Basal Cell Skin Cancer: Information for patients

Basal cell skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in the USA. This type of cancer rarely spreads beyond the skin, but the lesions can become large and cause damage to normal tissues. This type of cancer can be cured with early treatment. Basal cell skin cancers can look different, but everyone should be on the look-out for:

The 5 Warning Signs

- 1. An open sore
- 2. A reddish patch
- 3. A shiny bump
- 4. A pink growth
- 5. A scar-like area

How is it treated?

Your doctor may recommend a specific treatment based on how the growth looks and where it is located. Some common options are:

- **Surgery:** This may be a single surgery or several small surgeries. The growth will be examined to make sure that the cancer has been removed.
- **Curetting:** The growth is destroyed with gentle scraping and heat.
- **Cold therapy:** Very cold liquid is used to freeze the growth.



What else can I do?

- Have your skin checked by your doctor every year
- Keep an eye out for The 5 Warning Signs
- Avoid excess sun and wear sunscreen
- Wear a hat when outside
- Learn more about skin cancer!
