MEETING OF THE GENERAL FACULTY

May 26, 1922

The Committee on Pensions and Retiring Allowances recommends:

1. That the University cooperate as fully as possible with any other agencies which may be engaged in a study of the pension problem for teachers in the State of Minnesota.
2. That for the ensuing year the University be governed in its attitude toward the retirement problem by the progress of plans for pension legislation at the next session of the Legislature.
3. That if a retirement system for the University is not established by the Legislature at its next session, the University proceed to draft plans for the organization of a retirement system supported by deductions from salaries.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT

Annual Inspection—R. O. T. C.

During the annual War Department inspection of 1922, there will be one day on which all R.O.T.C. students of the Infantry, Coast Artillery and Signal Corps Units will be excused from their regular classes in order to attend certain necessary formations. Accordingly all R.O.T.C. students of the three units mentioned will report at the Armory at 8:00 a.m., Monday, May 15, with full equipment. Blouses will be worn. After 2:00 p.m. the First Infantry Battalion (Companies A, B & C), all Coast Artillery and Signal Corps will be dismissed. The Second Battalion, Infantry, will stay for the remainder of the afternoon and will be given credit for their usual Wednesday instruction period. The inspection will be continued on Tuesday afternoon at the regular instruction period and for those students who ordinarily report on Tuesday only. This includes those excused after 2:00 p.m. on Monday, May 15. By direction of the President, all R.O.T.C. students will be excused from classes during inspection and will be required to attend inspection.
