PREXY TELLS ALL ABOUT HIS TRIP

Enjoyed His Trip Thru the Sunny South Where Negroes Are Abundant

"I am glad I am an American. I am glad I live in a country where the air is invigorating, where there is a live spirit of progress, where there is something for each of us to strive for."

These were the words of Prexy, who gave a detailed account of his trip thru the South in Chapel, yesterday morning.

Leaving Minneapolis on the 26th of last December, he passed thru Chicago, to Atlanta.

From Atlanta he went to Columbia, South Carolina, thru a country covered with

Cotton Fields.

At Columbia he remained several days, where he attended the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the College of South Carolina.

From there his journey lay thru Florida, thru such cities as Jacksonville, St. Augustine, Miami. From Miami to Nassau, is but a short voyage but a very rough one when made in such a "barrel" as Prexy described.

Nassau is a very beautiful place, and one full of interesting sights, with negroes galore. Prexy describes it as "a place where one can sink into a state of quiescence from whence he can emerge when ready to resume the functions of a human being."

The time in Nassau was spent in

sea-shore drives and sight-seeing. These excursions were marred by the ever-present negro-boy, who constantly cried: "No pa! no ma! Please, boss, let a penny come!" and would only depart when his desires has been satisfied.

The trip home was made by the same route, Prexy arriving here on Sunday morning

HOW SOME GIRLS EARN THEIR WAY

There Are Many Who Find Suitable Employment for Their Leisure Hours

THEY ARE AMERICAN GIRLS

Housework, Tutoring, Reporting, Story-Writing, Canvassing Are Some of the Ways

How the college girls help solve the servant-girl problem is a matter not only of interest to students but of vital importance to a larger number of girls than is generally supposed.

The various methods of self-support among college men are familiar to most students. The Y. M. C. A. protege with laundry bag and furnace contract, the genial waiter at the College Inn, these are well known and regarded with admiration and optimistic satisfaction.

But still more interesting are the ways in which the girl student assumes the task of earning her way thru college. One thinks instantly of typewriting, office work, tutoring, but as a matter of fact, these positions, besides being hard to secure, usually furnish only partial support.

Housework is the mainstay of the girl who must earn her entire expenses. Here is where the servant problem is affected.

The number of girls now working their way thru college is larger than it was several years ago.
