In case you wondered how many women entered the contest, here are the figures: columns, 7; coverage of single event, 10; radio interview, 2; radio talk, 2; visual aids, 1, 3 and 7; in order of divisions.

Judges comment:

Here are some comments from the judge of the women's press contest, Barbara Bailey, home editor of the Farmer Magazine:

- . Entries would be easier to judge if they were mounted on, 82 x 11 sheets of paper.
- . Every clipping should show the date and the name of the paper.
- . Columns would be improved if the information therein - that is, the good practices you are trying to teach - were tied up with local names - names of people who have put into use those approved ways of doing things.
- . Columns are more readable if written in a chatty, informal style in short paragraphs.

Judges comments on the various programs were:— form questions which demand more than a "yes or no" answer, put music in a 15 minute straight talk, keep things moving, make radio work for you, not you for radio, be less stilted—more natural, use "bridges" between separate ideas, have a good opening sentence, let introduction set the stage before the main program, don't put so many words in the mouth of guest, watch promunciation, use change of pace, eliminate "extra" words and unimportant sentences, use colorful expressions and don't get too much background noise.

There were 22 entries in the 52 contest. The judges said the programs in general were excellent—much better than they were 2 and 3 years ago.
