PUBLIC LECTURE

M. Vincent de Wierzbicki, a member of the French High Commission, will deliver a lecture in English at the Little Theater this afternoon at 4:30. His subject will be "FRANCE AND THE PEACE TREATY." He entered the French army as a private in infantry, and later served as interpreter with the British army. Since April, 1918, he has assisted the United States Treasury Department in the third, fourth, and fifth Liberty Loan campaigns, delivering over three hundred lectures. He has just recently returned from France, having visited Alsace-Lorraine, the devastated districts, and parts of Germany.

All members of the University are urged to take advantage of this opportunity.
