NOTICE TO STUDENTS CONCERNING REFUNDS

Inasmuch as classes under the present system continue up to June 18, it will be impossible to adjust the deposit accounts and make appropriate refunds, except for graduating students before the students leave for their vacation.

The Registrar hopes to be able to have refund orders ready about June 30, so that refunds can be called for or sent by mail. Those who do not expect to remain in the city until that time should be sure to indicate forwarding address on the deposit card when leaving it at Window 10.

I. Students Graduating in June

Graduating students who are entitled to a return of a portion of their deposit fee will kindly note the following directions:

1. Before June 12, present general deposit card to custodians in charge of lockers, laboratory equipment, etc., return property assigned, (locker keys, etc.) and secure endorsement of custodian. Those who do not have such cards should apply for information at Window 10.
2. Present endorsement card at Window 10, Registrar's office at the proper time (see paragraphs below) for checking of account, and receive refund order.
3. Present refund order to Cashier.
4. Students who do not call for their refunds on dates specified may receive them at any time after June 25.

Graduating students whose names begin with letters from A to L, please call on June 16, from 8:30 to 11, or from 1 to 4. Those whose names begin with letters from M to Z, kindly call on June 17, from 8:30 to 12, or from 1 to 4.

II. Students Who Do Not Graduate in June

Students who do not graduate in June and who are entitled to a return of a portion of their deposit fee will kindly note the following directions:

1. Before June 20, present general deposit card to custodians in charge of lockers, laboratory equipment, etc., return property assigned, (locker keys, etc.) and secure endorsement of custodian. Those who do not have such card should apply for information at Window 10.
2. Present endorsed card at Window 10, Registrar's office, for auditing and either call after June 30 for refund order, or arrange to have same mailed at that time.
