“Gertrude Stein, Edith Wharton, and “The Fool’s Journey” will be presented at 10 a.m. on Friday, **October 15** in the Weber Music Hall. The performance, combining personal narrative, performance, and scenes from Lynn Miller’s novel, *The Fool’s Journey*. It begins with an essay, “Saved by Gertrude Stein,” which details how performing Gertrude Stein changed Miller’s academic and creative life. Following this is an excerpt from the Stein performance, “Gertrude Stein as Gertrude Stein,” introducing the audience to Stein’s remarkable life and ideas on writing. The third section of the performance consists of selections from Miller’s recent novel, *The Fool’s Journey* which features Wharton as a character. Miller is a faculty member at the University of Texas-Austin. The performance includes a question-and-answer with the audience about performing autobiography, Stein, Wharton, and writing fiction. Susana Pelayo-Woodward will present “Chiapas revisited: Indigenous communities and the effects of Globalization” at noon on Thursday, **September 30** in Griggs Center.

Marjorie Agosin, a human rights activist and writer, will present “Threads of Resistance: The story of the Chilean Arpilleras” at noon on Tuesday, **October 19** in the Tweed Museum. Agosin will present “Re Dreaming a Just World Gender and Human Rights in Latin America” at 7 p.m. on **October 19** in the Life Science Room 175.

The Tweed Museum of Art will show the Chilean Arpilleras Exhibition Display from **September 27** through November. These women’s protest tapestries were created in the 1970s and 80s by Chilean women whose love ones were murder, missing and torture during the harsh regime (1973-1989) of dictator Augusto Pinochet.

Patrick Leet will present “A Cuban Perspective on Global Trade and Economic Development” at noon on **October 21** in Griggs Center. Patrick Leet is a senior member of the Witness for Peace International Team. He will share his experiences with and analysis of economic development throughout Latin America.

Two Dia de los Muertos / Day of the Dead exhibitions will be presented from **October 27 - November 8**. One will be at the Multicultural Student Union on the second floor of Kirby and the other will be on display in the Department of Art exhibition display located in the third floor of Humanities. The Day of the Dead is a tradition which dates back to the Aztec civilization. The Aztecs believe that the soul of the dead returns home to the world of the living.

The film: *La Ofrenda: The Day of the Dead*,

directed by Susan Munoz and Lourdes Portillo (1989, 50 minutes), will be shown at noon on Tuesday, **November 2** in the Tweed Museum of Art Lecture Gallery. La Ofrenda takes a non-traditional look at the Mexican tradition of the Days of the Dead, evoking the familiar, ironic, sometimes humorous nature of Mexican and Mexican-American attitudes toward death.
