Medical Students—Required and elective subjects in the science departments only, i.e. Anatomy, Bacteriology, Pathology, Pharmacology and Physiology, can be used for credit and honor points toward the B.S. and A.B. degrees. No work in the clinical departments except normal Physical Diagnosis (Med. 50) counts toward a bachelor degree.

Attention is again called to the rule requiring that the bachelor's degree be obtained before the student can begin the clerkship period. Students who had a bachelor's degree before entering the Medical School must nevertheless complete all required and elective work of the first two years with a total of 90 honor points before they can begin clerkship work. WARNING—SMALLPOX

Smallpox is rampant in the Twin Cities. The facilities for isolation are exhausted. Several students now have the disease and the number is increasing daily. There has been a wide range of exposure. No one may assume that he has not been exposed. Hereafter it will be necessary to quarantine smallpox cases at the homes of those inflicted.

The city's regulation is: "Householders who are not vaccinated must be quarantined until vaccinated and the vaccination works. In case the vaccination fails to work or the subject objects to vaccination, three weeks quarantine will be imposed".

To repeat a previous warning, each sorority, fraternity, club, boarding house or rooming house, should insist that all its members be vaccinated. Otherwise there is great danger that one or more of these houses will be quarantined and students will lose one quarter's work.

Vaccination is an absolute preventive against smallpox.

All students, members of the faculty and employes of the University who come in contact with students should be vaccinated at once. These vaccinations will be given free of charge to the above groups at the University Health Service.
