Registration Procedure

4. Return blank at Window 10, Registrar's office, and secure a statement of fees.
5. Pay fees not later than August 4th in order to complete your registration on time.

PAYNE'S TRAVEL LECTURES

The first of the illustrated travel lectures by Dr. Charles A. Payne will be given this afternoon in the Little Theater, at four o'clock. The subject is, "Rome, Capital of the World."

Doctor Payne has just returned from some intensive study of various scenic localities in the northwest, and his enthusiasm will be communicated particularly into the second lecture, "The Yellowstone National Park," which will be given on Wednesday afternoon at four, in the Music Auditorium. Attention is called to the change of date; this lecture was originally scheduled for Thursday. This exchange of date brings the lecture on Beautiful Hawaii to Thursday afternoon, also in the Music Auditorium, but at three o'clock. Both these lectures will be illustrated with motion picture film as well as with stereopticon views.

CONVOCATION ON THURSDAY

The convocation address on Thursday morning will be given by Dr. Charles A. Payne, who is a guest of the University this week, giving his travel lectures. The subject will be "America, a World Nation;" the matter, an accumulation of many years of travel in foreign lands. In these ramblings Doctor Payne has had constant opportunity to study the sources of many of the peoples that make up this country, the contributions that they have brought, and their significance in the development of our national character. From these impressions he has deduced certain notions of the obligation of America to the rest of the world, and these he will embody in the lecture.

MOTION PICTURES TONIGHT AND THURSDAY

"Silas Marner" will open the series of motion picture exhibits to be given from now on in the Music Auditorium, regularly on Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 6:30 p.m.

On Thursday of this week a feature program is to be supplied to the Summer Session by the Educational Film Exchange, of Minneapolis, through the General Extension Division of the University. It will consist of a Lyman Howe picture, a scenic, "Through the Nation's Parks," a Sherlock Holmes story, and a comedy. The variety will give those interested in motion picture exhibits for school some idea of available material.

SATURDAY'S BIRD EXCURSION

Beginning Saturday, the University will have as its guest Mr. Henry Oldys, of Silver Spring, Maryland, a nationally known student of birds and bird music. He will remain until Tuesday of next week, when he will finish a series of lectures. Advantage is to be taken of his presence to arrange for a field tour, when birds and their songs may be observed under his guidance. The location chosen for the trip is the section of woods adjoining Fort Snelling on the south, near the Minnesota river. The party will leave the Library at two-thirty in the afternoon, taking street cars to Fort Snelling.

CONFERENCES ON SOCIAL STUDIES

A series of conferences on Social Studies, under the general auspices of the National Council for Social Studies, began on Thursday, July 12, and will continue on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of next week. The first two meetings will be devoted to the topic of exploded theories in the departments of economics, sociology, history, and political science, and will be addressed by representatives of these departments. The aim will be to acquaint teachers with matters upon which even some text books are out of date.

The third meeting will deal with Curriculum Tendencies, and will be under the direction of Miss Frances Morehouse, of the College of Education. The fourth and last meeting will deal with the Minnesota situation, under the leadership of Professor L. V. Koos, of the College of Education. All meetings will be held in the Little Theater, at three o'clock, and will be open to all interested.

"WHY WE HAVE A TRANSPORTATION PROBLEM"

This is the title of a lecture which Professor J. E. Cummings, of the Economics Department of the School of Business, will give in the Little Theater, at four o'clock on Thursday, July 19. We all know we have a transportation problem, much more than can be solved by the multiplication of flivvers, but its causes are not always apparent, not always understood. The purpose of this lecture will be to state some of these causes and help to clarify opinions on the matter of railroads and their management. Professor Cummings is the specialist of his department in this field of economics, and will speak with that authority on the subject.

Shick Tests, by means of which it may be determined whether one is susceptible or immune to diphtheria, will be applied free of charge at the Health Service on Wednesdays only.

Toxin-Antitoxin, a safe and reliable procedure to produce immunity to diphtheria for those found susceptible, may be obtained free at any time.

Vaccination for small-pox, typhoid and paratyphoid may be obtained free at any time.

Those desiring physical examinations are urged to report at the Health Service before July 15th, if possible.
