Medical students please note following existing rule:

"Students must secure their Bachelor's degrees before they can register for the second clinical period (clerkship)."
The Students' Work Committee will administer this rule in accord with the following regulation:

"Students who have not secured their bachelor degree at the proper time may register as unclassified students and will receive no legal time credit toward the M.B. degree until the bachelors degree is secured. They may not register for clerkships."

After their bachelor's degree is obtained such students must successfully complete four quarters' full work, before being eligible for the M.B. degree."

FELLOWSHIPS FOR WOMEN

The following fellowships are available for women for the academic year 1921-1922:

1. Alice Freeman Palmer Memorial Fellowship \$1,000
Must have degree of Doctor of Philosophy
2. Sarah Berliner Research and Lecture Fellowship \$1,000 to \$1,200
Must have degree of Doctor of Philosophy
3. A. C. A. European Fellowship \$750
Must have B.A. degree and two years of graduate study
4. Anna C. Brackett Memorial Fellowship \$700
Must have B.A. degree, and either be a teacher, or preparing to teach.
5. Latin American Fellowship \$750
Must be a native of some Latin-American Republic
6. Gamma Phi Beta Service Scholarship \$500
Must have B.A. degree, and have done one year of graduate work in some social science
