R.O.T.C. MEN—NOTICE

Unit Memorandum No. 62

Subject: R.O.T.C. Infantry Training Camps, 1919.

Training Camps established under the authority of Section 48, Act of July 3, 1916, for selected members of the R.O.T.C., will be conducted this year under the following supervision and regulations:

General

1. The instructions herein pertain to Infantry Camps only. Special announcements concerning camp training for Coast Artillery and Field Artillery Units will be issued later.

Time

2. The camps will be opened on Saturday, June 21, 1919, and close on Saturday, August 2, 1919.

Location of Camps

3. Camps providing training for selected members of Infantry units within the various districts will be located as follows:

- Districts No. 1 and 2—Camp Devens, Mass.
- Districts No. 3 and 4—Camp Lee, Va.
- Districts No. 5 and 10—Camp Z. Taylor, Ky.
- Districts No. 6 and 7—Camp Custer, Mich.
- Districts No. 8 and 9—Camp Funston, Kansas.
- Districts No. 11 and 12—Presidio of San Francisco, Cal.

Designation

4. Camps will be respectively designated as the Camp Devens R.O.T.C. Infantry Camp, the Camp Lee R.O.T.C. Infantry Camp, etc., etc.

Attendance

5. Attendance at the camps will be open only to members of the R.O.T.C. who at the time of the opening of the camp are 18 or more years of age, and who fall within one of the following groups:

- (a) Members of Senior units who are in the basic course.
- (b) Members of Senior units who are in the advanced course.
- (c) Members of Junior units who at the end of the present school year will not have had less than two years training in an R.O.T.C. unit.

Attendance will this year be compulsory only for those members of the Senior Division who have signed the written agreement provided in paragraph 35 of General Orders 49, and who will be graduated in the academic year 1919-1920.

Members of Senior units other than Infantry will when no special camp is provided, and with the approval of the Professor of Military Science and Tactics in charge of their units, be permitted to attend Infantry Camps. Members of Cavalry and Field Artillery units who attend Infantry camps will be given camp credit for such attendance.

The Professor of Military Science and Tactics at each institution is directed to submit to the District Inspector before May 15th a list of the names, home addresses, name and address of nearest relative, age and course for which recommended (see below par. 7) of members of the R.O.T.C. unit who agree in writing to attend the camp. Supplementary lists may be submitted later. These lists will be promptly forwarded by District Inspectors to the R.O.T.C. Camp Commander. In exceptional cases due to sickness or other unavoidable cause students may be permitted to enter the camp who report late, but in no case will this excep-

tional privilege be extended beyond the close of the second week of camp. The total authorized attendance at this year's camps is limited to 10,000, and in case the applications exceed this number preference will be given to individuals in the order in which they register their intention to attend.

Instruction and Administration Personnel

6. The Camp Commanders, Camp Executive Officers and other instruction and administration personnel will be detailed by this office. This personnel will consist of such officers as are on duty within the two combined districts with such additional officers as may be necessary.

Courses of Instruction

7. At each camp facilities will be provided for conducting courses of practical infantry training prescribed for a Senior basic camp course, for a Senior advanced camp course, and for a Junior basic camp course. Programs for each of these camps will be furnished by this office to the Camp Commanders. Members of the R.O.T.C. units will be designated by the Professor of Military Science and Tactics and when these members report to the camp they will be assigned to the camp section taking the course for which they are designated.

Equipment

8. The Government will furnish at the camps rifles, infantry packs, including belts and mess kits, beds or cots, bedsacks or mattresses, blankets and cooking outfits and such property as may be necessary. No such equipment will be brought to the camps by R.O.T.C. members.

Uniform

9. In addition to the uniforms issued for the use with units, the following items of uniform outer clothing will be issued at the camp to each student in attendance:

Two breeches, cotton, O.D.; one pair shoes; one hat, service, O.D.; one hat cord, O.D.; two woolen shirts, O.D.; one pair leggins, O.D.

These articles will be entered on individual equipment record of each man. At the close of the camp these articles will be retained by those men returning to college the next year to pursue course of instruction in the R.O.T.C. They will be required to bring this clothing with them for use during the next school year.

R.O.T.C. Camp Commanders are authorized to issue to units within their districts instructions regarding uniform outer clothing to be brought by members from the units. Such uniform equipment will be excepted from the provisions of Unit Memo. No. 57, but must be brought back to the units at the opening of the next academic year.

Only hand luggage will be brought to camp as there will be no facilities at the camps for the storage or handling of trunks.

Subsistence

10. Students while en route to and from the camp will be required to subsist themselves.

The subsistence of students while in attendance at the camps will be at Government expense, and the ration allowance will be the Government ration, cooked and prepared at Government expense. Cooks and mess attendants will be furnished by the Government.

At the termination of the camp all savings on the ration allowance will be returned to the Quartermaster who paid the allowance.

Pay and Mileage

11. Students in attendance at the camps will not be enlisted and pay will not be furnished. Students who are authorized to attend the camps will receive mileage at the rate of 3½ cents per mile for the distance from their colleges or schools to the camps designated for their district, and mileage at the rate of 3½ cents per mile from such camp after completion of course of same to their respective places or legal residence provided the distance from camp to legal residence is not greater than from college or school to camp.

In case the student goes from the school to his home before the opening of the camp the Professor of Military Science and Tactics may direct him to report to the designated R.O.T.C. camp nearest his home and will in such cases furnish the District Inspector of the District in which the camp is located with the listed information described in paragraph 5 above.

Interior Discipline

12. Those who attend the camps will be required to comply at all times with all orders or instructions issued by proper authority, and to pursue earnestly and actively the course of instruction prescribed.

Certificate

13. Upon completion of the camp, the Camp Commander will issue to each student who has successfully completed the course of instruction a certificate prepared in the following form. Under remarks there will be entered a statement as to whether the student is considered as being good material for commissioned rank after further training.

Miscellaneous

14. These camps afford an opportunity for the improvement and coordination of R.O.T.C. methods, both of which are most important at this stage of development. It is most essential that the institutions, officers and students should unite their efforts to make the camps an unqualified success, and so to promote general interest in the R.O.T.C.

15. Conferences of officers and enlisted men on Infantry R.O.T.C. duty with the districts will be held for a period of about one week at the close of each camp. A memorandum concerning these conferences will be furnished later.

16. Communications regarding R.O.T.C. camps should be addressed to District Inspectors.
