

## DEPARTMEN OF MUSIC

Justin Rubin (b 1971) inherited his love for music from his father, Jerome. Following studies in composition, piano, and organ at the Manhattan School of Music, Purchase College in New York and the University of Arizona, he came to Minnesota in 1998 where he became chair of the theory and composition area at UMD and holds the position of Professor. In 2009 he was inducted into the Academy of Distinguished Teachers and in 2014 he was given the Tezla Award for his work as a Teacher/Scholar. As a recipient of a BMI Composition Award, a Fulbright Scholarship, and support from Meet-the-Composer, the McKnight Foundation, the Jerome Foundation, and the Institute for Advanced Study, Rubin maintains an active life as a composer and performer.

He has presented concerts across the United States and in Europe and has recorded two CDs of contemporary piano music as well as two organ CDs. He has released four chamber music CDs of his own compositions: *A Waltz Through the Vapor* (Innova, 2013), *Constellations* (MSR Classics, 2011), and *Nostalgia* (Innova, 2009) and *Currents* (Centaur Records, 2015), is a percussion CD in collaboration with his colleague Gene Koshinski. Rubin's fifth CD, *Variations on Life and Loss: Music for Piano, Strings, and Voice*, has been released this year also on Centaur Records. Recent important performances of Rubin's music include choral and vocal works presented in London, San Francisco, and Berlin, alongside organ and chamber works presented in Bucharest and Malmö. He lives with his wife Erica and their son Max in Duluth where he is a youth soccer coach.

'A Little Tango in Her Blood, music for flute/piano from Argentina'

**Alison Young** from Minnesota Public Radio narrated journey through Argentine milongas and tangos.

Following Alison Young's noted tour of Argentina and the release of her CD, this collection pulls together for the first time her arrangements and editions of music for flute and piano. Included are tangos and milongas by Astor Piazzolla plus a full-length suite of native dances written by tango legend, Maestro Horacio Salgán.

Performed by Dr. Paula Gudmundson and Dr. Tracy Lipke Perry

Hailed by the Atlanta Constitution and Journal as a "recitalist of great poise and technical security, dazzling precision and virtuosic flair," Alison Young has a diverse music career as an orchestral principal, soloist and teacher. A graduate of the Interlochen Arts Academy, she holds degrees in music from the University of Southern California and the Cleveland Institute of Mu-

sic. In 1998, composer David Diamond applauded Ms. Young's interpretation of his Flute Concerto as "some of the finest flute playing I have heard." She recorded the premiere of this work which can be found on Albany TROY308. For much of her life Alison Young has felt a desire to travel to Argentina and immerse herself in that culture. In 1998, she was invited to serve a six-week performing and teaching residency in Argentina in the regions of Patagonia, La Plata, Buenos Aires, and Corrientes. She continued to share her work and study of the music with a seven-week tour of the United States in 1999 presenting recitals and master classes on Argentinean flute music. This recording represents the culmination



of that particular project with a cross-section of music for flute from Argentina.

#### **Alison Young**

As a former professional flutist, Alison Young enjoyed a diverse music career as an orchestral principal, soloist and teacher performing on five continents including North America and New York City's Carnegie Hall. She has a knack for solo recitals with the Atlanta Constitution and Journal agreeing, calling her "a recitalist of great poise and technical security, dazzling precision and virtuosic flair." Before dystonia ended her playing career, she made the recording premiere of David Diamond's flute concerto much to his delight. He said hers was "some of the finest flute playing I have heard." Two years later, she toured Argentina, playing her own arrangements of Piazzolla tangos and other works, releasing a CD and finally publishing these arrangements in a book that takes its name from a newspaper review, A Little Tango in Her Blood, music for flute and piano from Argentina. Nowadays, Alison Young is more of a cheerleader for music and musicians, hosting a mid-day disc spin on Classical Minnesota Public Radio as well as American Public Media's syndicated concert program, SymphonyCast, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and St. Olaf Christmas. Alison is an avid kayaker, rock climber, long-distance backpacker, biker, and skier. She and her husband, Richard Rasch, live across the street from the birthplace of F. Scott Fitzgerald in Saint Paul, Minnesota.

#### DEPARTMEN, OF MUSIC

Described by the *New York Times* as an "able and persuasive advocate" of new music, pianist Nicholas Phillips' playing has been praised for its "bejeweled accuracy" (*Fanfare*) and as "razor-sharp yet wonderfully spirited" (*American Records Guide*). He is active as a soloist and collaborative artist, having performed all across the United States. He has also given solo recitals and performances in Europe, South America, Asia, and Africa.



Phillips has given lecture-recitals and presentations at conferences in the U.S., Argentina, Croatia, England, and South Korea. He is the author of "Mendelssohn's *Songs without Words* Revisited: Culture, Gender, Literature, and the Role of Domestic Piano Music in Victorian England," published by VDM Verlag. In 2011 he released two CDs on Albany Records; *Portals and Passages*, which features the piano

music of American composer Ethan Wickman, and *Boris Papandopulo: Piano Music*. Released in 2014, *American Vernacular: New Music for Solo Piano* (New Focus Recordings), features commissioned works written for him on that theme by 10 American composers. *Impressions*, his fourth CD, was released on Blue Griffin records in 2016, and features 21st century character pieces by living American composers.

He holds degrees from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music, Indiana University, and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and is currently Associate Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

The Tami Tango Trio, an internationally acclaimed Argentine music and dance ensemble, will be at the University of Minnesota Duluth for a two-day residency Monday-Tuesday, Sept. 25 -26. The trio, which features traditional Argentine tango and folk music, will offer events open to students and this culminating event on Sept. 26, 2017.

Born in 1952, Eduardo Tami began his professional career specializing in the Western concert flute at the Juan José Castro Conservatory alongside masters such as Alfredo Lannelli, Raquel Arana and Ljerko Spiller.

With 7 edited albums to his name, Eduardo Tami defined his career playing the Western concert flute as a fundamental melodic element in the interpretation of various musical genres.



His expertise as a Tango flautist allowed him to play in universities and conservatories across the globe.

As a composer, his repertoire encompasses two rhapsodies, a quartet for strings and various pieces for piano and flute.

Having gained fame and popularity as a musician and arranger, 1987 he created the Vicente López Chamber Ensemble, which he directs even today with the patronage of the municipality and private businesses.

He has participated in diverse bilateral associations with Italy, Italia, Holland, Poland, United States of America, Brazil, Bolivia, Ecuador, Haiti, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Indonesia, Malasia, Thailand and Lebanon, strengthening cross-cultural links in the process.


Latecomer Seating: We reserve the right to not seat latecomers. No late seating for performances in the Dudley Experimental Theatre.

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
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
