DULUTH. . . Twenty members of the 420th Air Force ROTC cadet corps at UMD were presented awards and decorations Tuesday afternoon at colorful parade ceremonies at the campus football field.

Before the award ceremonies, the 140-man corps paraded in review before Air Force, ROTC, civic and campus officials and guests. The ROTC drill team performed and the Republic F-84-G jet fighter was dedicated by the Arnold Air Society.

The aircraft was dedicated "to all the Air Force officers who obtained their commissions through the Air Force ROTC program while attending the University of Minnesota, Duluth."

The Cadet of the Year trophy was presented to Cadet Staff Sergeant Edward T. Kubiak, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Kubiak, Duluth, "for demonstrating the highest qualities of leadership, scholarship, military bearing and courtesy during the academic year." Kubiak is a sophomore at UMD. Col. John L. Benner, commander of the 343rd Fighter Group, Duluth, presented the trophy.

Winner of the Air Force Association medal was Cadet Captain Carroll J. Melby, Silver Bay, given to the cadet who "demonstrated a high degree of proficiency in military leadership, maintained a high academic record and demonstrated initiative, judgement and self confidence."

The Reserve Officers Association medal was presented to Cadet 2nd Lt. Douglas Brosveen, Duluth, for showing "a positive attitude toward Air Force ROTC and service in the Air Force, maintaining a high

scholastic average and demonstrating leadership traits.

The Convair Award was presented to Cadet Airman 2/C Thomas G. Basterash of International Falls, for "maintaining a positive attitude toward scholastic work and service in the Air Force, and for demonstrating outstanding leadership qualities."

The Chicago Tribune Gold Awards were given to Cadet Captain Donald F. Allan, Duluth, Cadet Major James Barncard, Duluth, and Cadet Major Joseph Pucci, Duluth, for maintaining a record of "high proficiency in academic and military activities and possessing a strong moral character befitting a potential Air Force officer."

The Chicago Tribune Silver awards were presented to Cadet Airman 1/c John L. Banks, Duluth; Airman 2/C Gary M. Wieck, Carlton, and Airman 2/C Donald Wright, Duluth, for "maintaining a record of high proficiency in academic and military activities."

The Sons of the American Revolution award went to Airman 3/C Chris A. Schell, Duluth, for maintaining "a high scholastic record and displaying high qualities of patriotism and citizenship endeavor."

The Duluth Chamber of Commerce award was won by Cadet 1st Lt. Robert W. Cummings, Duluth, given to the cadet who has shown "exceptional aptitude in the practical application of the principles of troop leadership."

The American Legion Zenith City Post award went to Cadet T/Sgt. William W. Cameron, International Falls, given for "demonstrating an outstanding aptitude for troop leadership."

The American Legion David Wisted Post No. 28 medal was won by Cadet Captain Donald F. Allan, Duluth, for "exceptional aptitude in the practical application of the principles of troop leadership."

The Provost Award was presented to Cadet Lt. Col. George H. Vipond, Duluth, for "demonstrating an outstanding degree of leadership and meritorious conduct in the service of the corps."

The Professor of Air Science Award went to Airman 3/C Jon D. Scobie, Duluth, given to the cadet "who has been selected as the best drilled Air Science I cadet."

The Operations Officer award was given to Airman 2/C Bruce A. Couillard, Duluth, for "demonstrating an outstanding aptitude for flying."

The Education Officer award was given to Cadet S/Sgt. Edward T. Kubiak, Duluth, for "maintaining the highest scholastic average in Air Science II during the academic year."

The Commandant of Cadets award went to Airman 2/C Richard Superior, Wis. Harding, given to the cadet "who has maintained the highest scholastic average in Air Science I during the academic year."

The N.C.O. award went to Cadet 2/Lt. Leonard H. I. Stone, Virginia, for "displaying the most improvement in leadership, drill and customs of the service during the academic year."

The Top Shooter award was presented to Cadet Airman 2/C Mark J. Ceynowa, Perham, for the cadet who scored the highest aggregation score as a member of the rifle team.

The Good Joe Awards went to Chief Petty Officer Richard A. Rogge, U.S. Navy, Duluth, and to S/Sgt. Ernest Johnson, Duluth Air Base, given to individuals outside ROTC who "contributed significantly to the accomplishment of the mission of the detachment."
