

Position Paper

I am seeking your support and your vote in the election this next Wednesday, April 7. The candidates this year offer you a choice on many issues. With these things in mind, I have prepared a short statement on my position on some of the issues of importance for you, and in this election.

THE HONOR CODE

As you know, the Code is presently "administered" by the Council. Many students question the vitality of the Code as it is now administered and written. I believe the Code should be reviewed and would establish a Judicial Board composed of members from each class, Law Review, the Council, the Forum and Legal Aid as a permanent Board to review and administer the Code.

* FACULTY MEETINGS: STUDENT-FACULTY RELATIONS*

I believe that the best interests of the students can be carried out by continuing the present policy of invitational attendance by students at faculty meetings. Because every committee which takes action of interest to students is composed of students and faculty, it is my opinion that issuing ultimatums or forcing student attendance into faculty meetings can accrue benefit only to those who actually attend, and does a disservice to the faculty (who are entitled to their meetings) and to the student body. I would support and encourage a more active role for the Council in grasping and representing student opinion before the faculty in their meetings and informally.

* LAW FORUM*

I believe we should expand the activities of the Forum and would present the Council with a proposal to establish a coordinated Law Week effort which would combine the activities of the Forum, Law Review and the Council into a program of significance to students and of legal import to the community.

COMMITTEES

Committee work loses most of its value if the results of the work are not made available. Such is the case today. I would require reports from committees to be made generally available as issued on a reasonable basis.

* ABORTION REFORM, THE WAR AND WOMENS' LIBERATION*

Students should be able to look to the Council as a place of organizational and administrative support in defining and promoting their position on issues, like these, of national political importance. I believe that we as law students are most effective in our influence on these issues when we act in concert as students. The role of the Council should be in support of all law students as a legislative body for them, not a political lobby of them.

* BAR ADMISSION PROCEDURES*

Bar examination procedures have been the subject of discussion with little change for many years. We have not, as yet, exercised our prerogative as applicants to the bar to question the procedures and suggest alternatives. As your President I would speak out on that issue and seek whatever change we find desirable.

FIRST YEAR ORIENTATION

Since many of us are commuters, meeting other students in the school, meeting the faculty and finding out what goes on in Law School is hampered by commuting. I would favor establishing a Deans' Reception, or social hour of the like for new students & faculty at the end of the orientation. I would also seek to move ahead the publication date of a Law School Directory which would be expanded to

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faculty and staff.

LUNCH AND LIBRARY

As we are all aware, room for lunch and room to read is at a premium and go into shorter supply next fall with a large, new class. I will seek ways to alleviate the problem.

Why Ken King? He has been active in Law School affairs, attending meetings of the council.

Ken King cares and works for change: Next fall the course offerings will include an Accounting For Lawyers course, a change he promoted for sixty who want it next year. What course do you want added?

Ken King has served as your representative on the Commencement Advisory Committee. This University committee has helped effect liberalization of commencement policy and brought back to each school in the university, funds to have their own commencement, if they care to have one at all.

KEN KING OFFERS TO WORK FOR YOU. Keep him working as President of the Law School Council. Your vote for him is your acceptance of the offer. Seal the contract, VOTE .
