THE CAMPUS CLUB will be open during Summer School for the use of members and also those instructors in Summer School who wish to take out temporary membership. The fee for such temporary membership is \$5.00. The Club contains living rooms, a dining room, a ladies' dining room, a reading room with the current periodicals, a billiard room, and a limited number of bedrooms. Board may be obtained at the following rates: By the week, \$8.00 for three meals per day, and \$6.30 for lunch and dinner; single meals, breakfast, 30 cents; lunch, 50 cents; dinner, 65 cents; Sunday dinner, 90 cents; and Sunday supper, 30 cents. Arrangements may be made with the steward.
