UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA, DULUTH
FACULTY MEETING, OCTOBER 26, 1965

The faculty met for its regularly scheduled meeting at 2:30 p.m., C.S.T., in Room 80 of the Home Economics Building, Dr. Darland presiding.

Dr. Darland indicated that the present UMD enrollment was 4,405 undergraduates and 64 graduate students. These figures reflect an 18 per cent increase over the 1964 enrollment. It was pointed out that increases of this magnitude may be expected for the next several years. The official projection of 6,300 students in 1970 may turn out to be short of the actual number of students registered at that time.

Dr. Darland also pointed out that the Marshall W. Alworth Planetarium had been financed and ground broken for the project. The project will be underway as soon as possible and ultimately will be combined with the Darling Observatory when additional funds become available.

Arthur E. Smith reported on the forthcoming dedication of the Alice Tweed Tuohy Room and the unveiling of the statue of Sieur du Luth in the Albert L. Ordean Court. These events will occur on November 5. Many dignitaries will be present and considerable publicity will be given to the event, including a story in Time Magazine. At 8 p.m. a reception will be held in Tweed Gallery and the faculty is cordially invited.

Theron O. Odlaug reported on the current status of the Life Science Building and indicated that the plans are now nearing the blueprint stage with groundbreaking possible in April or May of 1966 and completion of the building by the fall quarter of 1967.

The director of the UMD Theater, Fred W. Meitzer, announced the opening of a new play, "The Days Between," on November 4, 5, and 6, and explained that the play was being produced on a number of campuses.

Dean A. Crawford then described briefly the formation of the Research and Development Council for Northeastern Minnesota. In essence, Dr. Crawford pointed out that the Council was established to take advantage of monies available to the school systems from both public and private sources and particularly under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. Ultimately, the budget figure may grow to several millions of dollars. The Council is expected to be headquartered on the UMD campus and the executive director could possibly be a UMD staff member. In due time, it is expected that most departments at UMD will find some interest in the work of the Council.

Reports on newly proposed summer programs were given by Sylvan D. Burgstahler, Maude L. Lindquist, Anna L. Stensland and Vernon L. Simula. Since the various programs differed in detail but were similar in principle, brief general summaries were given. The purpose of these special programs or institutes is basically to offer area teachers additional opportunities in their special fields. In some cases, the teachers may be drawn from a wider geographic area. Overall, the programs are aimed at improving the quality of teaching by introducing the newest

thinking in the various fields and providing opportunities for discussion, for seminars with recognized experts in the various fields, and for the translation of ideas into workable classroom materials.

Dean Chamberlin announced that the United Fund has reached 87 per cent of its quota at UMD and asked that all pledge cards be returned to his office as soon as possible.

Dr. Darland announced that the National Security Seminars scheduled for the early part of November could be attended by students and faculty on presentation of identification cards. In case an entire class would like to attend one of the seminars, arrangements should be made in advance.

The meeting adjourned at 4:00 p.m., C.S.T.
