## YELL LEADER WILL BE ELECTED AT FIRST BIG MASS MEETING OF YEAR IN CHAPEL AT 5 O'CLOCK WHEN, WHERE, WHO AND HOW OF SWIMMING POOL

**Faculty Rule Against Chapel Hour Mass Meetings—Need Good Man for Yell Captain.**

The first big mass meeting will be held in chapel at five o'clock this afternoon. It was originally planned to hold the meeting at chapel time today, but the faculty in a recent council meeting past a resolution prohibiting a rooters' gathering at that time. ## HURRY AND ELLIOT TO ADDRESS Y. M. C. A. SOON

**Hurry Here October 20—Elliot Here November 8-12—Both Big Y. M. C. A. Men.**

Charles D. Hurry, western international secretary of the student branch of the Y. M. C. A., will be at Minnesota Wednesday, October 16, at the noon meeting of the Y. M. C. A., and will be around the university the remainder of that week.

He will end his visit here with a monster meeting Sunday, October 20, in chapel. He will undoubtedly make as big a hit with the students as he did when he spoke here a year ago.

"Dad" Elliott, Northwestern, '02, was probably the most popular man in that institution. He will be at Minnesota November 8-12 and will speak on numerous occasions to the student body.

"Dad" Elliott, formerly secretary of the Brooklyn Y. M. C. A., is associated with Mr. Hurry in his work, both being western international secretaries.

Mr. Elliott is an orator and an athlete. He played left end on the university team four years and in 1907 was "all western end." He also was captain of the track team and made the 100 yards in 10 1-10 seconds.

The swimming tank is to be situated in the University avenue end of the armory on the ground floor. It will be 60 by 20 feet, the depth varying from 1-2 to 8 feet.

The tank will be a white enamel one. Shower baths will be installed along the sides and all swimmers must take a sort of introductory bath before entering the pool.

Regular classes will be organized and receive instruction in swimming.
