

NEW CLASS CARDS

The Office of Student Personnel Services announces the use of a new and revised class card which it is hoped will be delivered in time for use Fall quarter.

By means of a built-in carbon feature, the report form provides four copies of the student's class record for each class. One copy will go to the student, one to his home, one to the adviser, and the original will be retained in the Office of Student Personnel Services.

Cards are sorted by a patent process which will eliminate the necessity for faculty alphabetizing.

NEW TIME SCHEDULE

Beginning with fall quarter, 1950, first period classes at Main, Tweed, and Olcott will start at 8:00 a.m. and first period classes in the Science Building at 8:30 a.m., according to the new time schedule adopted by the Administrative Committee.

The new plan, which allows forty minutes for traveling between campuses, is expected to help solve the tardiness problem which has been a source of concern and study during '49-'50.

Students must schedule a vacant period on their daily program between a class in the Science Building and a succeeding class in Main, Tweed, or Olcott.

CRITICAL OCCUPATION DEFERMENTS

A recent newspaper article listed the following occupations considered critical by the Labor Department:

Agronomist, marine architect, bacteriologist, biologist, botanist, chemist, clinical psychologist, dentists, engineer (chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, mechanical, mining, petroleum, sanitary, chief, marine), entomologist, geologist, ship master, mathematician, metallurgist, professional nurse, osteopath, parasitologist, physicians and surgeons, physicist, plant pathologist, teacher (critical occupations only), tool and die designer, veterinarian.

The article went on to state that National Guardsmen and reservists in these critical jobs would be deferred temporarily from active military duty. An occupation deferment would be of six months duration but, according to the article, could be cut off at any time "because of overriding military considerations". The temporary six months delay could be extended, but for not more than another six months period. The list of critical jobs has nothing to do with inductions under the Selective Service system.

The article continued that the secretaries of the army, navy, and air force were instructed to consider deferment requests from reservists enrolled in schools and colleges or engaged in research and scientific activities. These may be deferred until the end of the school term. Those doing professional graduate work or vital research should be granted delays based on the merits of each case.
