AVAILABILITY OF TAX SAVINGS NOTES

Members of the University staff, along with all other citizens, are inevitably going to feel the pinch that comes with payment of federal income taxes for 1943. Sound family budgeting calls for providing now to meet the future payments. I am therefore calling the attention of the staff to the Treasury Department's Tax Savings Notes which make it possible for individuals to plan ahead for the payments they will be called upon to make later.

The issuance by the Treasury Department of Treasury Tax Savings Notes serves a threefold purpose. In the first place, these notes serve as a valuable anti-inflation instrument inasmuch as they sterilize consumer purchasing power. In the second place, the purchase by an individual taxpayer of Treasury Tax Savings Notes, in effect, constitutes a prepayment of income taxes and makes purchasing power immediately available to the federal government. In the third place, the use of Treasury Tax Savings Notes enables an individual to anticipate his income tax and budget the payment over a period of time.

United States Treasury Notes, Tax Series "A"-1944, are available in denominations of \$25.00; \$50.00; \$100.00; and \$1,000.00. United States Treasury Notes, Tax Series "B"-1944, are available in denominations of \$10.00; \$500.00; \$1,000.00 and higher. Tax Series "A" is adapted primarily for individuals, and Tax Series "B" is designed principally for corporations. The purchase price is determined by the month in which the notes are purchased, and the redemption value of the notes presented in payment of income taxes is determined by the month in which presentation is made. For example, a \$25.00 Treasury Tax Savings Note, Tax Series "A"-1944, will cost \$25.20 in June, 1942, and will be worth \$25.68 in June, 1943, or \$25.96 in January, 1944. These notes are interest bearing only when used to pay Federal Income taxes. Any surplus is redeemable at par without interest. Application blanks may be obtained at any commercial bank and transmitted through that institution to the local Federal Reserve Bank which will then issue the notes in registered form. The use of these notes is recommended.

Further information may be obtained at any bank, or by calling the Comptroller's office.

NOTICE TO STUDENTS CONCERNING INDUCTION BY SELECTIVE SERVICE DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS

Selective Service regulations require that students deferred for training in scarcity occupations shall give clear indication of their intent to return to school next fall to complete their training program. Obviously the clearest evidence of such intent is registration in summer school, and, secondly, summer employment in work which is directly and unequivocally related to their training. Such information must be filed with the dean of the college if students' deferment status is scheduled for review by the board this summer, that is, if the period of present deferment closes during the summer. Students must take responsibility for filing this information and requesting a renewal of deferment.

Students not registered in deferrable curricula may request postponement of induction to the end of the current summer term at the beginning or during that term. Postponement cannot ordinarily be requested until the summer term is under way.

Those students who are not in deferred occupational training groups are urged to notify the dean of their college and the local board of their summer plans and their summer address.

Questions concerning deferment or postponement should be raised with the dean of the college as soon as the student has received his questionnaire or has received notice of his classification. Delay in taking this action may result in immediate induction.

Classes meeting 2, 3, or more hours a day are expected to use the period assigned for the first hour at which the class meets. The period for the second hour that the class meets may also be used if desired. Classes meeting four or more days per week shall be examined at the time set for Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes.

Conflict in examinations should be referred to the schedule committee of the college concerned.

Attention is called to the fact that while the final examination schedule lists examination periods for Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes and for Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday classes, it is intended that classes meeting four or more days per week shall be examined at the time set for Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes.

For example: A class meeting first hour on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday should report for final examination on Wednesday, June 10, 9:00-12:00 at the time scheduled for the first hour Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes.

All instructors are asked to observe this principle in order to avoid concentration of examinations and conflicts.

MATRICULATION DEPOSIT

Students should turn in, before the close of the spring quarter, all University property or equipment such as library cards, books, military, athletic or band equipment, laboratory materials, locker keys, locks, etc. All such material should be turned in at this time to be reissued in the fall. Refunds of balances of matriculation deposits of students who do not return for fall quarter will be mailed to their home addresses about November 15.

SPRING QUARTER GRADES

Spring quarter grade reports will be mailed about July 10 to the home addresses of all students in residence during the spring quarter. The report will be in the form of a blueprint of the entire record and should be preserved for reference at future registrations or faculty consultations.

NOTICE TO DEPARTMENTS

Spring quarter grades and charges against student deposits should be reported to the office of admissions and records before noon Tuesday, June 16. To facilitate recording, final grades for the spring quarter should be sent to the office of admissions and records as early as possible. All grades should be submitted before noon Tuesday, June 16. It will greatly facilitate grade recording if individual reports are forwarded immediately as typing is completed.
