites, portages, fishing spots and points of interest.

Myhre's party then settled on an area some 10 miles square for the trip where the main campsite can easily be reached Friday night in one portage.

The co-educational group will leave at 1 p.m. Friday (July 13) and drive to the jumping off point at a campground on Fall Lake northeast of Ely.

The canoe trip has always been a favorite of Summer Session students. It is not difficult and can be taken at as leisurely a pace as one wishes.

UMD PLAY ON TV

The UMD Summer Theater's production of "The Search for the Snork" will be presented in five weekly episodes over KDAL-TV beginning Monday.

The play, written and directed by Fred Meitzer, an assistant professor of speech at UMD, can be seen on Dotty Becker's "Town and Country" program at noon.

"Snork" comes to UMD's Old Main Theater July 19, 20, 21. There will be two performances daily at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.

The play asks and answers the question: What would the fairy tale have been like if there had been television?

It tells the story of a king who has everything except a snork, and of his efforts to get one.

Although written principally for children, the play appealed to young and old alike when staged last summer in Columbus, Ohio while Meitzer was attending graduate school.

Summer Session students will be admitted free to both stage performances. Children will be charged 35 cents, adults 50 cents.

W. K. MONTAGUE PRESENTS FIRST EDITIONS TO UMD

Many first editions are included in the 387 books and pamphlets recently given to UMD by William K. Montague, Duluth attorney and collector.

Ninety-four of the volumes and 15 pamphlets deal with the history of Minnesota and the Northwest. Some have been re-printed but many are first editions.

One of the nation's most complete collections on the history of golf is a part of the gift. Mr. Montague collected the 152 books and 20 pamphlets over a number of years. He is the author of one of the golf history volumes.

A wide range of literary works—106 books—also is part of the donation to UMD. Many are beautifully bound, according to UMD Librarian Rudolph Johnson. "The Writings of John Muir" by John Muir, explorer and early conservationist, has an actual page of his manuscript as part of the book.

All of the books and pamphlets are being catalogued and placed in the UMD Library. Each of the gift books will be identified by a specially designed plate which the library uses to show the name of a donor.

UMD BENEFACTOR DIES

UMD lost one of its best friends last week when Howard W. Lyon died at his home in Miami, Florida.

Lyon created the Howard W. Lyon Foundation Scholarship Fund for UMD art students. He also was instrumental in the organization and development of Tweed Art Gallery.

A graduate of Central High School in Duluth, Lyon was a former associate of Gar Wood and of Carl G. Fisher, the man who developed Miami Beach.

Among his survivors is a sister, Mrs. Alice Tweed Tuohy of Santa Barbara, California. Mrs. Tuohy and her daughter, Mrs. Bernice Tweed Brickson, Duluth, provided the funds for the construction of Tweed Gallery, one of several major gifts to UMD by the Tweed family.

MATH INSTITUTE

An Institute on Modern Mathematics for Elementary Teachers will be held July 23-27 on the UMD campus under the direction of Dr. John E. Hafstrom, head of the UMD mathematics department.

The institute's course of study is designed to give the elementary arithmetic teacher some idea of what so-called "modern" mathematics is all about.

The institute is being offered by the University of Minnesota General Extension Division, Center for Continuation Study.






WISCONSIN

A Workshop on Civil Defense Education will be offered July 30—August 3 at UMD through the University of Minnesota General Extension Division, Center for Continuation Study.
