Give Your Blood Today

All of the boys in our Armed Forces are willing to risk and give their lives for you and me. But we do not want them to risk or give their lives when it is not necessary. Many who were injured at Pearl Harbor have been saved because they were given blood plasma to reduce the shock before being anesthetized. The plasma gave their hearts something to beat on; it was the major factor in saving their lives. We can help them and ourselves to victory by helping to supply our Armed Forces with blood plasma. Plasma, the liquid content of blood from which the corpuscles have been removed, may now be dried and kept indefinitely. It can be transported and kept in extreme climates without refrigeration. Upon being mixed with sterile water, it is ready for emergency transfusions even under the most chaotic conditions of battle, disaster or accident—ashore, at sea, or in the air.

Wouldn't you like to give your blood to the bloodbank? Now it is going to be possible for all of you over eighteen years of age to do so. The Agreview Staff members are now sponsoring a bloodbank on the campus. The giving of our blood to the bank is a privilege which will be denied to many because of age, but we hope to have 100 per cent participation from all of you who are eligible. The students aren't the only ones on the campus to have this privilege—the Staff members are also preparing to canvas the clerical staff and the faculty members of the School of Agriculture.

On Friday, January 29, Mrs. Anna Gruenhagen, Chairman of the Speakers Bureau of the Red Cross Blood Donor Service, was the speaker at our Assembly. We learned much from her concerning the bloodbank, but there is something you wish to know—be sure to see one of the Agreview Staff members.

You can give your blood without pain or risk to you and it is very precious to the boys so plan to GIVE YOUR BLOOD.
