Shakespeare in the Streets to perform 'Measure for Measure'

"Measure for Measure" will be presented by the Shakespeare in the Streets touring company at 7 p.m. Tuesday on the terrace between the Classroom and Administration buildings.

Admission is free. In case of rain, the production will be staged in the Kirby ballroom.

Shakespeare in the Streets, entering its seventh season, has played to over 425,000 people. This year, the company will tour seven states, making it the widest ranging outdoor theater in the country.

Director James Kerr has taken on one of Shakespeare's more complex plays in "Measure for Measure." An infrequently produced play, it deals with the significant relationship between power and morality.

The Duke, played by Laurie

Allen Becker, leaves his city for a period of time in the hands of his trusted deputy, Angelo, acted by Joe Van Slyke.

One of the deputy's first acts is to sentence Signior Claudio, played by Erik Steen, to death for sleeping out of wedlock with his lover Julietta, portrayed by Jeanne Marie Zeck. Claudio asks his acquaintance, Lucio (James R. Neuman), to persuade his sister, Isabella (Victoria Larsen), to intercede in the case.

As Isabella pleads her brother's case, the deputy falls in love with her and proposes to save Claudio if she yields herself to him.

Comic relief is supplied by some of Shakespeare's funniest characters: Valerie Charles in the role of Mistress Overdone; David Colacci as Pompey; Don Ewing as Froth and Ross Quint as Elbow.

Veterans' Outreach provides information on school, benefits

The UMD Veterans' Outreach Office is back in business.

John Center and Phillip Lawrey, both veterans themselves, have set up an office in Room 150-B in Kirby Student Center.

They are contacting veterans both on campus and on trips throughout the region. Center and Lawrey say their goal is to contact each vet' to help him enroll at UMD or at any other school appropriate to individual needs or experience.

They also are welcoming Wisconsin veterans now that Minnesota and Wisconsin have a reciprocity agreement which guarantees students from each state resident tuition rates in the other state.

Center and Lawrey also inform veterans of their rights in terms of money and other benefits.

Center and Lawrey say there are still about 1,000 veterans in Duluth who are unemployed. "We would like to help many of them and others to return to school so they can enhance their chances for future employment." Center and Lawrey said.

The UMD Veterans' Outreach office is open from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday. The telephone number is 726-7221.

Spikers to hit nets next week at UMD

Teams from Hawaii, California, Washington, Texas, Iowa, Michigan, and Utah are among the first entries in the 42nd National Volleyball Tournament, General Chairman Chuck Henderson announced.

"The early entries are an indication of the national flavor of this tournament," said Henderson. The colorful event which will be held June 27-30 at UMD is co-sponsored by the University and the YMCA. Over one hundred teams in five divisions, including many of the defending champions, are expected to invade Duluth.

Henderson, who has established a committee structure to prepare for the event, feels that Duluth's experience in hosting the 1961 tournament will help make this year's one of the best ever.

"We are benefiting from the things learned in 1961 and using some of the same people in organizing for this year, including Bob Ball who was the 1961 general chairman," Henderson continued.

Joining Ball as co-chairman of the publicity committee is Ralph Romano, while other committees and chairman are: Tournament Director Owen McGraw; General Chairman Chuck Henderson; University Facilities Dr. Ward Wells; Equipment and Supplies Graydon Stromme; Local Officials Jim Malosky and Maurice Ray; First Aid Wheeler Van Steinburg; Awards and Recognition Paul Vesterstein; Banquet and Entertainment James Gallup; Budget and Finance Frank De Bolt; Housing and Transportation Dean Moorhouse; and Registration Richard Hill.

The Northern Minnesota Art Exhibition is open to artists residing in Aitkin, Beltrami, Carlton, Cass, Cook, Crow Wing, Hubbard, Itasca, Kanabec, Koochiching, Lake, Lake of the Woods, Mille Lacs, Morrison, Pine and St. Louis counties.

Paul Kramer, superintendent of the fine arts exhibitions at the State Fair, will judge the exhibit at UMD. A \$2 nonrefundable entry fee will be charged each artist, regardless of the number of entries.

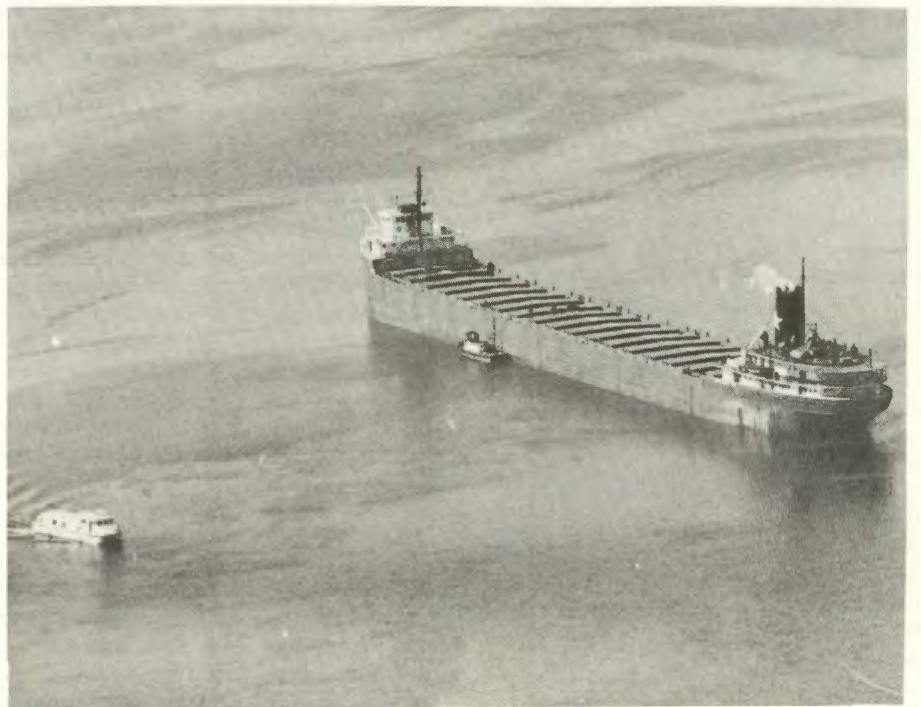
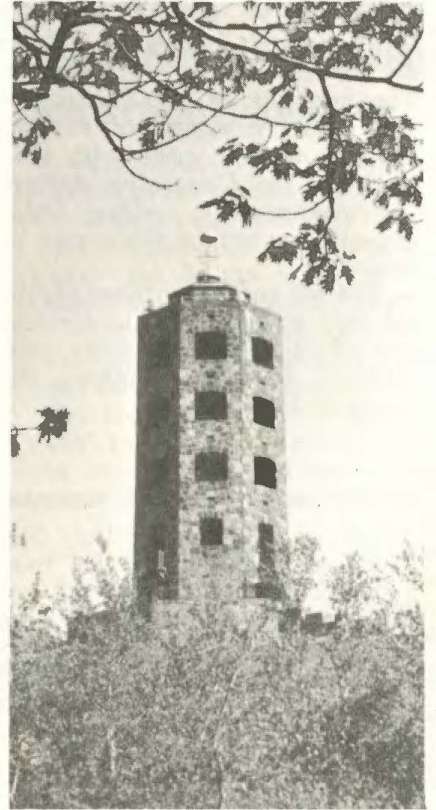
Summer sights in Duluth

Graduate Testing

Graduate majors in Educational Psychology, the emphasis in special education and the Specialist Certificate program require the applicant to take the Miller Analogies Test.

Two special dates have been set for administration of the test. They are June 27 and August 1 at 1:15 p.m. Arrangements to take the test may be made with Mrs. Hoch in the Counseling Office, 164 Administration building. Other mutually convenient times may be arranged.

The fee charged to those applying only to UMD and the University of Minnesota Graduate programs is \$5. For all others, the fee is \$7.50.

Special and Summer Only Students

Special and Summer Only Students are reminded that if they subsequently decide to make application for admission to the Graduate School, they may apply only their first term's work as such students toward the requirements for the master's degree.

Master's Degree Students

Students who plan to receive their master's degrees at the August 24 commencement are reminded that applications for degree, payment of graduation fees and oral and written examinations must be completed not later than July 13.

Graduate School

All graduate students who have not registered in the Graduate School for two consecutive years or more must take action through the Graduate School office, 403 Administration building, to apply for readmission at least four weeks prior to entry date.

Graduate students who have been admitted to the Graduate School, but who have not registered within a year of admission, must reapply for admission at the Graduate School office at least four weeks prior to entry date.

Subsequent Quarter Admission

Students in attendance at UMD for the current Summer Session who wish to be considered for admission to fall quarter and who have not already applied must submit regular applications and transcripts of previous college work before July 15 to the Admissions office, 129 Administration building. A \$10 credential examination fee must accompany each application.

Former Duluth State Teachers College students need not file applications, but should notify the Records Office of their intentions.

Graduating Seniors

All students currently registered during the first term who plan on completing degree requirements during either the first or second terms are required to submit applications for degree by Friday,

July 6. Applications for degree may be obtained from and returned to the Records Office. Students who have previously submitted applications are asked to contact the Records Office to be certain their applications are on file.

Registration Changes

Any requests for changes in registration after the first week of classes (June 22) must be approved by the instructor involved. Only in exceptional cases will such petitions be granted.

Graduate Registration

Graduate students no longer need joint registration in the Graduation School for courses taken in Continuing Education and Extension. However, a limit of 12 credits of CEE work may be applied to the Master's degree.
