DULUTH -- A unique student dialogue, A Panel of Americans, will be heard at the UMD International Club meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday (Feb. 7) in Room 252, Kirby Student Center.

The Panel movement, originated on the East Coast in 1956, is based on the idea that lack of information about other races and religions is the cause of many of today's problems in human relations.

Teams of student speakers or panelists and faculty moderators representing all races, creeds and colors appear before campus or community audiences to discuss openly these racial and religious differences.

The UMD panel will consist of Erick Eversley, a junior from St. Paul; Diane Freimuth, a senior from Duluth; and John Lane, a senior from Cloquet, Rev. Richard Nelson, campus pastor for the United Campus Christian Fellowship, will act as moderator.

After each panelist gives a brief introduction, the program is opened to questions from the audience on any topic. The panel members respond to the questions according to their beliefs and experiences.

A large number of UMD students take part in the Panel of Americans. They form a pool from which each panel is drawn, insuring a different panel make-up for each appearance.
