SYRIA, LEBANON LECTURE An historical perspective on recent political developments in Syria and Lebanon will be presented in a lecture at UMD at 3 p.m. Wed., Mar. 30, in Life Science 185 by Abdul-Karim Rafeq, visiting professor of Modern Arab History at the University of Chicago's Center for Middle Eastern Studies. His lecture, sponsored by UMD's College of Letters and Science and the Department of History, is free and open to the public.

SHEA GRANTS AVAILABLE Faculty and administrative staff at member schools of the Lake Superior Association of Colleges and Universities are invited to apply for mini-grants from the Shea Memorial Fund. Each proposal must involve at least two LSA schools. The primary purpose of the Shea Grant Program is to increase educational opportunities within LSA schools. A secondary purpose is to reduce institutional costs or increase overall revenue. The fund will consist of at least \$4,000 for the spring round. Individual grants will be approved up to a maximum of \$1,000 although smaller requests are encouraged. The deadline is April 1.
