## STUDENTS TO COME TO AID OF FRISCO

PREXY HEARTILY ENDORSES MOVEMENT.

Collections will be Taken Directly After Chapel—Many donations Expected for Suffering Californians—Students Are Enthusiastic.

The University desires to express in tangible form, its sympathy with the suffering people of California. Any voluntary donations from any person, in any way connected with the University will be received and handed to the relief committee, if left at the purchasing agent's office any time during this week.

Not to be left out of the generous movement to aid stricken San Francisco, Minnesota will start a relief fund today.

President Northrop has endorsed the movement:

Donations can be given after chapel to persons stationed at the top of the steps. At any time during the coming week they can be handed in at the accountant's office.

All who have read the daily papers will appreciate the insistent demands for aid and immediate relief that have come from the desolated city. Many supplies have been sent in and present needs met, but it will be some time before the city can take care of itself, and until then it must depend upon outside assistance and generosity.

## CLASS CAPS CAUSE BOLT IN MEETING

MAJORITY OF ACADEMIC FRESHMEN RESCIND MOTION FOR OFFICIAL HEADGEAR.

Faction in Favor of Class Caps Bolts Academic Meeting After Hot Session—Engineers Wear Headgear and Fight Will Center Around Them.

After one of the hottest class meetings on record the Academic Freshmen yesterday voted down a motion to wear class caps in contradiction to their action on the previous day.

A large faction of the '05 Academics bolted the meeting when this action was taken and are still in favor of donning official headgear.

The day before a joint meeting of Engineers and Academics had decided to adopt hats and a committee, consisting of Watson, Wilson, Dickson, Backus and Leach, was appointed to get them. Yesterday, however, the Academics reconsidered the motion.

The minority who were in favor of hats used every known parliamentary trick to overrule the majority, but attempts at adjournment, laying on the table, referring to a committee and all other schemes to put off the decision were useless. The question was carried and the entire opposing faction bolted the meeting.

Thus the cap scrap this year will center around the engineers mainly, as they will be worn only by the engineers and a small section of the Academics.

Samples have already been procured and a meeting will be held in the near future.

Boyle is showing up well at third, and Caldwell can hold down short acceptably.

Brenna will pitch on Friday, and Grangaard will catch. The latter's backstop work has been good, but his throwing to base is not up to the standard.

Brown, McRae and Woisted will twirl on Saturday. Woisted pitched five innings in Tuesday's game and the visitors' could not solve his delivery for a single hit.

Spooner will probably play second while Robertson will act as utility man.

## FINE FORCE SHOPS

MINNESOTA IN FRONT RANK.

No. Smoke Enters Forge Room—Machine Shop, Foundry Cranes and Elevator to Be Added for Engineers.

One of the finest forge shops in the country has been set up in the engineering shops. Not a particle of smoke enters the room, as it is drawn off through the bottom by means of large electric fans.

This, together with many other improvements which are being put in, has placed Minnesota in the front rank as regards shop facilities. Contracts have been let for a machine shop and a foundry crane—an elevator for the shop, a steam plant, and several other additions. The work on these is now being pushed forward as quickly as possible.

Renewed interest has been taken in the Briggs prize for foundry practice as a result of the recent agitation in engineering circles. Many students from all classes but the freshman have signified their intention of competing. May is the time limit set and many essays, are expected in by that time.

The winner will receive not only the \$50 cash mentioned in the bulletin, but also a handsome gold medal.

## ASK US TO JOIN NEW ASSOCIATION

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION OF U. S. SENDS BID

Object of Organization is to Further the Good Standing of College Athletics—Results, Not Methods Will Be Demanded

Invitation has been received by Minnesota to join the Intercollegiate Athletic Association of the United States, which at present is composed of several eastern colleges, but which aims to include practically all the colleges of the country.

The purpose of the organization is to further the good standing of college athletics. Nothing compulsory is required of the schools which enter it and results mainly will be demanded rather than methods.

A copy of the constitution and by-laws is in the hands of the athletic committee, and should Minnesota decide to join, the payment of \$25 membership fee will entitle her to membership.

Captain Pierce, of West Point, is the association's president and is actually engaged in furthering its plans. Dean Jones favors membership and it is very likely that the athletic committee and the athletic association will decide to enter.
