REGENTS MEET AT UMD -- The Regents of the University of Minnesota will be at UMD next Thursday afternoon, May 7, and Friday morning, May 8. A complete meeting schedule is attached to this week's Currents. It is expected that President Kenneth Keller will announce the new UMD chancellor during the meetings. It will be the first meeting for three new regents: M. Elizabeth Craig of Minnetonka, Jack P. Grahek of Ely, and Elton A. Kuderer of Fairmont.

UMD SPRING ENROLLMENT DOWN -- UMD spring quarter enrollment stands at 6,703, down 241 students from spring of 1986. Total enrollment at all five campuses is 50,553, up 355 students from last spring. Other campus enrollments are: Crookston, 841, down 236; Morris, 1,639, up 78 students; Twin Cities, 40,487, up 745 students; and Waseca, 833, up 9 students.

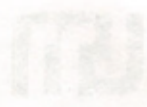
