THE GREAT CATHERINE

Two plays will be presented on Friday evening at 8 o'clock by the Minnesota Masquers in the Music Hall Auditorium. Synge's "Riders to the Sea," an Irish tragedy of great literary power, will be the first offering. It tells the story of an Irish mother who has lost a husband and five sons at sea. Her youngest son follows and she is at last at peace, having no more to lose. Maria Musgrove Spehr gives an unexcelled portrayal of the role of Maurya, the mother, and is amply supported by Maxine Wilcox as Cathleen, the older daughter, and Katheryn Grill as Nora, the younger daughter. Bartley is played by David L. Couser. Others in the cast are Lyman Horton, Dudley Kendrick, Ethelyn Gruetzmacher, Rose Moosebrugger, and Matilda Hokanson. The play is directed by Katheryn R. Ruth.

The play of the evening, "The Great Catherine," is one of George Bernard Shaw's little known plays and is a satire farce giving Shaw's impression of what Catherine of Russia really was like. It is quite boisterous comedy and at times descends to a burlesque of life at the Russian court. Maude Ramm is superb in The Great Catherine and has the following cast: Stanley Bakke as Prince Patiomkin, Horace Choje as Captain Edstaston, the English captain, Elizabeth Hope as Virikna, the niece of Patiomkin, John Bates as Naryhskin, the count chamberlain, Katheryn Ruth as Princess Dashkoff, and Roberta Kendrick as Claire. All of the cast are familiar to summer session audiences and an enjoyable evening is promised those who attend this last dramatic performance of the summer. Sets have been designed by Laura Zimmerman and John Louis is stage manager.

The usual scale of prices holds for admission and the plays are open to the public. Seats will be sold at the door.
