## AGGIES PICK OUT WINNERS.

### Take Straw Vote on Presidential Candidates.

Politics is arousing interest among the students of the Agricultural college. Today between 8:00 a. m. and noon a straw vote will be taken on both presidential and gubernatorial candidates. A vote at this time is expected to express crystallized sentiment and will probably forecast the outcome of the election.

The Students' Council is in charge of the balloting.

## ENDEAVOR TO INFLUENCE WOMEN IN STRAW VOTE

### Minneapolis Roosevelt Managers Seek to Explain Successful Campaign Methods.

### Suffrage Club Straw Vote for Roosevelt Arouses Interest of Downtown Politicians.

Even the Minneapolis Roosevelt headquarters are beginning to realize the importance of the straw vote to be taken for president among the women of the university next Saturday. Some one from the Roosevelt offices called up Miss Josephine Schaller, president of the Equal Suffrage club, who has charge of the balloting, and asked permission to speak to some of the "leading spirits" of the organization in order to explain successful methods of campaigning for voters.

The promoters of the affair declared some days ago that no men were to have any voice in the vote, and that they were not to use their influence in any way as this was purely a vote among the women. Now on top of this assertion comes the story that Roosevelt campaign managers wish to talk politics with some of the leading Progressive girls. Miss Schaller was not at home when the telephone rang, hence no definite answer has yet been given to the man's question.

It was owing to the lack of interest among the men that the Suffrage club decided to take matters in their own hands and stir up enthusiasm by holding a straw vote for women only. Great care has been taken to prevent fraud and bribery, and preparations were made to guard the ballot boxes on Saturday when the votes will be cast.

## LIBRARY BOOKS IN DEMAND

### Circulation a Third Larger Than Same Time Last Year.

With the coming of colder weather the library circulation has increased according to the university librarians. Some eight to nine hundred volumes are drawn every day, fully a third more than a week ago, or the corresponding days of last year. Most of the volumes read are freshmen rhetoric assignments, or History and Economics reference works. There is but small demand for fiction and novels, partly due to the fact that students are busy, and partly because the university library does not contain many such books.

## OLD FASHIONED HALLOWEEN PARTY AT Y. M. TONIGHT

### Program Includes Elusive Fruit Chase, Marshmallow Roasting, and Eating Contests.

### Cider With Doughnuts Served for Refreshment—University Talent Give Musical Numbers

Tonight at seven forty-five o'clock the doors of the Young Men's Christian Association building will be thrown open to the men of the university to come and enjoy a genuine old fashioned Hallowe'en party.

Earl Balch '15, chairman of the social committee, yesterday announced a list of "stunts" for the entertainment of the guests that bids fair to more than fill the evening with pleasure. All the old Hallowe'en sports such as bobbing for apples, roasting marshmallows, cracker eating contests and chasing elusive fruit suspended on strings, will be there in profusion. Between games, vocal and instrumental musical numbers by entertaining university talent have been planned for. Refreshments in the form of cider and doughnuts will be served to the guests.

The decorations for the party will be unique. Real cornstalks will be strewn over the tables and walls to add a true fall atmosphere to the rooms. The grates are to be filled with firewood and kept burning during the evening.

## GOVERNMENT CLUB ACTIVE

### Members Will Investigate State Laws. Effort Made to Secure Noted Speakers.

The Good Government Club has planned an interesting program for the present college year. The members are going to investigate the method of enforcement of a few of the state laws and city ordinances. A man qualified to speak on government problems will be secured to address the club every second week; and at least four speakers of national reputation will be invited to appear at the university.

Last spring the club held an election by straw ballot at which over 1,000 ballots were cast, and a mock convention which filled the armory with delegates.

The Good Government Club is a strictly non-partisan organization for the purpose of interesting college men in problems of government and to arouse in them a keen sense of their civic responsibility. The club endeavors to bring experts here to discuss, in a scientific manner, governmental problems of current importance and interest.

The meetings of the club are held in Room 408 Folwell Hall on Mondays at 8 p. m.

## TWO FOOTBALL MEN SPEAK AT MASS MEETING TODAY

### Captain Tobin and McAlmon Will Address Students on Progress of the Team.

### New Songs, Specially Prepared for Saturday's Game Sung for First Time at Meeting.

Illinois is Minnesota's next opponent and in preparation for this second conference game the usual mass meeting will be held today at 12 o'clock in the chapel.

Two football players have been found at last who are not afraid to express themselves before a mass meeting. Captain Tobin and McAlmon will both deliver short addresses in the customary snappy style of football players, pledging the team to fight to the last ditch. Mr. Frelin of the French department, will be on hand to speak for the faculty. He will probably tell of his prison experiences in France by way of arousing enthusiasm among the rooters. He is a popular, clever speaker and should prove a good drawing card.

This meeting is rather in the nature of a yell session. Special yells have been prepared for the benefit of the visiting rooters from Champagne and Madison. These new yells will be rehearsed today for the first time, but the old ones and also the old songs will be rendered so that next Saturday the team will have good, unified support from the stands. The meeting will be short and it is intended that it will be snappy and full of "pep."

## SORORITIES RACE TODAY.

### Little Enthusiasm Shown by Girls in Race for Grant Cup.

Sororities are showing a surprising indifference to the Grant cup race which will be run today if any interest is shown. As yet only one sorority, Delta Delta Delta, has chosen her three representatives in the hare and hound meet. In addition to the nine eligible cross country men, about twenty others have signified their intention of running if selected by some sorority. Sororities may find out the merits of the different men through Dick Grant. The first comers will be the first served. If the societies do not come forward, either drawings will be made for their representatives or the race will be postponed. In the latter event the cup will probably be awarded to the winning man and the sororities will be ignored.

The Carling cup race which is not a hare and hound, but a regular cross country, will take place two weeks from today. This cup will be awarded to the winning man for one year.

## WILLIAMS' MEN INTRODUCED TO LATEST ILLINOIS PLAYS

### Solem Back in Old Position at End. Doubtful Whether He Will Play Saturday.

### Orange and Blue Come Here Well Supported by Enthusiastic Rooters.

Illinois plays, prepared and staged by Johnny McGovern, are worked out on Northrop field in order that the men might become familiar with the formations which will probably be used by Illinois in Saturday's game. At first, Mac and his bear stories were considered lightly, but the men have reached the stage where they are beginning to believe the early rumors. These Illinois plays have stirred up a lot of trouble among members of the first team.

The strength of the Orange and Blue was clearly demonstrated at last Saturday's game at Champagne. There is no doubt that they have a good team, and moreover, the students support their men to the last, winning or losing. In 1911 they carried their Varsity along with their cheers until the students really thought they were going to defeat Minnesota. Rosenwald and Stevens were the two men that upset their calculations, aided by marvelous work on the part of Leonard Frank.

The fact that Tom Shevlin left for Yale Monday to instruct "Old Eli" in the finer points of western football, leaves a lot of things unsaid on the gridiron during the afternoon practice sessions.

Captain Tobin has now reached the point where he is as near satisfied with the hours of work as Dr. Williams will let him be. It was rumored Monday that Tobin wanted to cut out the school part of it and just play football for a while until they had worked up enough to defeat the Badgers as bad as they did Iowa. It would really be too bad to run up a big score on Wisconsin since they have been ceded the conference championship from the beginning of the season on the strength shown by their men on paper. True it is that Coach Juneau has a good team—probably the best team that they have ever had since the days of Vanderbroom and the old guard. Nevertheless, Minnesota has acquired the habit of beating the Badgers, and their purity squad is going to give the Cardinal eleven a fight on Northrop field.

In order to beat Wisconsin and defy Eckersall's judgment once more by again winning the conference championship, Minnesota must first win from Illinois. That is the way the football squad looks at the question, and that is the way the rooters should argue. The real danger is in taking the Illinois game for granted and forgetting that it isn't going to be a walk-away.

Tackling dummies, human and otherwise, were in demand yesterday afternoon, and the coaches put the men through a long session of defense work. Solem's pleasing way of asking permission to get out in a suit has at last gained the ear of Dr. Williams, and the fast end has gone back at his old end position several times this week. Whether he will be used Saturday or not is a matter of conjecture.

**ELIGIBLES ARE ANNOUNCED**

**Nine Cross Country Men Favorably Passed on by Eligibility Committee.**

Prof. Paige, chairman of the eligibility committee, gave out the list yesterday of the eligible cross country men. The following candidates are eligible for the cross country team: Joseph Anderson, C. R. Beddall, H. E. Karnofsky, George Lindberg, H. G. Merdink, A. Moore, G. T. McKeon, A. St. Marie, and K. F. Wuerst.

The try-outs will be held later on when the Carling Cup race is run. The annual hare and hound race will be run Thursday at 4 p. m. when each sororities' colors will be borne by a team of three.

**Chicago**—Coach Stagg characterized the work of his men in the Iowa game as "pretty poor." Poor tackling and defensive work were especially censured by him.

**Grinnell**—Several soccer teams have been organized at Grinnell, and a tournament has been arranged to last thru November.

**Wisconsin**—Five hundred new members have been added to the Y. M. C. A. at Wisconsin this year. A great many Bible classes have been organized.

**Wisconsin**—Dog wagons within a short radius of the University are very popular at Wisconsin. At one popular dog wagon the hamburger sandwiches alone require thirty-five pounds of meat and fifty loaves of bread daily.

**University of California**—Hazing of freshmen at the University of California includes the sweeping off of the bleachers before the football games. While the men of the freshmen class did the work sixty girls sang songs.

**Missouri**—A 'darning agency' has been established at the Y. W. C. A. offices at Missouri. Girls who are working their way through college are darning stockings at five cents per pair.

**Harvard**—Many students at Harvard have attempted to register for the presidential election but have been unable to do so. It is the ruling of the registrars that no student even though he is twenty-one years or more of age can vote unless he is self-supporting.

**Washington**—The Washington university faculty is contemplating the division of the college of arts and science into two schools.

**Illinois**—Letters are being sent to 6,000 graduates of Illinois University asking them to return to the university for the third home-coming to be held this November.

**DEAN JAMES SPEAKS FOR RELIGION IN THE SCHOOLS**

Head of Department of Education Advocates a Religious Test for All Teachers.

Urges Non-sectarian Instruction for Children—Says Bible is Unnecessary.

Declaring that the children of America, if they are to have a religious element in their lives must get it from Public schools, Dean George F. James, dean of the college of education and President of the Minnesota Educational association in speaking before the liberal association at the university yesterday outlined a religious test or credo to which every teacher should subscribe. Dean James said that the law of evolution which was still an anathema in many communities of the state should, along with the law of cause and effect, be recognized in the public schools, the tenets of all denominational sects notwithstanding; and he said that there were college presidents in Minnesota who believed one thing in the scientific laboratory and another thing

in their church.

Dean James pointed out that among the obstacles to the introduction of religious education in the schools is the rivalry between religion and secularism, and the multiplicity of denominational sects, the latter of which he characterized as a serious impediment to religious activity. In this respect he said: "If it is true that a man could not see the forests on account of the trees, we cannot see heaven because of the multiplicity of church spires that point in that direction."

"The other impediment to religious education," he said, "is the mixed legislation that has been allowed to get on the statute books, and lastly the greatest difficulty that confronts us in the proposal to establish religious training in the schools is the common confusion of religious education in general and religious instruction in particular. We don't want sectarian instruction in the tenets of any particular denomination, but rather a comprehension and experience in the fundamental principles that underly religious feeling."

**DEAN JAMES SPEAKS FOR RELIGION IN THE SCHOOLS.**

Reason and faith should be combined in the early instruction of the child in the development of its religious instincts and Dean James warned against a condition where children are brought up to believe in certain dogmas that have not been put to the test of reason and science. He then outlined the religious test to which the teachers would soon be subjected. The credo contains the following points:

A spiritual interpretation of life.  
A consciousness of individual responsibility in cooperation with the other forces of life.

An obligation to teach a thorough going theory of evolution, reconciling religion and science.

A recognition of the fact of the immortality of man, involving a continuance of the individual spirit indefinitely.

An obligation to the development of a scientific religion.

On inquiry from one of the students as to whether he favored the use of the Bible in the schools, Dean James answered in the negative, and told the students that when they became teachers they could inculcate the doctrine of religion reconciled

with science by the use of their personality and their indirect influence which could not be exerted in a formal or prescribed doctrine.
