## PROF. HAYNES NATIONAL V. P.

**Minnesota Man Takes High Place in National Staff of the Y. M. C. A.**

The Young Men's Christian Association in international convention at Buffalo, yesterday chose Prof. Haynes, of the University of Minnesota, vice-president.

The convention was a record-breaker in attendance, 1400 places being filled at the banquet.

President Roosevelt was unable to attend and expressed his regret in the following letter:

"It is a matter of sincere regret to me that I am not able to be present. I feel that the Y. M. C. A. throughout the land is a valuable adjunct to good citizenship."

### ABOUT THE GRADS.

**Progress of Work in this Department at Minnesota.**

The much desired Graduate School at the University has, during the last couple of years, become almost a necessity.

Ten years ago there were twenty-three candidates in all for the various degrees of this department.

During the last year there have been twenty-nine applicants for the degree of Master of Arts alone.

The other applications during 1903 and 1904 have been as follows: for graduate work, nine; for Master of Science, three, and for Doctor of Philosophy, eight.

Formerly the applicants came principally from St. Olaf, Luther, Gustavus Adolphus, Augustana and Macalester.

The Universities of Iowa, Dakota and Wisconsin and several of the eastern colleges have lately had a large percentage of the membership of this department.

Examinations for these degrees are now being held.

### ZOOLOGICAL EXCURSION.

**Dr. Sigerfoos Will Take Classes Down River.**

The excursion to be given by Dr. Sigerfoos to the students of his department will take place Saturday. The boat will leave the landing at the Soldiers' Home promptly at 5:15 p. m. and will proceed down the river for some distance below St. Paul, returning to the docks in St. Paul about 9:30.

This is the second of these excursions. The one given last year was heartily enjoyed by all who attended.

### JUNIOR EXCURSIONISTS PLAN.

## NOTRE DAME WINS FIRST OF SERIES

**Minnesota's Crippled Team Badly Beaten by Fast Lads From South Bend**

In a game that resembled the kind seen on the old corner lot Minnesota lost yesterday afternoon to Notre Dame by a score of 12 to 3.

It was a badly crippled team that the Varsity sent into the field, but they played the best there was in them and no one can complain. Helon Leach was behind the bat and caught an excellent game under the circumstances. McGroarty played short in place of Varco, who was in center field, and showed up well, but he is very weak at the bat.

Brown started in on the slab, but was in poor form and gave way to Bond in the second. Bond fared little better and was replaced by Rogers, in the sixth, who pitched the best ball of the trio. His support was wretched, there being a total of ten errors charged against the Varsity.

Hits were even, nine to nine, but Notre Dame drew more passes and were faster on the bases. Minnesota's base running was very poor and they should have scored more runs.

A second game will be played this afternoon at 3:30, the line-up for which has not yet been announced. Burns, a new man, will do the throwing for the visitors.

Figgemier, the ex-Miller, will officiate again tomorrow.

#### IMPORTANT CHANGES IN RULES.

**N. O. L. Conference Decides Upon New Departure Respecting Oratory.**

On the afternoon before the oratorical contest at Ann Arbor, the delegates from the seven universities represented held the annual meeting of the league.

W. D. Cole of Michigan, chairman of the executive committee, gave the financial report of the league. Several important amendments to the constitution and by-laws of the association were made.

It was agreed that, under the present system of marking, copies of the orations should not hereafter be sent to the judges in advance.

An important amendment was carried, providing that hereafter no person should be a judge who resides in any of the states represented in the contest. Heretofore only persons from that state in which the contest was held were barred.

It was provided that in the future, quotations when used by orators should be so indicated in the delivery that it should appear plainly that they are quotations and not the speaker's own words.

The following officers were elected for the coming year:

President, Thomas A. Simms, Michigan; first vice-president to be supplied by Wisconsin; second vice-pres-

ident, H. C. Anderson, Iowa; third vice-president, W. H. Hartfield, Chicago; fourth vice-president, C. R. Thompson, Minnesota; treasurer, to be supplied by Northwestern; secretary, J. G. Olmstead, Oberlin. G. P. Jones, T. A. Veldey and Prof. E. E. McDermott were Minnesota's delegates at the conference.

C. R. Thompson, who was chosen fourth vice-president, is a member of the Junior class, assistant librarian, and member of the Forum Debating team.

Dr. L. W. Mecstroth, '93, of Wahpeton, N. D., has gone east for a few weeks of special study.

Dr. Andrew J. Kaess, Med. '03, Moorhead, Minn., was recently granted a license to practice in North Dakota.

Victor G. Pickett, '96, who has been superintendent of schools at Janesville, Minn., has been elected to the corresponding position in the Waseca schools for the next year.

Dr. Victor J. LaRose, '01, of the firm of Drs. E. P. Quain, '98, and N. O. Ramstad, '99, of Bismarck, N. D., will remove to Mandan, and his place will be taken by Dr. Boyd of Chicago.
