UMDEA WINS BARGAINING ELECTION The Duluth chapter of the Minnesota Education Association (UMDEA) won a run-off election held last week at UMD becoming the first union bargaining agent ever for faculty members. UMDEA received 155 votes (57 %) and the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) received 118 votes (43 %). The Bureau of Mediation Services in St. Paul has 10 days to certify the election and to name UMDEA as bargaining agent for faculty members. Contract negotiations with the University administration may start following the certification, according to Tom Bacig, UMDEA representative and English professor.

MIDDLE EAST The physical and cultural geography of the Middle East will be the subject of a special topics course in geography during winter quarter. This timely course, which is open to the general public, will look at historical and cultural dimensions of the Middle East as well as examine current events. The course will be taught by Ahmed Shamekh, a visiting professor from Riyadh University in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, who also is a UMD graduate along with Fred Witzig, geography professor.
