# ISGH WELCOMES NEW DIRECTOR



On November 15, the Institute for Sexual and Gender Health (ISGH) welcomed **Greta Bauer, PhD, MPH**, as its new director. Dr. Bauer succeeds **Eli Coleman, PhD**, who served as the director of ISGH for over three decades.

“It has been my honor to have served as the Institute’s director for the past 31 years,” said Dr. Coleman. “Our amazing faculty have produced important research; educated thousands of medical students, residents, and postdoctoral fellows; and cared for tens of thousands of patients. Overall, we have

helped create a better sexual and gender health climate for all. I could not be more pleased that Dr. Greta Bauer will be leading us to meet the challenges of today and tomorrow and achieve even greater heights.”

Dr. Bauer is an alum of the University of Minnesota, holding undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral degrees from the university, and previously served as a research coordinator at ISGH. Prior to her return to ISGH, Dr. Bauer was a professor of epidemiology and biostatistics at Schulich School of Medicine and Dentistry in Canada, and held a Sex and Gender Science Chair from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. She has proven herself to be a champion of sexual and gender health over the course of her nearly 20-year career, and ISGH is excited to welcome her back as its new director.

# JEDI AND FACULTY VITALITY: EXTENDED FACULTY MEETING TOPICS

Last month at the fall Extended Faculty Meeting, **Andrea Westby, MD**, gave an overview on progress that has been made so far with our JEDI initiatives. 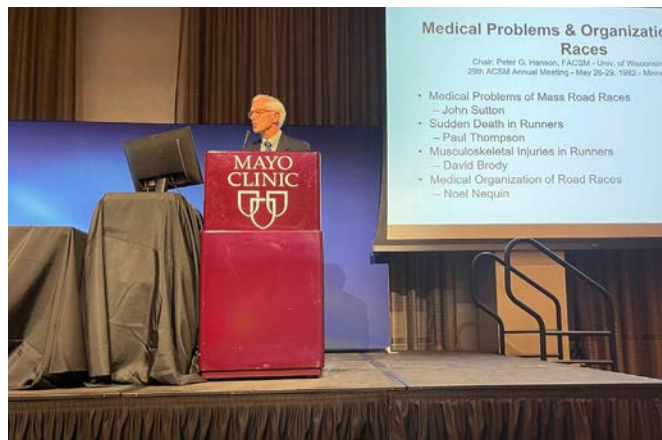
# FACULTY NEWS

At this year's World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH) Scientific Symposium, former ISGH director **Eli Coleman, PhD**, was awarded the inaugural WPATH Gold Medal Award. Dr. Coleman and his collaborators, Drs. Jon Arcelus and Asa Radix, were honored with this award in recognition of their work as chair and co-chairs of the WPATH Standards of Care Version 8 (SOC 8). The SOC 8 provides clinical guidance for healthcare professionals to assist transgender and gender diverse people with safe and effective pathways to achieve lasting person comfort with their gendered selves, and to maximize their overall health, psychological wellbeing, and self-fulfillment. The guidelines are recognized globally as the standard of care in the treatment of transgender and gender diverse people, and were developed by 119 authors from around the world and overseen by Drs. Coleman, Arcelus, and Radix.



**Bill Roberts, MD, MS**, gave an invited keynote at the 31st Mayo Sports Med Conference with the theme “40 Years of Marathon Medicine.”

Dr. Roberts also received the Executive Director Award of Distinction in 2022 for 40 Years of Service to Twin Cities in Motion. Congratulations!



**Michael Ross, MD, PhD, MPH, MHPEd, MSt**, has been named adjunct professor at Stellenbosch University (one of the top Universities in South Africa - Extraordinary Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology).

# IN OTHER NEWS

## Travel Reminders from Finance

As business travel ramps back up, here are some reminders to help you plan and pay for your travel:

- Travel meals should be paid for out of the traveler's own pocket. Upon return from travel, submit a reimbursement request through Chrome River using the meal per diem rate.
  - Using the per diem rate, you do not need to keep meal receipts.
  - The per diem rate is most often to the traveler's advantage over their actual out-of-pocket expense.
  - Travel meals are unallowable on a University Travel Card. Be sure to not have meals charged to your lodging bill when using a Travel Card.
- Plan to submit all travel expenses through Chrome River within 60 days of the date the expense was incurred (paid). This will ensure you meet the deadlines no matter the method of payment (Out-of-pocket or Travel Card).
- Main cabin/economy class, non-reimbursable fares are allowed for all flights. Upgraded seats or reimbursable fares require additional requirements to be considered allowable.

# CLINIC NEWS

## Broadway Gives Bundles of Love to Newborns and their Families

Welcoming a new child is a momentous and incredibly special experience. The team at Broadway clinic makes it extra special by providing handmade, hand-assembled, specially curated bundles for the newborns through a program called Bundles of Love. Two local churches and volunteers spend time gathering and creating items for the bundles.

**Yvonne Giles** is a clinic supervisor at Broadway who runs the Bundles of Love program. “When the OB nurse who started this program left the clinic, I came on board as a patient advocate,” says Yvonne. “I was working with a lot of our patients, some of whom needed resources. I always thought this was so amazing. At one point when the Bundles of Love program was about to end, I took it over so that it could continue.”

Every month the church asks how many bundles are needed so they can provide the necessary items. Many are handmade by seniors—everything from knitted blankets and quilts to specialty clothing like a Mickey Mouse onesie. The bags also contain necessities such as diapers, baby shampoo, pacifiers, bibs, and much more. Yvonne coordinates all of this with the triage nurse who does OB education.

In addition to assembling bundles for newborns and preemies, volunteers assemble packages with clothes and other items for christenings, holidays like Christmas, and care packages for those sad



instances when a newborn baby passes away. Each care package is unique, and each one comes with a handwritten note from clinic staff wishing the new family all the best.

Yvonne says that “there are times when we know that grandparents are assisting with care, and we try to make sure that every parent or guardian, regardless of need, gets something. Those that have a higher need receive larger bundles.” In addition to the church members who provide the Bundles of Love items, another church group called Thimble Bees also assembles care packages that the clinic staff can give to new parents.

“This is just really a blessing to the community that has been going on and never stopped during the pandemic,” says Yvonne. “It truly puts a smile on the faces of these expecting mothers and fathers. It’s a beautiful feeling.”
