## WJMEN APPROVE AMENDMENT

Members of Athletic Association hold Equal Franchise in Disfavor.

The amendment to the constitution of the Athletic Association, which will be voted on today, and which is intended to restrict the membership to male students has been approved by the Women's Athletic Association at a recent meeting.

A formal statement signed by the president and several well known members of the Women's Association has been given out urging all the women of the university to vote for this amendment.

In support of the position taken by the Women's Athletic Association, it is maintained, first, that the women's franchise was not obtained by any canvassing or belligerent suffragette tactics on the part of the women but thru a misinterpretation by an over-zealous office-seeker of the phrase, "any student of the University;" secondly, that this matter was to have been brought to a vote at the spring election of the women's Athletic Association; and lastly, that the withdrawal of the women's franchise will enable the women to maintain more complete control of their own athletics.

Posters Announce New Features and Specialties. Engraving Bureau Commends the Book.

Gopher Board Will Have Charge of Chapel Tuesday. Members to Outline Plans.

Gopher Tag Day will be held next Wednesday, February 19th. The midnight oil has been observed at number 1, Folwell of late, but up to this time the Gopher Board has been comparatively quiet. Yesterday posters were placed throughout the campus, announcing a few of the new features of the 1914 Gopher. Judging from these and other notices, the 1914 Gopher bids fair to be the "best ever."

### Gopher Chapel Tuesday.

The Gopher Board also announces that next Tuesday's chapel will be given over to the Gopher. Several members of the staff and board will present plans of the book. The University Glee Club will sing and it is probable that there will be several other musical numbers.

### Emphasize Tag Day.

The plan of the Board this year is to emphasize tag day and the number of books ordered will depend upon the number of tags sold next Wednesday. This will give the publishers a chance to check up their assets at this time. In past years the sale of Gophers has been remarkable and it is probable that nearly every student on the campus will procure one or more copies this year.

## MASQUERS SCORE SUCCESS IN LAST NIGHT'S PERFORMANCE

Dramatic Club Presents "Arms and the Man" to Full House At Shubert.

Strong Cast in Bernard Shaw's Comedy Pleases and Amuses Audience.

All predictions were justified last night when the Dramatic Club presented "Arms and the Man" Shaw's comedy, last night before a full house at the Shubert theater. From the entry of William Hodson as Captain Bluntschli in the first act until the last curtain, the players had the close attention of the audience. The comedy was most cleverly presented and the individual members of the cast deserve great credit for their work, which showed the result of long and careful preparation.

Weather conditions were all that could be asked for, especially since the last few nights the mercury has been hovering about zero. The audience at such a production is drawn largely from the regular downtown theatre goers, and good weather aids materially in bringing these people out. From the applause received, the interpretation of Shaw's comedy met with hearty approval.

## ARRANGE FOR BIG CONTEST

Will Come in March—Cash Prizes Donated by Pillsbury Estate.

Final arrangements for the Pillsbury Oratorical Contest, the climax of university forensic competition, have been arranged by Professor F. M. Rarig of the Department of Oratory and Public Speaking.

All orations are to be typewritten in triplicate and handed in by Friday noon, February 26. On the following Thursday at 4 P. M. the competitors will enter the semi-finals in which competent judges will choose six of the best. Over three weeks intervene before the final contest on the last Friday of March.

This year the prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25 to winners of first, second and third places respectively are to be furnished by the heirs to the Pillsbury estate, namely, Mrs. Edward C. Gale and Mr. A. Pillsbury. The contest was originated by the late John D. Pillsbury when Governor of Minnesota.

The contest is open only to upperclassmen. Over a dozen have already signified their intention of entering and Professor Rarig expects several more before the lists close.

## ATHLETIC BOARD ELECTION TODAY FROM 9 TO 12:30 P M

McAlmon And Art Erdall, Both Football Men, Compete For Presidency.

Committee in Charge of Polls Place Positive Ban On All Electioneering.

Candidates for the Athletic Board of Control will be voted upon by the students this morning from 9:30 to 12:30. The usual rivalry characteristic of former years, is lacking in this election; some of the candidates did not even announce themselves until yesterday.

The candidates for presidency are Wm. McAlmon and Art Erdall. McAlmon is a member of the Delta Chi fraternity, a middle law, and half-back on the 1912 football team. Art Erdall also a half-back on the 1912 football team is a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity and is a freshman law.

The candidates for the vice-presidency are Harvey Hoshour, Norman Mitchell, and Emmons Sawyer. Hoshour is a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity, a freshman law and managing editor of the 1914 Gopher. Mitchell is a member of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity, a junior Academic and editor-in-chief of the 1914 Gopher. Sawyer is a member of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity, tackle on the 1912 football team, a member of the 1912 and 1913 basket ball squads and a freshman law. The candidates for Medic representative are "Rube" Johnson and Carl Ohman. Johnson is a member of the Nu Sigma Nu fraternity, a junior Medic, a member of the 1911 football team, and guard on the 1912 and 1913 basket ball team. Ohman is a Delta Sigma Delta and a junior Dent. Leighton Simons and Sidney Stadsfold are the candidates for law representative. Simons is a middle law and is well known as a basket ball referee and a baseball umpire at the inter-college games. Stadsfold is a Sigma Chi, a middle law and a member of the 1912 track team.


### Four "Aggie" Candidates.

For engineering representative Alfred Bierman, a member of the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity, a junior Miner, and a half-back on the 1912 team has no opposition. The aspirants for Agricultural representative are the most numerous. James Curran, Lynn Robertson, George Brand and Harold Spink are candidates for this office. Curran is an Alpha Zeta and a junior aggie. Lynn Robertson is also an Alpha Zeta and a junior Aggie. Harold Spink is a member of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity and a junior Forester. Brant is Delta Chi and a junior aggie.



in the Main Building at the Agricultural College. All students can vote for the candidates for the presidency and vice-presidency and for a representative for their own college. There will be no election in the case of the secretary of the Board of Academic representative, as Ted Anderson and Henry Doerman the present holders of these offices hold over for another year.

**Ban On Electioneering.**

No electioneering will be allowed within 50 feet of the polls. The committee in charge of the election announces that any person who is approached by an electioneer within 50 feet of the polls will be counted as voting, but that this vote will not be put in the ballot box. This course has been decided upon in order to eliminate all questionable electioneering methods. The committee has given notice that this rule will be rigorously enforced.

Students will vote in the department in which they are listed in the University Directory. The senior academics who are taking law are given as L '15." The Directory will be official in any doubtful cases.

**REV. HARDIN IN CHAPEL**

**Chicago Pastor Admonishes to be Alive to The Godly Things of Life.**

In a powerful address teeming with interesting reminiscences of his work in Chicago, Reverend M. E. Hardin, pastor of the third Presbyterian church of that city and formerly pastor at Andrew Presbyterian church in Minneapolis spoke in chapel yesterday upon "The Perspective of ourselves."

"A mysterious force that is in the innermost being of each one of us exercises the tendency to pull us down. The cause of the failure of some men and women is because they neglect to consider themselves in a high and holy fashion. I beseech you to think of yourselves in the terms of God."

The speaker here emphasized his point with several examples from the slums of Chicago. "I can show you men in certain parts of that immense city who are alive to the making of money," he continued, "others are alive to news, others to beauty and so on."

"The fact is that we must be awake and responsive to these forces. As the apostle Paul puts it: 'Even so reckon ye also yourselves to be dead unto sin, but alive unto God in Christ Jesus! The fact that he was alive to God, explains the secret of the life of Jesus. One can be dead to sin only by the gradual transforming power of God, a power expressed by a new and greater perfection."

**FATHER MOYNIHAN LECTURE**

**Catholic Students Will Hear Noted Educator Sunday Afternoon.**

The members of the University Catholic Association will have the opportunity of hearing Rev. Father Moynihan at the regular meeting of that organization in the Association's building, Sunday at 4 P. M. Father Moynihan is President of St Thomas college and has the reputation of being one of the best speakers among the clergy in the Twin Cities. The subject of his lecture for Sunday will be "The Present Day Significance of the Old Testament." This will be the first of a series of lectures to be given by Father Moynihan in the near future. Special music has also been secured for the afternoon meeting.

## GOPHER TEAM WILL MEET CHICAGO QUINTET TONIGHT

Minnesota Players, Except Stadvold, Are in Good Condition For Fray.

Teams Battle For Second Position in Conference Basketball Honors

The Gophers are off for Chicago! Last night, Coach L. J. Cooke left with the varsity regulars and several reserves in tow to take on the Maroons in a basketball game tonight at Bartlett gymnasium. With the exception of Stadvold, who sprained his ankle in the rough play with the Purdue Boilermakers last week, the varsity veterans are in excellent shape. Wipperman never played better ball than he did in the exhibition at Urbana and La Fayette. "His work was that of a star center in the basketball conference," was the comment of the Purdue Exponent, the day after the game. Playing better usually on strange floors than at home, he is sure to give a good account of himself in tonight's game.

Reuben Johnson, right guard for the Gophers, and candidate for medic representative in the athletic board elections today, has played his position better than any man on the team. He not only has been a consistent point winner for Minnesota, but has the remarkable record of holding his opponents down to two baskets in five full games. In the conference games only one basket was scored off him, by his forward at Urbana, Ill. In the Purdue game Johnson made the final basket that won the game for Minnesota. More to him than any, though all have fought well, belongs the credit that Minnesota has an even break for second place in conference honors, considering she has played but three games. Whether she will make that race for second place good or not, "Rube" is sure to do his part in tonight's game.

McKeon and Lawler, our two forwards, are rather light for their position, but neither one has been surpassed in the conference as far as floor work and accurate, quick passing is concerned. Lawler has shown periods of play in which he approached the brilliant work of his famous brother, whom he is sure to rival before the end of his basket ball career. His basket shooting in the Purdue game was nothing short of star work. McKeon, though not having had the luck in caging the ball as has Lawler, nevertheless has made the brilliant work of others possible by his wonderful speed in getting possession of the ball. Time and again he has picked up a getaway, inter-

cepted dribbles, caught long passes, and worked the ball down to the Minnesota end of the field. Distinctively an aggressive player, always on the offensive, his work has featured not so much under the basket as in getting possession of the ball and bringing it into Minnesota territory.

The Maroon quintet which the Gophers meet tonight have lost two out of five games they played. They are a strong aggregation, the two forwards, Vruink and Norgren, being football men, and having wrested their places on the basket ball team from older and more experienced players, by their wonderful shooting abilities. Both men have considerable minor league experience, Vruink having been a star in the Mich. State College league last year. The other two men, the guards are Molander and Bell, both huskies, far outweighing the Gopher forwards whom they will guard. The Maroon Coach, Paige, also has a good bunch of experienced reserves, among whom are Stevenson, Kennedy, and Baumgartner.

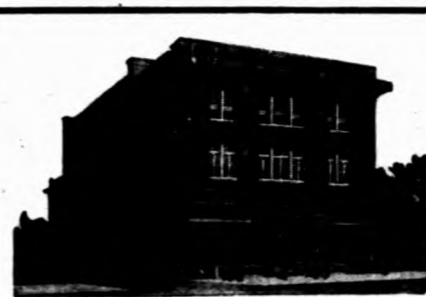
