LIBRARY REGULATIONS

The attention of all students is called to the following regulations which will be rigidly enforced:

"All overnight books taken from the 'Reserves' must be returned at 8:30 the following morning. If not returned at that hour a fine of twenty-five cents will be imposed, and an additional ten cents will be charged for every hour or fraction of an hour thereafter that the book is retained.

Books issued during the day for reading-room use must be returned within two hours. If not returned promptly a fine of twenty-five cents for the first hour and ten cents additional for every hour or fraction of an hour thereafter that the book is overdue, will be charged. The two-hour limit will not be enforced between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m."

In order to prevent misunderstandings, special permit slips will be issued for all over-night loans of "Reserve" books. These permits will be receipted on the return of the book in the morning. Students taking books for over-night use without the permit slip will be held to strict accountability. The practice of taking books out during the day and holding them until the next morning without permission will be penalized as provided for in the above regulations.
